With an undefeated but once tied freshman team and a junior varsity squad which shows promise, prospects should be looking up for yearling head football coach John LaFontana of East Catholic High.

LaFontana is suffering through a disasterous first year as the Eagle mentor, as his club is presently 2-7, one win being a forfeit victory a week ago when Monument Mt. Regional, Mass., was forced to cancel due to internal difficulties. "Next year we should have a better team. We'll use some of the

He was head football coach at his alma mater. Searles, for six years before coming to Manchester in 1967 and was an assistant coach before taking over the head job this season. Besides coaching football, LaFontana teaches economics, psychology and

history, earning an M.E. in psychology from Westfield State. "I've been in coaching for 13 years and there's a lot to be said for high school coaching. College coaching is not all that glamorous, especially if you're an assistant," the Blue and White leader stated.

When forming his roster, LaFontana said he looks for a kid who is enthusiastic and hustles. "You can make a good player out of someone who hustles. Someone can be a good athlete but a bad football player if they don't hustle," LaFontana analyzed. LaFontana had a late start in football, not playing in high school until the last year. Coaching is something which seemed to come naturally. "I just enjoy working with young men. There is a tremendous amount of enjoyment matching wits with the other coach. It's like war in miniature with no one getting killed," LaFontana guipped.

With a solid nucleus of sophomores to build from, the East coach should find success in the next few years. One member of the faculty voiced a warning, "If he can make them into a good team, then that will be the measure of him as a coach."
