"They were scared this time so they called in the troops. said a politican who was prominent before the coup. "It was a sign of panic."

One theory circulating here says Papadopoulos brought in he army during the riots last week partly for fear of losing control of it if he let it stand idle during the disturbances. But other views hold that if the strongman president hadn't moved to crush the protests, the rioters would have had time to marshal more support for bringing down the government

The sit-in leaders first called for an end to political trials and for academic freedom. Soldiers and police finally stormed the institute early Saturday and ousted the tudents. Eleven persons were killed in the clashes.

During the sit-in, Polytechnic students used a radio transmitter to appeal to workers to join the protest About 5,000 of them, mostly construction workers in the Athens area, answered the call and strengthened the antigovernment front.

General Motors Corp. announced Friday the recall of 380,000 1971 and 1972 model Cadillacs, and Ford Motor Co. said it was recalling 3,527 of its 1973 and 1974 model school

GM's Cadillac Division said owners were being asked to. return cars to dealers to correct insufficient lubrication on the steering control if corrosion becomes serious. Eldorado models are not included in the recall, GM said.

Ford said its recall was begun to check buses for possible incorrect routing of nylon air pressure brake tubes. Ford said tubes improperly routed could melt due to contact with the exhaust pipe, cutting rear

wheel braking performance. Loss of air pressure to the parking brake could cause the rear brakes to be applied unexpectedly, an official said.

HARTFORD (AP) - A sidewalk fight broke out because a crowd of Spanishspeaking people apparently misunderstood the actions of three policemen working to save a heart attack victim, authorities

Police said they wielded nightsticks to hold back the crowd trying to prevent the officers from giving oxygen and heart massage to Mrs. Evangelica Echevacria, 59, who later died at St. Francis

Police said they tried to explain in Spanish that they were giving emergency aid to the woman, but the crowd apparently thought she was being beaten. Heart massage involves pounding the victim's chest to get the heart beating again, officials said.

The woman's son, Cecilio F. Echevacria, 21, allegedly punched one policeman in the jaw and tried to pull another off his stricken mother, police said. He was charged with assault on an officer, breach of peace and interferring with an officer, and was held in lieu of

\$10,000 bond. Officer Hector Marrero suffered a broken hand and several bruises in the melee, according to a spokesman at Hartford Hospital where he was treated

At most, West estimates that he will use one quarter of the gas used last winter, mostly on weekends when the family

The conversion only cost a few dollars and West has an agreement to cut old timber from a woodlot. He uses a chain saw, and splits the wood at

"People are too dependent on other people doing their work for them," said West a telephone repairman, "and they don't have the adaptability to do anything for themselves."

West, his wife and five children grow most of their own food. Part of the basement is a root cellar. And the family buys meat in big sections, cuts it and makes corned beef. "I know that I'm starting to

live 100 years in the past but I think that it's something that people are going to have to do," said West.

"No one knows how to do anything any more, but they better start learning again."

Why Not Cultivate Some Little Green Friends?



With the recent increased interest in ecology and planting, houseplants have become more popular than ever.

Some people look upon plants as little living friends. Just like real friends, they like and need attention.



Watering

Overwatering is one of the biggest problems in the proper care of plants. Feel the top of the soil. If the top one half inch feels dry, it's time to water. The water should be at room temperature.



Potting and Soil

Many experts prefer clay pots, but you can use plastic ones. Plants in plastic pots need less water. The bottom of any pot should have a hole for drainage. Cover bottom with gravel and then soil. Leave about three fourths of an inch from the top of the soil to the top of the pot.

You can buy potting soil at some dime stores or at any garden center. You can mix your own by mixing one-third garden dirt, one-third peat moss and one-third sand or perlite.

Peat moss is a mixture of decayed plants, such as moss and ferns. Perlite is a manufactured product that may be used in place of sand. It helps drainage.



Fertilizer

Ask Mom or Dad to mix water with soluble fertilizer. Use it on your plant about every three weeks. Don't use it until the plant has been in the new pot for at least a month and a half. Otherwise, it might damage the roots.



Place

Each plant has its own special sunlight needs. Keep them out of drafts. It's often a good idea to put them in the kitchen where the humidity is highest. (Humidity is the amount of water in the air.) It's also a good idea to group plants together.

On this page are five plants that are easy for children to grow.



Snake plants are the easiest to grow in any warm temperature.



Heartleaf plants grow very well in warm temperatures (65°F). Wash leaves once a month with soap and water. Do not get soap on the soil.



Pepper Face plants grow best in bright light. They will rot if overwatered, so be extra careful.

Rubber plants grow best in warm, moist places. Wipe leaves often with a wet cloth.



Chinese evergreens will grow for years in the dark parts of a room. They need little care.

The specific names are printed on the labels placed in front of the flower plant.











Super Sport: O. J. Simpson

Mini Do: How to Root Plants


Here's how you can use a cutting from a growing plant to start another plant.

1. Cut off a stem containing four or five leaves.

2. Put the cutting in a pot containing wet perlite. (You can root some plants by putting them in water.)

3. Cover the pot with a plastic bag. Use sticks stuck in the soil to hold up the bag and keep it from touching the plant.

4. About once a week, take off the bag and test the cutting by pulling it gently. When it resists a gentle pull, its roots have begun to grow.


