State Motorists Weather First Gasless Sunday

Connecticut motorists seem to have weathered the first weekend of a voluntary ban on Sunday gasoline sales without too much trouble, according to automobile club officials and state police.

Traffic Sunday was about 25 per cent of the normal volume, said Alex Parley, spokesman for the Connecticut branch of the American Automobile Association (AAA).

Parley said a special telephone number to help Independent Connecticut motorists needing gasoline was busy throughout the weekend, but none of the callers had actually run out of fuel. State police also said they received few calls from stranded

Expressway service areas were open Sunday, but gasoline wasn't sold, officials said.

In other developments: -Sen. Abraham Ribicoff, D-Conn., told President Nixon's new energy czar, William Simon, that 21 Navy tankers should be taken out of mothballs and pressed into service bringing oil to New England from the Southern and Western United States.

-Ribicoff also said he thought Simon was a good choice to "grab the loose helm and bring some badly needed direction to the country's energy policies." Former Colorado Gov. John Love had been Nixon's top energy ad-

-U.S. Rep. Robert H. Steele, R-Conn., said Simon soon would visit Connecticut to evaluate the energy problem facing the

-State Insurance Commissioner Thomas White said a eduction in highway traffic because of the gasoline shortage could bring auto insurance rates down. But if the crisis forces plants to close for long periods, White said, fire insurance rates would rise because the sprinkling systems in the cold buildings would have to drained, increasing the potential for fire damage.

White added that most drivers don't have sufficient insurance to cover four or five passengers, meaning that if they drive in car pools they should increase their insurance

-Connecticut homeowners should be able to keep their houses warm all winter if they take conservation steps and if the weather isn't worse than last year, said Raymond L. Langfield, president of the Petroleum Association.

-And the National Weather Service said November was warmer than last year and there was reason to think December's average temperature also would be above average.

For the entire heating season so far, the weather service said this year has a 12 per cent saving over normal and a 22 per cent saving over last year, calculated in degree days.

A degree day is calculated on a base of 65 degrees and is the difference between the average temperature for a day and 65. For example, if the average for a day was 30, the day would have 35 degree days.

-The Danbury Chamber of Commerce has decided not to light Christmas decorations, a reversal of a previous decision that the season needed the gaiety the lights would bring.

Possible future space inhabitants were exposed today to some of the exciting drama that goes on in today's giant space program.

Students at Bentley School listened to Lloyd H. Aronson, space science specialist, as he touched on various phases of

He is one of three space educators who will appear in Manchester schools this week giving lecturedemonstrations. demonstrated the growth of the rocket from the X-15 to designs of the future including a space shuttle. The X-15, he said, is now retired in the Smithsonian Institution in Washington, D.C.

Other rocket models displayed were miniatures of one of the first, the Scout which was equivalent to seven-stories, satellite observing the sun, he high, to the Saturn V which is as high as a 36-story building.

One aircraft model Aronson showed the wide-eyed audience had propellors on top of the craft which would raise, it perpendicularly off the ground. means of a special device, the pilot can switch the propellors to the front of the craft enabling it to move forward, like an ordinary airplane. Upon reaching its destination, the position of the propellors could be switched again to the top and the craft could land straight down, on much the same principle as a

helicopter. Aronson showed pictures illustrating the kind of information which is received from a satellite assigned to reporting experiments in earth's resources. The information, when translated into photographs, can tell what kind of crops grow on large farms, crop blights, fish run in the ocean's depths.

melting snow, and the famous geological fault in California is detectable by satellite.

Other satellites which enable scientists to forecast weather patterns, and which enable worldwide communication were described by Aronson. There is even a scientific

Probably the most exciting satellite is Pioneer 10 which is scheduled to take pictures of the planet Jupiter, a planet which throws so much energy that as Pioneer 10 passes it, it will be thrown into outer space, or infinity. Aronson said there is a plaque on the satellite which contains certain information about earth along with a picture of a man and a woman. One can only conjecture when or if such information will be received, said Aronson.

Messages from Jupiter to earth take 45 minutes, and by the time a return message is sent to Pioneer 10, the elapsed time is 11/2 hours, Aronson explained. In 1976, a probe satellite, the

Viking, is scheduled to gooto Mars and send back information on the planet's surface and weather data. The information which comes

to the Goddard Space Flight Center, which is the tracking center of the NASA program, is in the form of a number language using the binumary system, and sound tones.

The system of communication, called telemetry, which is computerized, can tell scientists at Godddard where a spacecraft is in relation to the sun, the temperature of the craft and the human body within, along with other pertinent data. The sounds, as Aronson demonstrated them on a sample machine, sounded like a cacophony of beeps, which only a computer or a trained ear could decipher.

The energy given forth by the sun is a factor which space scientists need to make their space efforts workable, said Aronson. He demonstrated the ability of sun energy to produce sound transmission and power. One of the more interesting displays was a space suit and the explanation of how it works." Czar-Designate Does Not Rule **Out Rationing**

WASHINGTON (AP) - Deputy Treasury Secretary William E. Simon challenges suggestions that his impending appointment as the new federal energy czar lessens the chance of gasoline rationing.

"That isn't so," Simon responded quickly when asked whether that is what his appointment as head of a nearly created Federal Energy Administration means. "I don't rule out rationing. I don't rule out anything." Simon, 46, said the new agen-

cy would begin quickly to try to come up with new federal programs for tackling the fuel Sen. Charles Percy, R-III.,

ranking Republican on the Senate Government Operations Committee, said hearings on the new agency would be held Thursday. Simon had been one of the

principals in an administration policy struggle over whether formal rationing of short supplies or a stiff gasoline tax is the best government response to the fuel shortage.

While White House energy adviser John A. Love and Love's deputies were saying gasoline rationing probably couldn't be avoided because of the Arab oil cutoff, Simon was pushing for a strong mandatory allocation program of supplies, mandatory conservation programs and perhaps a gasoline tax, with rationing only a last-

Love, a former governor of Colorado, will remain as a presidential assistant, but his new role is unclear, a

In a nationally broadcast speech Sunday night, Sen. William Proxmire, D-Wis., contended that Nixon's energy proposals were not enough to prevent severe fuel shortages, loss of jobs and cold homes this

Issuing the Democrats' official response to the Nixon program. Proxmire said fuel rationing was necessary, although he called it "so bad that I would want to get rid of it as soon as we possibly can."

Another congressional Democrat, Rep. Wright Patman of Texas, said he thought the fuel shortage was "just for the short run" and was caused solely by the Arab oil cutoff. "I doubt rationing would do the trick," he told interviewers on the CBS radio-television program "Face the Nation." Speaking on NBC's "Meet the Press," Treasury Secretary

George P. Schultz said, however, the fuel shortage was "a long-term problem. We have a genuine crisis, a critical problem. I think the Arabs have done us a favor. Finally everyone is awake.'

The second hearing session is to be held at the Municipal Building Hearing Room, but Town Planner J. Eric Potter has indicated that the hearing site may be moved to a larger hall if public response is too great for the hearing room. The PZC hearing will deal

requested by MAP Associates, an investment partnership led by developer Arthur M. Fischer of New York City, to allow development in Manchester of a 561-acre commercialindustrial-residential center at Buckland.

About 263 acres of the oposed development site are in Manchester, and the remaining acreage is in South

Tonight's hearing, concerned only with the Manchester portion of the land, concerns zone changes from Rural Residence to Comprehensive Urban Development (about 138 acres), Industrial (38 acres), Business 3 (811/2 acres), and Business 1 (seven acres) Zones.

Fischer's firm is planning a 10-to-15-year development program to eventually include a one million-square foot shopping center, a hotel-conference center, office buildings, an industrial research park, and a residential condominium com-

The Nov. 5 public hearing drew strong opposition to the plans by an 80-family nomeowners association at Buckland. Since that hearing, two other groups - the Democratic Club of Manchester and the Parkade Merchants Association - have also voiced opposition to the

Ben-Gurion Laid To Rest Near Zin Wilderness

JERUSALEM (AP) - David Ben-Gurion was buried next to his wife Paula today on the edge of the wilderness The site was a lunarscape of breathtakingly beautiful

mountains and canyons. An honor guard stood at attention as his flag-draped cof-

fin was carried from a helicopter. The craft ferried it from Ben Gurion's family behind a Jerusalem after thousands of Israelis mourned Ben-Gurion at memorial services for the founder of modern Israel. He

died Saturday at the age of 87. The service in Jerusalem was held in the open plaza of the Knesset, Israel's parliament, where an estimated 250,000 Israelis came Sunday as Ben-Gurion's body lay in state. An honor guard of 12 policemen

stood around the coffin. As the service began, sirens wailed throughout the country, bringing motorists and pedestrians to a halt for a minute of silent prayer.
