SECTION 1. COMMISSION ON HUMAN RELATIONS

There shall be a Commission on Human Relations consisting of nine members who shall be appointed by the Board of Directors and who shall serve without compensation. Of the nine members first appointed, three shall be appointed for a term expiring on the first Monday of November, 1965; three shall be appointed for a term expiring on the first Monday of November, 1966; and three shall be appointed for a term expiring on the first Monday of November, 1967. Thereafter, all appointments to the Commission shall be for a term of three years. In the event of the death or resignation of any member of the Commission, a successor shall be appointed by the Board of Directors to serve the unexpired portion of the term for which such member had been appointed. to more than a bare majority of the Commission shall be members of the same political party and, as far as possible, the Commission shall represent a cross section of the Town of Manchester. The Commission shall elect its own chairman.

SECTION 2. MEETINGS The Commission should meet monthly and at such other times as the chairman may designate. Any four members of the Commission may, in writing, request the chairman call a special neeting for a specific purpose, or purposes, and the chairman shall call such meeting for such purposes, in accordance with such request. A quorum will consist of five members and any motion will pass upon the approval of the majority of those present and voting. SECTION 3. FUNCTIONS

The Commission shall be dedicated to the promotion of equal rights and opportunities for all citizens regardless of race, national origin, religion, sex, age, or economic status and to a better understanding among all groups in the community. To this end the commission shall concern itself with: . assuring the equal protection of the laws and the full rights nd privileges of all citizens.

2. promoting full equality of opportunity in the total economic. educational, political and cultural life of the community. 3. promoting improved communication, understanding an cooperation between all racial, ethnic, religions, age, and sex groups in the community.

ensuring equal employment opportunities in all levels of town government and equal services by the Town of Manchester to all citizens. Problems illustrative of these concerns would include: because of race, religion, sex and age.

2 the provision to individuals and families of recreation in come, housing, medical care, education and employment opportunity to meet minimum requirements for social living as well as their special and diverse needs. 3. areas of tensions and misunderstanding arising among various citizens and groups of citizens particularly revolving around racial, age, sex and religious groupings. SECTION 4. POWERS AND DUTIES:

The Commission shall be charged with the following duties:

1. To cooperate with Federal, State, and Town agencies in developing an educational program for presentation in public and private schools, public libraries and such other suitable places of assembly on techniques for achieving harmonious inter-group relations within the Town of Manchester. 2. To enlist the cooperation of various racial, religious, and ethnic groups, community organizations, labor organizations, fraternal and benevolent associations and other groups in U.S. MIXED - Dennis DeLi- programs and campaigns devoted to eliminating the causes of the

problems coming within the scope of the Commission's functions. 3. To study the field of human relations generally and to determine principles and practices which might be applied within the 4. To study such human relations problems coming within its function that may be referred to it by the Board of Directors or General Manager or brought to its attention by commission members, individual citizens and community organizations.

5. To seek voluntary compliance with State and Federal laws relating to Civil Rights. 6. To receive complaints of unlawful discrimination and un equal treatment and to refer such matters to the proper agency having jurisdiction in those matters.
7. To recommend to the Board of Directors such ordinances or programs as it may deem necessary to deal with these problems as they exist or to prevent such problems before they arise in the

8. To submit to the Board of Directors annually, or more frequently as the Board of Directors may prescribe or the Commission may deem desirable, reports concerning the activities of the Commission, particular human relations problems and such recommendations as it may deem necessary or desirable.


Super Sport: Jack Marin


