## Kissinger Trying To Repair NATO

#### **IRS** Checking **Fuel Prices**

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Internal Revenue Service agents fanned out across the nation "in force" today investigating truckers' complaints of fuel price gouging.

An IRS spokesman said Sunday he could not estimate how many agents would be patrolling the highways, but "come Monday morning I expect they will be out in

William E. Simon, head of the Federal Energy Administration, promised prompt action against "those who are exploiting the current fuel shortage" after a meeting with IRS Commissioner Donald Alexander and a series of conferences between representatives of truckers, Nixon and government officials.

President Nixon met Saturday with Frank E. Fitzsimmons, president of the Teamsters Union, to hear truckers' requests for stricter controls on diesel fuel costs and a 60 m.p.h. speed limit on interstate highways instead of 55 m.p.h. which Nixon proposed.

Fitzsimmons' asked union and non-union drivers to discard plans for further road blockades or stoppages while Washington tries to solve complaints.

But the Fraternal Association of Steel Haulers in Pittsburgh called for a nationwide truck shutdown Thursday and Friday to protest fuel shortages for their vehicles.

A group of independent truckers also planned a work stoppage Thursday and Friday which organizers said could involve 100,000 drivers.

#### Joint Committee To Review Nixon Tax Statement

WASHINGTON (UPI) - A congressional committee and a California tax panel begin examining President Nixon's newly disclosed financial data this week to decide whether he owes some \$300,000 in back

Rep. Wilbur D. Mills, D-Ark., agreed to convene Congress' Joint Committee on Internal Taxation to go over the President's federal income tax returns. A committee aide said the first meeting would be as early as possible this week, perhaps Wednesday.

vestigation down to four. Newly installed as vice president, Ford said in a broadcast interview Sunday (ABC's "Issues and Answers") he sees no grounds for presidential impeachment or resignation but that, since the impeachment inquiry is going on, it "ought to be moved ahead very swiftly."

White House sources said that if both the California and Washington hearings go against the President on all tax issues. he might have to pay \$296,333 in federal taxes and between \$15.-000 and \$16,000 to California.

Nixon paid no California state income taxes from 1969 through 1972, although he voted there. The White House says California law exempted him from taxation because his "domicile" was in Washington. The District of Columbia also exempted him from local income taxes, as a federal elected official.

The Mills committee will examine the legality of the tax free sale by Nixon of land adjoining his San Clemente property for a profit of \$117,370 and the deduction of \$576,000 he claimed for giving his vice presidential papers to the National Archives.

The President's financial accounting Saturday showed that he paid a smaller percentage of his income in federal taxes over the five years than a family of four with an income of \$8,000. His net worth tripled since he became President and he is now. nearly a millionaire.

WASHINGTON (UPI) -Congress has cleared up the onstitutional problem that threatened to block the nomina-tion of Sen. William B. Saxbe, R-Ohio, as attorney general and the Senate Judiciary Com-mittee has indicated it will act promptly on confirmation

The House voted to lower the attorney general's salary to \$35,000, a cut of \$25,000, allowing Saxbe to take office if confirmed despite a constitutional provision prohibiting him from acceding to an office for which he voted a salary increase while a member of the

The White House has dicated Nixon would sign the salary bill promptly and send Saxbe's nomination to the Senate shortly thereafter. An aide to the Senate Judiciary Committee said the committee would attempt to act on the nomination quickly so Saxbe could be approved and sworn in before Congress adjourns for Christmas, about

But the nomination could be delayed until after the Christmas break by opponents who argue that despite the salary bill Saxbe cannot hold the office

They say that only a con-stitutional amendment could allow Saxbe to take the job. In addition to lowering the salary, the legislation, approved without objection by the House, would provide for a quick court test of the constitutionality of the action. Saxbe was in his first year of his current Senate term in 1969 when Congress voted to raise from \$35,000 to \$60,000. Acting Attorney General Robert Bork, whom Saxbe would replace when confirmed, has testified before Senate committees that Nixon would not submit the nomination until the salary bill was passed because the nomination might be considered illegal if it were made before Saxbe became

They would come, Andrews suggested, if some employer use the so - called "last hired, first fired" concept which would "ignore all of the steps" made through affirmative ac tion programs to give black and Spanish speaking people ad-

General layoffs of between 10,000 and 20,000 workers have been predicted by public officials, Andrews said.

We're all for the one-day-a-week sessions announced for the 1974 General Assembly by its leaders, but not for the same reason they gave - to conserve fuel. We're for the mini sessions because we

think that's all they need to accomplish We didn't go along with the push for annual sessions - not in 1969, when it was recommended; not in 1970, when it was approved in referendum by the voters; not in 1971, when it went into effect; and not

We thought, and we still do, that the General Assembly can complete all its ousiness by meeting, as it did prior to 1971, for five months every two years. It can adopt a two-year budget in that time, it can attend to all important matters in that time, it can cut down the cost of government in that time and, if the emergency ever arises, it can call itself back into special session at any time.

Prior to 1971, the legislature met for five months in the odd-numbered years (from he Wednesday following the first Monday in January to the Wednesday following the first Monday in June). Now, in addition to the five-month ses-

sion in odd-numbered years, it meets for hree months in even-numbered years (from the Wednesday following the first Monday in January to the Wednesday following the first Monday in May). The operating budget for the 1969-70 legislature was \$2.7 million, with \$2.1 million of it spent when it was in session in 969 and \$600,000 when it wasn't in session

The budget for 1973-74 is an estimated \$8 million — \$4 million for each year. Up until 1971-72, state senators and representatives , received \$5,500 for their two years in office. When the 1973-74 legislature took office, the salaries went

to \$13,000 for the two-year stint - a raise of over 135 per cent. It was voted by the

Certainly, the Cost of Living Council would object if some of us were to get raises of 135 per cent. And certainly our employers would object, and even dock our pay, were we to report to work one day a week for only three months in the year. And we're not speaking of \$25,000 to \$50,-000 a year executives. We're speaking of those countless people who still are earning \$13,000 or less every two years - or, as we compute it, \$6,500 a year.

And it takes lots of energy to do that.




