Nast Picture Not the First Of Santa Claus

By FREDERICK M. WINSHIP NEW YORK (UPI) - The oldest depiction of Santa Claus as we know him today - fur-edged suit and cap, boots and backpack -was printed in a New York weekly newspaper in 1844.

The New Mirror's engraving by an unknown artist is captioned "Santa Claus. The Night Before New Year." I ilso states that the picture was designed expressly for the publication by Sherman & Smith, an engraving company.

The date of the engraving gives lie to tradition that famed cartoonist Thomas Nast, who often portrayed Santa Claus in the 1860s and 1870s, was the first to picture of "jolly old elf" described by Clement Clark Moore in his popular poem "Vicit from St. popular poem, "Visit from St. Nicholas."

Since Nast was born in Germany in 1840, he would only have been four at the time of publication of the New Mirror picture. Apparently the engraving was forgotten for a private collector.

The collector offered the print, along with some prints by Winslow Homer, a Nast contemporary, to the Fravessi-Lamont Card Co. of Springfield, N.J., about a decade ago. Shame On Directors

If the people are to survive this energy crisis and still keep their senses, the last thing we need in the community is town officials finding fault with some segment of the economy for not doing its share to meet the crisis.

Such is the case in which town directors adopted a directive finding fault with Manchester merchants for not taking more positive steps to save

If any of the directors are shopping Manchester in the evening, or any other time for that matter, they'll experience that some stores are so poorly lighted that in a great many cases the consumer can nearly make off with the store, and in some instances we are certain that's ac-

Also, for a great many merchants, December is the make-it-or-break-it month. Sure, they can take a lot of between now and Christmas, and then look forward to a permanent lock on Then we have another empty building for an eyesore, of which there are too many already, and nothing in the tax

Above all things, the energy crisis is a time for a spirit of cooperation. The directive of the town directors showed poor leadership and poor taste. We can also note that directors voiced no comments about the energy crisis

prior to the Nov. 6 election. Come on directors, the people deserve better from their elected officials. If the directors can waste valuable energy finding fault with the merchants in an evening session maybe they ought to consider meeting during the day. Come to think of it that might not be a bad energy-saving

Incentive Needed

Domestic search for more oil and gas must be one of the prime goals in our attempt to solve the energy crisis.

All of the attempts to curtail use of energy are but bandages on the wound. Healing will come only when supply can again be brought close to demand. However, we certainly ought to continue to be frugal in our use of finite supplies.

If the oil and gas companies are to find new fields, a large expenditure of funds will be required. And as every one recognizes oil and gas prospecting is one of the riskiest financial ventures in which you can engage.

It is so risky, in fact, that the major oil companies have been reluctant in the last decade to take the gamble in

Prospecting has been left in large part to the independent companies, or wildcatters. They took the risks and then if they were lucky enough to bring in a well the majors would buy their production, since they had marketing facilities which the independents did not.

The large oil companies and the independents are going to need large sums of money in the search for new fuel supplies.

A source of this capital would be attained by allowing oil and gas prices to rise to a normal market value, rather than restraining them by various governmental devices such as the Cost of Living Council.

profit tax on swollen oil company income, but with exemption being made for exploration costs on income before taxes, refinery construction, etc.

We might also make the point here that building new refineries, without new sources of crude oil, would be a very impractical venture for the oil companies. Only if new supply is available will refineries be needed.

We hope that the President, Secretary Schultz and Mr. Simon will continue to view rationing systems as a cure that may be worse than the disease. The last thing we need is a new bureaucracy making decisions for which they are poorly prepared.

A surtax on gasoline purchased beyond an arbitrary allocated amounts may reduce consumption. Punitive taxes up to 50 cents per gallon have been suggested.

But this would put the additional money right into the U.S. Treasury where it will be handy for appropriation for many purposes other than

On Friday morning, November 30, Love sat down with presidential advisers Melvin Laird and Gen. Alexander Haig. He got the word on creation of the new agency and the fact it would be headed by Deputy Treasury Secretary William E. Simon, with John C. Sawhill of the Office of Management and Budget as Simon's chief deputy.

Love was to be "senior adviser" to the President on energy

matters. But when he was shown a chart of the new setup, he could quickly see that his name wasn't on it at all. The announcement plan called for Love to stand up at a White House "energy briefing" Monday, December 3, and help explain the new agency almost as if he were its author.
But before that scheduled event was to occur, many things intervened. On the Friday Love got the word, there was a long afternoon cabinet-level meeting (attended by the President for 45 minutes), at which the new agency wasn't even discussed the president of the presi discussed. Love sat there puzzled.

Meanwhile, some time that afternoon, Laird high-tailed it up to Capitol Hill to tell the big story to Sen. Henry M. Jackson, big on energy, with a \$10 billion energy develop-

ment bill in the works.

Kozuch Pleads to Keep Night School Schedule

Concerned with the plight of the evening-adult education classes, if the energy crisis causes schools to close to evening activities, Ronald Kozuch, president of the Connecticut Association for Public School Adult Education, has made a plea to the superintendent of Vernon school to allow the winter session to open on schedule.
Kozuch, who is also director of the Vernon Adult Education Department, has asked Dr. Raymond Ramsdell not to put off classes to April when the spring semester starts. It is expected this recommendation will be given to the Board of Education's Energy Crisis Com-

mittee for consideration. Prior to the ruling made by Atty. General Robert Killian that each school district make its own decisions about meeting the energy crisis, Kozuch termed the policy statement of the state Board of Education, "the most detrimental decision ever to be made in the field of

The state board called for the closing of school buildings by 5:30 p.m. which would mean the adult evening school classes

Kozuch said the state board's policy relegated education to the lowest of priorities. "It completely neglected the plight of more than 800,000 undereducate dults in our state," he said. Kozuch said he understands the crisis and will do his part in keeping heat at a lower temperature and cutting down on

He said most of the evening school students seek to better their lot and that of their families by seeking educational opportunities in adult evening schools. He is especially concerned for those working to get their high school diplomas and the students in the adult basic education classes some learning to read adult. classes, some learning to read and write.

"How do we in adult education tell these taxpaying citizens that their educational needs must be postponed Kozuch questioned?" He also questioned how the many veterans who answered the call to meet their nation's needs can be told that their educational needs cannot be met because a state body maintained that they are among those who have low priority. In asking the local board not to close schools for an extended period during the winter, Kozuch said it should be the decision of the evening school students whether or not they wish to continue their education in a school building which might be several degrees lower than it was last

Kozuch, as president of the state group, is making his plea to all Boards of Education to keep adult education in mind when they make their decision about the energy

"If we are to turn our backs on taxpayers who want to learn in order to better their place in life, then we must admit that education is only important for the young, and that the dictum that one is never too old to learn is just so much sounding brass in the lexicons of the educational philosophers," Kozuch said.







Nixon Unwise In Tax Cut

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Rep. Wilbur D. Mills, D-Ark., chairman of the House-Senate committee which will examine President Nixon's tax returns, says he thinks Nixon was unwise to deduct \$576,000 for the gift of his vice presidential papers to the nation.

"I think that any public official who files a tax return has to be holier than thou," Mills said. "Very frankly, had I been the President's attorney I would have advised him not to take the deduction." Mills talked to reporters after

For the first 13 weeks this season the no-shows totaled 826,182. the NFL said Wednesday. The last three weeks, when the weather has been getting colder, have produced the largest totals, topped by 110,322 last weekend - but NFL officials expect even more no-shows this weekend to push the season's total near

t games that are sold out, are being proved correct.


Seven of this weekend's 13 games already are sold out. The noshow figure is expected to be big since the schedule includes such meaningless games as New England at Baltimore, San Diego at Kansas City and Green Bay at Chicago. The Atlanta Falcons, who had more than 10,000 no-shows last week, expect even more this week because many of their ticket-holders must drive long distances from throughout the South and aren't going to make the trip because of the gasoline shortage.


