Musical Gifts, Please

NEW YORK (UPI) — If there's a pear-shaped package for you under the Christmas tree, you may be in for a "plucky" Christmas. There will be thousands of fretted instruments given to amateur musicians of all ages this Yule. Frets include not only guitars, but banjos, ukuleles, mandolins and the almost forgotten dulcimer, currently making a comeback. The American Music Conference says Santa's helpers have a wide variety of instruments and accessories from which to make a selection. In addition to the full range of fretted strings, music stores carry a full complement of instruments and accessories. Musical stocking stuffers for the small fry include harmonicas, melodicas, rhythm sticks and claves. For the practical amateur the choices include recorder, lute, harpichord and lyre. Also the dulcimer, horns, and other old world instruments. There also are electronic instruments ranging in price from \$200 to about \$4,000. For the musician who already has an electric guitar, there are sustainers, wah-wah pedals, fuzzboxes, and a variety of other rhythm sounds. Prices range from about \$50 to \$600 for these accessories. Sheet music, a welcome gift for young and old musicians, starts at about \$2. Almost every song imaginable — from the newest pop hit — can be found in print. Along with sheet music, there are self-instruction aids for almost every instrument and such items as piano lights, metronomes, music stands, carrying cases, new soundpieces for brass and woodwind and new bows for violins and other strings. Graded sets of all, of course, are the keyboard — from upright pianos to baby grands and pipe organs to electronic marbles with three keyboards and synthesizer controls. Whatever musical gift is selected this Christmas, it will be a present the recipient will enjoy for many Christmases to come.

Crisis Called 'Blessing In Disguise'

Gasoline Consumption Drops 15 Per Cent

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Newly released figures indicate Americans are complying with administration appeals to cut their use of energy. Gasoline consumption dropped 15 per cent in the three weeks ending Nov. 30, and the combined consumption of gasoline, heating oil, diesel fuel and jet fuel was down 29 per cent, administration officials reported Thursday. The picture was not all rosy. Eastern Airlines announced Thursday that another 3,700 employees, more than 10 per cent of its work force, will be laid off early in 1974 because fuel shortages have cut the number of flights. The layoffs will include 460 pilots. Other Airlines—Piedmont, Allegheny and United—announced cuts of some flights to save fuel. In other developments: —President Nixon summoned his chief economic policy advisers to a White House meeting to discuss the impact of the energy crisis on the U.S. economy. —Prime Minister Edward Heath put Britain on a 23-day industrial work week Dec. 17 through Dec. 31 and a three-day week in January to cope with an even more acute fuel crisis. He said Britons face their "hardest Christmas" since World War II. —The House voted, 221-193, to deny fuel allocations for school busing intended to achieve racial desegregation. The provision was written into legislation giving the President broad emergency powers to deal with the energy crisis. An attempt was being mounted today to reverse the decision. —At least seven trucks, whose drivers refused to honor a call for a work stoppage, were hit by shotgun pellets in Ohio. In Michigan and Nevada drivers stopped their rigs on expressways, and state troopers quickly hauled them out of the way. But in most areas the trucks were moving. —President Nixon tonight lights the national Christmas tree, but the only light on it is a snowflake. Spotlights will illuminate it, but officials said the energy saving still will be 90 per cent. —The European Common Market, opening a two-day summit meeting in Copenhagen, Denmark, today will discuss U.S. Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger's call for a transatlantic crash program to meet the energy crisis, according to Belgian sources. —A group of 6,000 United Air Lines pilots are proposing to take a pay cut in lieu of the company's announced plan to furlough 300 pilots.

Energy Conservation Debate Continues

When the Manchester Board of Directors Tuesday night argued town merchants of "dragging their feet" on installing energy-saving measures, response from business circles was swift in coming. Thursday morning, at a meeting of The Mayor's Downtown Action Committee, downtown merchant Philip Harrison, as spokesman, insisted the directors "went off the deep end" in their criticism. He said the Tuesday night comments were "incomplete information." The task force was challenged to develop a program which would coordinate the total business and residential communities to accomplish an overall conservation program. "Point 1 of the plan was the development of a list of comprehensive recommendations which apply to each of the Chamber's business classifications within its membership. These recommendations were mailed to all members and made available to non-Chamber members. The recommendations followed national guidelines, such as the elimination of all secondary exterior business identification lighting, reducing of thermostat levels to the recommended 62 degrees for business offices and 65 degrees for retail stores and public shopping areas. Additionally, the program offered specific recommendations to retailers 1) the elimination of all lighting of store Christmas decorations, encouragement of car pools within store employees, dis-

Simon Opens Fuel Shortage Seminar

HARTFORD (UPI) — Federal energy chief William E. Simon said today the fuel crisis is "a blessing in disguise" because it awakened Americans to their dependency on petroleum in their daily lives. Speaking at a regional energy seminar Simon said America must now develop greater self-sufficiency so "we will never again be subject to economic blackmail of any nation. I personally believe we can get through the winter with a minimum amount of disruption." Simon, on his first regional visit since being appointed by President Nixon, said future efforts to develop future self-sufficiency are important because "we must make sure government and the people don't go back to sleep, because this problem is going to continue," he said. He said the administration does have "a very comprehensive energy policy and is determined to solve the energy problem."

The northeast is a special concern to the Nixon administration, he said, because of its unusually high dependence on oil to fuel its economy. New England must begin building oil refineries even though there will be a three and a half to four year lag in construction, he said. Simon, who arrived at the conference in an economy car, appeared at the request of Rep. Robert H. Steele, R-Conn., and the Connecticut Business and Industry Association. Following his opening remarks, a total of 50 representatives from the six New England states were scheduled to detail for Simon the extent of the region's energy problems. Charles H. Burkhardt, executive vice president of the New England Fuel Institute, said that the energy crisis is not only a problem of supply but also of the pricing policies of the Cost of Living Council. Tornadoes Rip South

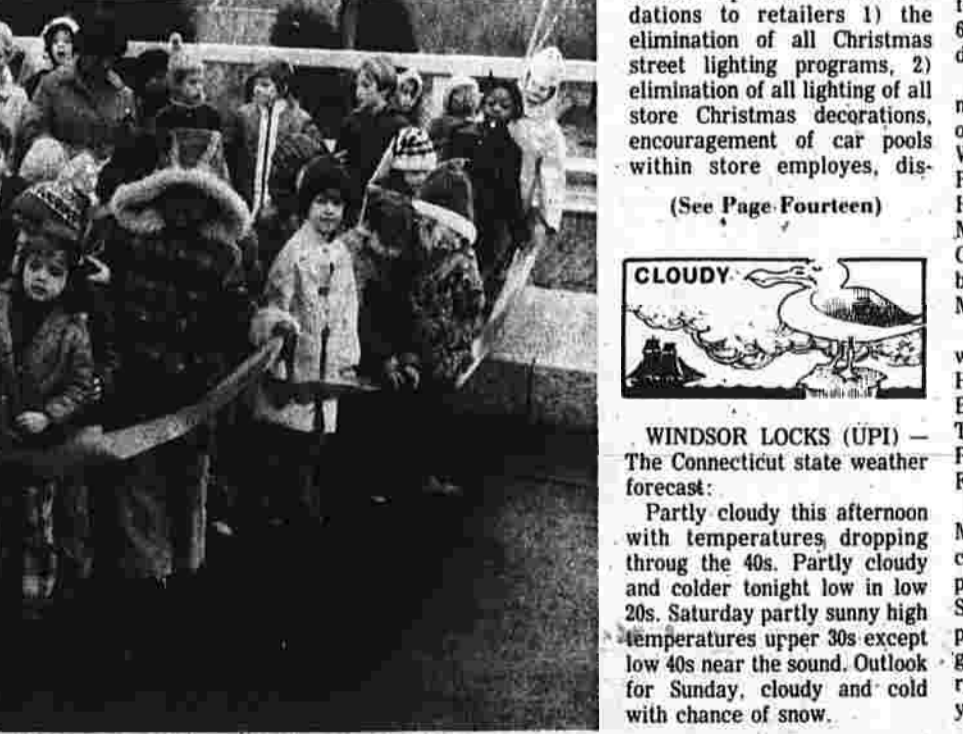
NINETY SIX S.C. (UPI) — Three people were killed and at least 47 injured Thursday as tornadoes ripped across three Southern states, causing millions of dollars in damage. Two women were killed when a twister cut a swath a mile long and nearly 100 feet wide through this rural area. It struck the Ninety Six Manufacturing Co., destroying a cloth separating building where they worked. A 15-month-old boy, Brandon J. Farr, died in an overturned mobile home in Newberry County, S.C. Twenty-six persons were injured in a tornado that struck Gainesville, Ga., shortly after noon. At least 44 houses were destroyed along with two trailer parks, two downtown businesses and a church. The workers killed at the Ninety Six Manufacturing Co. were identified as Charity Griffin and Ozala Thomas, both of Ninety Six. The plant was destroyed by the twister. The basketball team at Mid Carolina High School in nearby Prosperity narrowly escaped injury when the gym roof was blown off.

UPPSALA, Sweden (UPI) — The seismological institute today registered a strong underground explosion in the Semipalatinsk area of Soviet Siberia, an institute spokesman said. She said the explosion took place at 8:47 a.m. (2:47 a.m. EST) and amounted to 2.7 on the open-end Richter scale.

Case Against Policeman Dismissed

Circuit Court 12 Judge Frank Mouchon Thursday dismissed a fourth-degree larceny charge which was facing Manchester Policeman Robin G. Andrews, 27, of 22 Skinner Rd. Judge Mouchon, sitting in East Hartford, ordered dismissal of the case after he last week declared a mistrial in the case, because a jury was undecided after trial. Andrews, a policeman since February 1969, was arrested June 16 on the charge stemming from an alleged theft of \$18 cash from the scene of a May 5 auto accident which he was investigating. When he was arrested, Andrews was immediately suspended from the police department, pending disposition of the case. Manchester Police Chief James Reardon today declined to comment on the case, but sources within the police department indicated that Reardon has reinstated Andrews but placed him on leave-absence for 40 days. Sources also said a civil lawsuit, filed by Andrews against the police department, is still pending in Hartford County Superior Court. Details of the civil case weren't available today. Andrews is being represented by Atty. Paul Flynn of New Haven, counsel for Council 15 of the Connecticut Association of Police Unions.

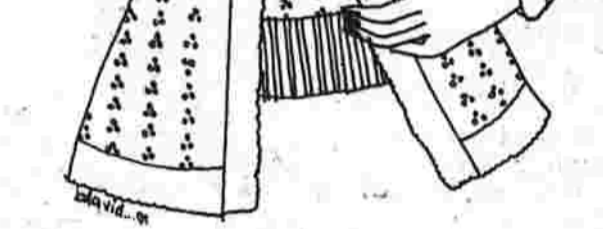

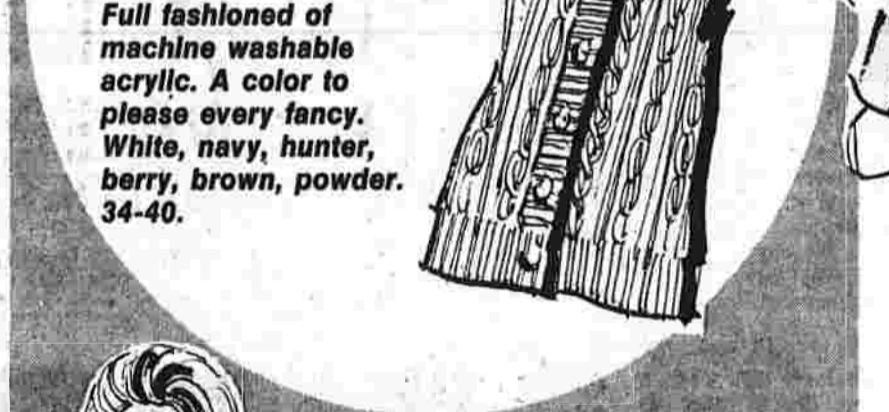

Since every time we get in our car we can be reasonably sure that frustrations will come along, it probably is prudent not to carry a loaded gun on the seat, human nature being such a frail thing.

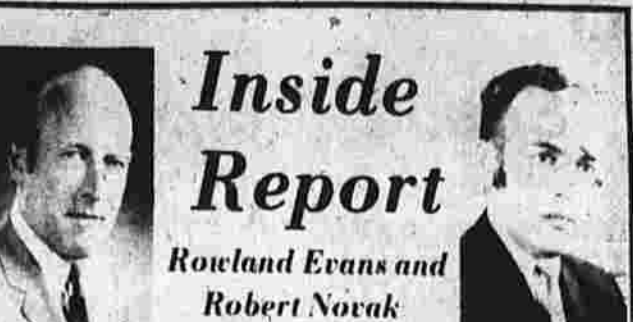
No Smoking

Dear member of the Coventry Board of Education: In an article in the Dec. 12 issue of the Hartford Courant, it was stated that the Coventry Board of Education has paved the way for the establishment of student smoking areas at the high school.

This is one problem which could easily be solved. It is not a complex problem and shouldn't be made into one. Strict enforcement of rules, with appropriate, consistent, fair and prompt disciplinary action will solve the problem. One of the by-products of our highly technical society is the inability of people to rely on their own instincts. We've become so addicted to "professional opinions" and technical studies that we no longer trust ourselves to make a sensible decision on the merits of our own judgment and common sense.

It is indeed unfortunate that some parents fall into categories in which they do not care if their children smoke, or due to other circumstances, can no longer control the actions of their children. Neither of these categories, however, is suitable to explain the actions of a Board of Education which would sanction an action in direct and obvious conflict with established precedent.

It is an interesting and unsettling commentary on our society that the whole idea of Coventry, which is a direct contradiction with the following excerpt from the Wall Street Journal from as long ago as July 28, 1972. "By building a new community in the suburbs simultaneously with the reconstruction of the inner city, the strategy seeks to reward the suburbs economically for accepting some of the city's poor minorities."

Republican Pessimism

LOS ANGELES - The oppressive pessimism now enveloping California Republicans, which could threaten party pressure for the resignation of President Nixon, is underlined by two new backstage changes.

Change No. 1: One of the former presidential counselor Robert Finch's closest advisers who previously urged him to run for either Governor or Senator next year now says Finch should sit out 1974. Finch inclines to agree. Finch inclines to agree. Finch inclines to agree.

Change No. 2: Popular State Atty. Gen. Evelle Younger only weeks ago seemed sure to run for Governor, with excellent chances of winning the Republican nomination. No longer. He has been adding up pluses and minuses for 1974 and now comes out with many more minuses. Unless a meeting between Younger and the party's leadership this week develops otherwise, he is apt to announce for re-election as attorney general before year's end.

Change No. 3: The principal reason for Younger's change of heart is financial. With what little Republican money still available dried up by Gov. Reagan's unsuccessful campaign for his state tax-limit proposal, Younger wonders whether any Republican can finance a campaign for Governor. But this, too, is tied to Watergate. Younger had been relying on Mr. Nixon's California contributors, who now want out of politics after the disillusionment of Watergate.

Change No. 4: The principal reason for Younger's change of heart is financial. With what little Republican money still available dried up by Gov. Reagan's unsuccessful campaign for his state tax-limit proposal, Younger wonders whether any Republican can finance a campaign for Governor. But this, too, is tied to Watergate. Younger had been relying on Mr. Nixon's California contributors, who now want out of politics after the disillusionment of Watergate.

Puppeteer is MHS Grad

With hands full of puppets and cross-bars that are finger triggered, Russ Metheny brings to life a host of puppets, cloth, styrofoam, and something resembling papier-mache.



Metheny, formerly of Manchester, is a puppeteer with the Smithsonian Resident Puppet Theatre in Washington, D.C. He is presently on tour with the touring theater and will appear in a Christmas Holiday Festival Saturday at Wadsworth Athenaeum in Hartford. "The Marvelous Land of Oz" will feature the rod puppets in two showings at 11:30 a.m. and 2:30 p.m.

The history of rod puppets goes back to B.C. when puppets were used in the Far East as part of religious and ceremonial festivals. Metheny said there were no human actors there. Because of the dramatization of concerned deities and people of high position, it was considered sacrilegious for a human to personate those persons, said Metheny.

A puppeteer was considered almost as important as the priests of the day because he had to understand the characters of the individuals he was impersonating through the puppets, explained Metheny. Puppets, like cartoons, emphasize, exaggerate, or modify human features and movement, he said.

Unlike marionettes which are operated with strings from above the stage, rod puppets are operated from below a shelf-like stage. The puppeteers sit on low stools with casters which permit them to move easily back and forth on the stage with their puppets, Metheny said on occasion he has tangled with other puppeteers because of his long legs which seem to be forever getting in the way.

After learning the script, which is either spoken live or taped, the puppeteer develops the personality of the puppet through the movements he will give it. A puppeteer uses his body as well as his arms in moving his puppet. Balance is extremely important, Metheny said, because the weight of the puppet changes as he is tipped from an upright position to an angular position.

A puppet is conceived on paper in a rough sketch. From the drawing board, the puppet is put together with materials and shapes that will best represent the desired character, and finally costumed. The head, first molded from clay, is covered with a fabric impregnated with plastic, then "cured" for 24 hours. A process of sanding, modeling, sanding, sanding, and more

painting completes the head and readies it for the required head covering. The costumes are cut directly on the puppet. Metheny compares manipulating a puppet to a dance. "It's a rhythmic kind of thing," he says.

A graduate of Manchester High School and the Hartford Art School, University of Hartford, Metheny joined the Smithsonian Puppet Theatre about two years ago as a challenge. His dream is to create something architectural, perhaps the "perfect" theater.

He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Theodore E. Metheny of 18 Ardmore Rd.

Thermal Pollution Poses Future Flood Danger

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—The earth's polar ice caps could start melting from thermal pollution a century from now and eventually flood New York and London, a group of scientists has been told.

In about 100 years, the melted ice caps would have released enough water to raise sea levels 200 feet, flooding 10 per cent of the earth's land surface and many major cities.

"The scientific danger signals are rising and the entire world will be alarmed over this problem 100 years from now," Howard A. Wilcox, a physicist and U.S. Navy consultant told the American Geophysical Union.

Because said all heat produced by man does not escape into outer space, if man continues to increase energy consumption at four per cent per year, he said, the mean global temperature a century from now will have increased one half degree Fahrenheit.

A half degree may not seem much, he said, but it is enough to start a self-accelerating process of melting. As a polar cap melts, the earth absorbs more solar heat and the cap melts faster, he said.

Unless governments cooperate in facing the thermal pollution problem, Wilcox said, the melting of the polar caps would result in catastrophe.

Given the present rate of energy use increase, Wilcox said that after two centuries water at the surface level of tropical seas would be boiling.

Wilcox distinguished between two types of energy—solar and thermal pollution. He said thermal pollution energy comes from fossil fuel, nuclear and geothermal sources.

Wilcox, an analysis was presented at the geophysicists' annual convention which has been held there for several years.

In St. Louis, man's activities keep the air five degrees warmer than in surrounding areas and in Chicago 3.5 degrees warmer, said Robert Jaske, a Battelle Memorial Foundation engineer.

He said the extra temperature creates "thermal islands" with more cloudiness, more rain and twice as much fog.

Killian Will Address Democrats Wednesday

State Atty. Gen. Robert K. Killian will speak in Manchester Wednesday at 8 p.m. in the Municipal Building Hearing Room.

Killian, an unannounced candidate for the Democratic nomination for governor, will address an open meeting of the Manchester Democratic Town Committee.

In April, the town committee will begin the process of choosing delegates to state, Congressional District, Senatorial District and Assembly District conventions.

President's energy office were "catching on."

Simon, commenting on his agency's error in reporting a 25 percent cutback in gasoline production rather than a 5 percent drop, said he doesn't think his credibility will hinge on the mistake.

"One reporter said, don't you believe your credibility has been damaged on the percentage change," he said. "I told him, my goodness, if the shift in the refinery percentage is going to damage my credibility, then I will be in deep trouble," Simon said.

Simon asked gas industry representatives whether the gas lamps which burn outside many homes couldn't be turned off. He was told by Julian L. Julian Gaisert, president of the Vermont Gas System, Inc., "They can be turned off with the flick of a switch."

"They can? Then why don't you turn it. Every little bit helps, but that isn't a little bit. That's a lot," Simons said.

Gaisert said there is no shortage of natural gas in Vermont and he doesn't foresee any.

Robert H. Willis, chairman of the Connecticut Natural Gas Corp., said natural gas suppliers have encouraged their customers "to turn off gas

The OLD CODGER'S CODGITATIONS

Some time ago The Herald carried articles about John Fitch the inventor of the steam boat. It told that he had served his apprenticeship to Benjamin Cheney, Manchester clockmaker.

Previously O.C. had read that Timothy Cheney was a clockmaker, and previous to that he had read that Seth Cheney had a clockshop below the falls near the Center Spring where Center Spring Park is now.

O.C. wonders if these were three Cheney clockmakers, and who had the shop at the spring. Also, an item once said the remains of his dam can still be seen there. O.C. fails to identify it. There is some masonry but it is the wall to retain the high Main St. fill which of course was not there in the clockshop days.

It was an ideal location to develop a pretty steep hill before the big fill was made. O.C. has an old diary kept by an early master of Manchester Lodge of Masons. It tells of the Masons carrying their big rug down to the brook to wash it.

In 1810, there was a Professor Cowp who lectured on "Modern Machine Shop equipment, Its Installation and Maintenance," at the Pratt Institute in Brooklyn, N.Y. Of course, what was modern then is obsolete—even crude and antique now. But even so at that time he extolled what he had by comparing it with the equipment our forebears had to use. He mentioned John Fitch's lathe.

Now of course Professor Cowp could not have known John Fitch in person, though he appeared to be at least 60 years old with large white beard. Still it would only require one man living between them to tell Cowp of his experience with Fitch.

He said Fitch's lathe had a cross slide for the tool holder on the carriage but no longitudinal feed mechanism, so it was necessary for the apprentice to stand astraddle the ways and force the carriage along with a crow-bar meshed consecutively in the teeth of a rack below the ways. The best he could bore a cylinder was with a one-eighth inch taper.

School Lifts Smoking Ban

The Board of Education at its meeting Thursday night deleted its no smoking policy which left the way clear for establishment of a smoking area at the high school on a temporary basis.

Smoking privileges would be limited to students in Grade 10, 11 and 12. In a letter read to the board from Dr. Robert Bowen, director of health, Bowen said that that for the board to ignore or discount the weight of evidence that indicates cigarette smoking in relationship to carcinoma of the lung, emphysema chronic pulmonary insufficiency, bronchitis, other respiratory diseases and cardiac disease would be a callous decision by persons presumably concerned with all aspects of the learning process.

He went on to say that "To embark on a course of encouragement of smoking, and that is basically what you will be doing regardless of how you rationalize, would at best be classified as non-feasible."

In another letter Mrs. Francis Funk wrote that she couldn't understand "How any group that professes to be acting on behalf of the townspeople, and more importantly, in behalf of the interests of young people of our community, can actually give their approval to smoking."

The board members voting in favor of changing the no smoking policy. Joan Lewis, Robert Walsh, Fran Morrone, Tony Felice, Dick Ashley, stated that they were not approving of smoking, but that it was being done and causing a hardship on the non-smokers in the school. Tom Hill and Sue Brainard voted against rescinding the no smoking policy.

Dr. Donald Hardy again went on record as being opposed to establishing a smoking area. A committee composed of Mr. Donald Niccolletti, Joan Lewis, Tony Felice, and a non-smoking teacher and a smoking teacher, and two non-smoking students and two smoking students was formed to submit regulations and times for the proposed smoking area. This committee is to report back to the board.

Fuel Price Rises
Dr. Hardy reported that the price of fuel for the school system has gone from 14 cents a gallon to 21 cents in the past six months. He said that this could cause a deficit of up to \$80,000 in the fuel account.

of the misunderstanding which has arisen as a result of those remarks. "I first realized that I had visited a few of the large stores in the Parkade area on Saturday and found the temperature in those stores unnecessarily warm, and that there had been no cut-back in overhead lighting. I went on to point out that in the meetings Director Zinsner and I had had with community officials on the energy crisis, the Chamber of Commerce reported that it was doing a great deal of planning and corresponding but had selected Jan. 1 to begin most of its energy saving programs.

"I recognized that the Christmas season is an extremely important period for the retail merchant and that he has many things on his mind about the fuel shortage. I do not advocate shorter store hours during the Christmas season, however, I believe that it is imperative that businessmen cut back on heat and light during store hours, and eliminate any unnecessary lighting after store hours. This is no more than has been asked of everyone else. The response from business has been inadequate thus far.

"Finally, the only resolution I offered on Tuesday night was to commend three individuals for their work on the 'Save Our Mountain' effort. This resolution was tabled by the majority. I did, however, ask that an item be included on the Jan. 8 agenda to consider controlling energy consumption by business development of an overall citizens plan for energy conservation. Walter S. Kuczek, chairman of the Chamber's goal of the 'Come Home to Save Our Challenge of Tomorrow,' has commended the activities of this group.

"I am the only tree farmer in Manchester, probably the smallest one in the state, and the most enthusiastic," said Leslie Buckland. We were looking around his 40-acre farm on Hilltown Rd. where a green-and-white Tree Farm sign was recently put up at the entrance to the driveway.

Constant Flow In the woods and upstream from the Lily pond, Mr. Buckland has had a bulldozer brought in to construct an earthen dam across the gully through which the brook flows. It replaces an old dam made of stone which had fallen apart.

He has planted, he estimates now, a total of 5,000 trees all obtained from the State Forest Nursery in Volantown. When one small tree, for some reason, fails to survive, he replaces it so that he will have woodlots without any "skips."

Selective Cutting The forester counted 351 trees, some of species other than red oak, which he said should be cut. The large oaks, he said, would make valuable saw logs now, whereas if they were left to grow only a few more years they would start to deteriorate. He chose the trees.
