(Herald Reporter) Elimination of highway ighting on Interstate 84 in Manchester will mean annual savings of more that \$13,000, as well as savings in electricity

The 212 lights on the 7.2-mile stretch of expressway through Manchester were turned off two weeks ago to save energy. The electricity savings are estimated by the DOT at about 50,000 kilowatt hours per month, which usually costs the state about \$1,100 per month. The lights on I-84 in Manchester, part of the first phase of the DOT's energysaving program, were turned off at the same time as lights on the Willimantic bypass section of I-84 and on segments of I-91 north of Hartford, Rt. 72, and

DOT Commissioner Joseph Burns, who was directed by Gov. Thomas Meskill to in vestigate electricity-saving methods, said the Manchester I-84 segment was darkened after a study showed that the unconnected highway link had "good geometry and light traf-

Burns said DOT engineers studied the possibility of only contributing to eye fatigue.

mutterings about the need to "get rid of the bottlenecks" and other prejudicial expressions. Hardly anyone appreciates the contributions that bottlenecks have made to the betterment of America. Those who do recognize the important role that bottlenecks play are hesitant to voice their sentiments lest they be branded as
