





Agnew Pleas To Continue As Lawyer

Appearing in a jammed court room to fight a request for disciplinary action by the Maryland Bar Association, Agnew pleaded for the court "not to strip me of my means of livelihood but to find some unitable suspension away from

"I can resume a useful place In the practice of law after my suspension," Agnew said, "The practice of law means quite a lot to me. I want to return at some later date to bring credit to my practice and to the courts."

The charges that Agnew solicited and received kick-backs from state contractors were raised again in the bar association's petition. Agnew resigned in disgrace Oct. 10 after pleading no contest in U.S. District Court to a single charge of income tax evasion. Judge Walter H. Holfman fined him \$10,000 and placed him on three years' probation.

The special three-judge panel holding the hearing will recommend any disciplinary action to the Maryland Court of Appeals, final arbiter in the case. They took the case under devicement took the case under advisemen and promised a decision as soon as possible.

School Bus Safety

While town school boards throughout Connecticut are reviewing bus routes to conserve gasoline, they should also consider another important aspect of school transportation

In the past several weeks there has been some attention directed toward bus construction from a safety standpoint, better enforcement of traffic laws concerning motorists behind or approaching school buses loading or discharging students, driver qualifications and physical fitness.

It appears from most reports, the area in which there is the greatest need immediately, is driver qualification and physical fitness.

It was only the quick thinking of a student from Cheney Tech which averted a possible disaster when the driver was stricken with a heart attack. This would not have been the case if the bus had been transporting elementary school youngsters.

We think the General Assembly which has been getting a lot of input on bus safety improvements, should consider some basic statewide requirements for drivers. These should include some provision for a age to insure as much as is humanly possible any recurence of the Manchester bus incident.

As we understand it now, the standards for physical fitness are pretty much left in the hands of the private bus contractor and his insurer. We recognize there will be an additional cost for a more thorough physical examination but most states require this and in the overall cost of bus operations it is relatively minor.

Driver qualifications, we think, should be reviewed for in the case of transporting half-a-score or more active youngsters there are emotional stresses which some drivers, regardless of physical skill, may not be able to cope with and still give the 100 per cent concentration on driving that they should.

The state can and should set guidelines for school boards and private bus contractors to follow. It might even consider incentives to have them go beyond such minimal

When we think of the cumulative hours many of our future citizens have to put in on our school buses, such safeguards seem only logical and

New Absentee Ballot Scandal

More than a decade has gone by since the last absentee ballot scandals in New Haven. Those, together with strong pressure, mainly from the press of Connecticut, resulted in a major reform of the absentee ballot

Unfortunately, as rigid as they seemed at the time, they are apparently not adequate. Or perhaps what is more accurate is that the laws are adequate, but election officials are not fulfilling their obligations. In the "good old days" when many

an election was won by those who could steal the most votes, party hacks walked around with a handful of absentee ballots as well as the applications. They had an application filled out and immediately handed the voter the ballot. Then they took the ballot, with the promise that they would have the envelope notarized and would mail it to save the voter the cost. All too often the ballot filled in by the voter and the one case in his name were drastically different. No one could ever prove a change had been made.

Notaries falsely declared they personally witnessed the voter's signature when in actual practice, hundreds of ballots were notorized in party headquarters with no voters in

TFHE LAW WAS CHANGED AFTER A LONG CAMPAIGN. The political agent, who could walk around with official ballots, was eliminated. The need for a notarized signature was eliminated, thereby getting rid of the party hacks who could change votes. Voters were merely asked to sign application forms and the ballot envelopes under penalties of perjury.

As regards the energy crisis, and the resulting cutback in fuel, power and a large assortment of consumer products, the United States is that 200-pound man. 



At which point, beginning quietly with "Honky Chateau", Elton came back with a vengenance. His last album, "Don't Shoot Me, I'm only the Piano Player," was excellent in a coastain

Elton's real name is Reg Dwight. He was born in Middlesex County, England in 1947 and started playing plano at age 3. He studied at the Royal Academy of Music until his mother made the error of letting him hear some Bill Haley and Elvis Presley records. From than on, his soul belonged to rock 'n' roll. Reg was still learning such delicate arts as playing the plano with his feet when he met Bernie Taupin through a newspaper ad, and Elton John was born—as a collaboration, not an individual. Bernie writes the words, Reg writes the music—and Elton gets up on stage in his outrageous costumes to boogle for the people.

"Goodbye Yellow Bric" Road" opens with the kind of big production instrumental number ("Funeral for a Friend") that runs the risk of seeming laughably pretentious: synthesizers and strings behind soaring guitars and Elton's familiar heavily chorded plano. But it works, primarily because of a superbarrangement and mix, and because it works, the entire album gets a powerful boost right from the start.

The most impressive thing about this album is not the individual tunes so much as the consistency of excellence in the writing, playing and production. As can be expected from Elton John, the songs convey a wide variety of

songs convey a wide variety of moods, but they dovetall beautifully with one another and the result is a true rarity: a double album with absolutely no filler material. It's good to the last drop the last drop.

Though I have my personal favorites ("Love Lies Bleeding," "Your Sister Can't Twist"), there is really an

amazing consistency of quality in this album.



By the 5th Century in France people were gathering France people were gathering in the village squares to sing some of the same Yule favorites we know today, But the musical accompaniment came from a lute or lyre, two nstruments very popular a Among the carols whose tunes or words were sung then, says the American Music Conference (AMC), was one we know today as "The Twelve Days of Christmas."

The 5th Century version of this carol consisted of a this carol consisted of a dialogue between a druid and a scholar. Early Christian missionaries adapted the song to include religious subjects: One God; Two Testaments; Three patriarchs; Four Evangelists; Five Books of Moses; Six Water Vessels at Cana; Seven Sacraments; Eight Beatitudes; Nine Degrees of Angels; Ten Commandments; Eleven Stars that appeared to Joseph; and Twelve Apostles. In Sweden it is still customary to herald in the customary to herald in the Christmas season by playing the Advent, hymn on trumpets, trombones and kettledrums. This tradition dates back to the second half of the 7th Century.

By the 16th Century. By the 16th Century, European nobility were no longer in the habit of singing their own carols. However, the y'didempto also called waits—to play Christmas songs outside the chambers of members of the family. These minstrels normally performed on the shawm, an early oboe. In Italy, at about the same time, a tradition developed for shepherds to come down from the mountains at Christmas time and go through the towns in groups of three.

They paused before sacred images to play the novena on clarinet-like pipes and rude bagpipes. Today, often accompanied by a drummer, shepherds still go from house to house collecting money or food to take back to the hills on Christmas eve.
