



Two Suggestions

One of the by-products of any disaster such as the recent ice storm is criticism and tons of suggestions as to what might be done to avert the impact of such events on our personal lives and pocketbooks in the future.

We are still too close to the event to rationally assess the validity of some of the criticism which has been voiced. Perhaps when things are more normal, a more constructive evaluation can be made.

However, we have heard several ideas which we think the proper agencies could begin pondering now.

One would be looking at our building

codes with the idea of establishing mandatory and simple devices in homes to permit the average homeowner to drain his water system to prevent pipes from freezing. Of particular concern should be hot water heating systems. We think a standard procedure in all housing to do this is possible and by keeping it simple, it should not be too difficult for the non-plumber or non-electrician homeowner, to protect his home. One of the most frequent complaints we heard was that the homeowner did not know how to do this or where drain plugs were located in his home.

home against freezing is the need for some specific guidance to reasonably wait before acting to shut off water and drain the pipes."

It is a real agony to have an outage of uncertain length with only vague assurances that it will be restored by "noon" or "nightfall" but without explicit guarantees. We think the men in the construc-

tion business have enough know-how so that they could tell homeowners, based on the type of structure, insulation, the water system, etc., how many hours they can expect heat retention in the home to protect the pipes. Such a guide to the homeowner could enable him to avoid acting too soon if power is restored after only a few hours or too late if the outage exceeds the limits of his particular

These are but two of the ideas we have heard which we think are worthy We do not know at this time what

the storm will cost Manchester area residents in terms of frozen water pipes and resultant water damage. We believe these suggestions, if implemented, would enable the omeowner to know how and when to drain his home water supply and thus

Laird's Advice

Melvin Laird, President's chief domestic adviser, who has resigned, has given very wise advice, we believe, on the subject of the proposed impeachment of the President.

Laird, it can be assumed, is speaking from deep conviction and for the well-being of the United States. With his background of six terms in the Congress from Wisconsin, it is probably that he is expressing the views of many members of Congress with whom he has maintained close

He asks that the threat of impeachment be followed through with summary dispatch or removed. It is his suggestion that a 60 day time limit be set for a vote to come before the House of Representatives either to impeach or to drop the proceedings.

Representative Robert McRoy, Illinois, has also spoken in accord with Mr. Laird. He, too urges action soon by the House, or "get off the President's back."

The same sentiment was voiced earlier by veteran Sen. George Aiken

Chairman Peter W. Rodino (D-N.J.) of the House Judiciary Committee, which is investigating the charges which might lead to impeachment proceedings, is talking of action in April, more than 90 days off.

Constitutionally impeachment charges originate on the House with a trial to be held before the Senate, if the House takes affirmative action.

In effect the House would bring in an indictment and the upper body of the Congress would serve in a judicial

urious to the nation. The fact that the House of Representatives is even investigating bringing of impeachment charges casts a shadow on the Presidency which would be harmful

But, in these troubled times of great domestic crisis, due to the energy shortage, and grave international problems, undue delay leaves the President hanging in mid-air.

Internationally Dr. Henry Kissinger is carrying our burden almost on his own authority. He is placed in the position where he is not doing the President's bidding, but is acting with the President's approbation.

Foreign nations have even gone to the extreme of making discreet inquiries of Vice President Gerald Ford about Dr. Kissinger's continuing should Ford succeed to the office of the President.

No President can act with the full authority of his office with a House committee publicly considering impeachment charges.

Bullets Realize Coach Knows Best In Comeback Victory over Knicks

NEW YORK (UPI) — K.C. Jones, former defensive standout with the Boston Celtics and now coach of the Capital Bullets, understands the true nature of basketball. Jones' own players think they know what's going on on the court, but the coach knows best. Mike Riordan, for example, explained in cogent detail last night's 102-100 comeback victory over the New York Knicks after a 19-point first half deficit.

"We were patient," said Riordan, an ex-Knick. "We stacked our offense and cleared the way for our hot shooters. We started to do that toward the end of the first half when they were blowing us off the court. In the second half, it was mostly one-on-one basketball for us. We went

to our big guns, Chenier, Clark and Hayes." Riordan felt his explanation was plainly supported by the boxscore which showed Phil Chenier and Elvin Hayes with 4 points apiece and Archie Clark with 28. Clark had his own thoughts on the incredible turn-







In the 19th Century men could drill surface of the earth. Development of the rotary drilling bit by Hughes Tool Co. of Houston in 1909 made it possible to dig much deeper and faster. are only the tip of the free world drilling equipment iceberg that has generated sales of billions a year. Analysts who watch the petroleum industry say oil and gas drilling activity in the United States, which declined on a footage basis by 3.5, per cent a year from 1956 to 1971, increased by 6 per cent in each of the next two years. They expect it to jump 12 per cent a year in the near term. In spite of a decline in petroleum wells drilled in the

Mail That Offends Three years ago, Congress

Anyone so inclined coul place his or her name on a sp cial list to be kept by the Pos Office. Sending such ads to those on the list was made a crime. By now, with thousands names on the list, enough tim has gone by for this law to be tested and clarified in the courts. To begin with, the basic idea has been held constitutional, even though it involves some limitation on the freedom of the

press. The Supreme Court has

To hold otherwise, added the Court, "would make hardly more sense than to say that a televidial to cut off an offensive boring communication." Publishers also complained the expense of having periodi-cally to "cleanse" their mailing lists. But a federal court decided, in another ruling, that this was mately impose,
"(The) cost of complying with the statute," said the court, "is less than one cent per name, fraction of the cost of postage, and is not unduly burdensome.

What about the risk that penalties will be imposed on the innocent, for mailings sent by mistake? One worried printer raised that point in court, saying that computer errors might subject him to punishment unfairly. However, the court said the statute would simply not apply in those circumstances. There would be no criminal offense, the court observed, when there was no criminal intent.







A Report to Gustomers on the Ice Storm

Last week's devastating ice storm was the worst in recent Connecticut history. Now, with electric service restored to the one-quarter of a million customers affected, we want you to know how we went about doing what had to be done, and why we did it that way.

MONDAY, DECEMBER 17

By early morning, the storm which had moved in Sunday night was building a heavy layer of ice on trees and lines. Limbs and trees were crashing through electric lines, bringing down poles and leaving thousands of customers without power.

Efforts were made immediately to obtain all available additional line crews and tree trimmers from other utilities and contractors to supplement the efforts of the 995 linemen and 250 tree trimmers normally available to handle our daily work load. They began arriving in Connecticut within hours.

In addition, CL&P, HELCO and Northeast Utilities engineers technicians and other support personnel backed up the linemen's efforts throughout the state, dispatching crews, inspecting lines for service breaks, guiding crews from out-of-state, delivering supplies and doing a multitude

Even as they worked, damage grew increasingly worse in most areas of Connecticut.

By six o'clock in the evening, this was our position:

Six p.m., Monday, December 17 **Customers Without Electricity: 253,125**

Crews continued to work around the clock. At midnight, it looked like this:

> Midnight, Monday, December 17 **Customers Without Electricity: 181,151**

TUESDAY, DECEMBER 18

Despite continued freezing weather, work went on without interruption. Linemen from Michigan and Pennsylvania arrived by plane to assist our own workers and linemen and tree trimmers who came from New England, New York, New Jersey, Delaware, Maryland and Virginia. More than 7,000 utility people and outside contractors were aided by the Connecticut National Guard, state and town workers.

Through Tuesday night, service was restored to thousands of additional customers.

The situation at midnight:

Midnight, Tuesday, December 18 **Customers Without Electricity: 94,685**

What were our priorities as we worked to restore service?

To the extent possible, we first worked to restore electricity to hospitals, police stations and other vital public services. Then line crews began clearing broken main distribution lines of trees and limbs so that electricity would be available to the large blocks of customers supplied by these lines. Once the main lines were back in service, we were able to concentrate on neighborhoods and individual homes still out of service.

WEDNESDAY, DECEMBER 19

The efforts of repair crews were reflected in continued Six p.m., Wednesday, December 19

THURSDAY, DECEMBER 20

By early morning, with service restored to the majority of customers whose homes had been without electricity, clean-up efforts were set back by the arrival of still another storm, which presented new problems in the form of heavy rain, and melting ice falling from trees. Trees which had been bent under a load of ice caused new breaks in wires as they snapped up, leaving additional customers without power. Despite this, progress on Thursday was substantial.

The rain continued into Friday, hampering restoration work By midnight, 13,000 more customers had been connected and work was concentrated largely in severely damaged areas. The situation at midnight:

SATURDAY, DECEMBER 22

Clean-up work continued into the weekend, with efforts directed primarily toward restoration of neighborhoods and individual homes.

By midnight Saturday, this was the picture:

By the end of the weekend, service had been restored to virtually every customer. The worst is over, but we still have weeks of hard work ahead in making permanent repairs.

We are well aware of the very real hardships our customers faced during this past week - especially those who remained without electric service for a prolonged period - and we thank you for the patience and understanding you showed as Connecticut recovered from the worst ice storm in recent times.

We extend our sincere thanks to the Connecticut National Guard, Civil Defense and other state agencies, town personnel and all others who took part in the restoration effort. Finally, we are especially grateful to the employees of our companies for their skilled and loyal efforts under difficult conditions.
