Free Market vs. Controls

The president of the Connecticut Business and Industry Assn. has asked for an end to wage and price controls and return to the free market.

He cited the state's plastics industry as being particularly hard hit by controls and forecast that nearly one-third of its 18,000 employes could be out of work unless wage and price controls end. 🤲

We agree in principle that a free market is desirable and, if there had actually been a true free market in operation, wage and price controls may not have become necessary.

The crux of the problem is that weare now finding out what we should have known ever since our great experiments of the 1930s that politics and economics, like oil and water. don't mix very well.

As consumers we want the best at the lowest possible price.

In essential items such as food, clothing, shelter and transportation, we are conditioned to expecting these to remain stable in price and abundant in availability.

Thus when someone suggests a free market, the politicos immediately cite the impact of a pice rise that can be expected on articles in high demand. but limited supply. They plead the case of the poor and those on fixed incomes and not without some justifica-

But the fact remains that in the case of the great beef crisis last year. prices begin to decline after an initial jump when controls were dropped. The need for a free market and the

tion controls in World War II: presidential threats such as faced the steel industry under John F. Kennedy and the current series of phases; it now needs to be weaned away from We believe that if such a weaning is to be accomplished it will require tremendous political courage in

government and in business. Business, while expounding free market enterprise, has long been prone to seek out protection measures from government, be it tariffs; the now-notorious oil import quotas, or tax incentives, to modernize and update production facilities which would have never become antiquated in a free market climate.

While we agree with the state's business leaders that wage and price controls should end, we would like also to hear from them on how this return can be implemented without major social and economic upheaval. We fear that while they are asking the politicos to have the couragé to drop such controls, and the consumers the fortitude to make such a traumatic transition, business and industry may not have enough of either.

We would like to see some complete proposals from business and industry on how they would exercise their responsibilities in a free market. After all they had it once and blew it.

To some of those who are selfemployed it may be a time when you get almost panicky as you try to remember if you sent your friendly, neighborhood banker a Christmas

But the amazing thing is that the multitude of small taxpayers share a common attitude, an attitude directed more on how we can pay up our share of the federal taxes rather than how we can get out of it through loopholes in the law, etc.

While public attention gets focused on tax evaders from time to time, it is the big income earners, who get the headlines. Now this is not to say the little guys aren't above cheating but for the most part they are honest and if they err, audits clearly indicate that it is in favor of the government. It would appear that the little guy has a strong sense of ethics that transcends legalities...

He may grouse about taxes, he may really scream about how his tax money is misused or illused, but when it is all over he quietly pays without the Internal Revenue pounding at his

So as we prepare to gird ourselves for the annual battle with Form 1040. let's not concern ourselves with the tax cheaters, big or small, but join the millions of others who will pay their share, perhaps not eagerly but at least will pay, and in doing so prove again that the American tax system with all is faults and inequities still does not require an army of tax collectors hounding our citizens for the

government's tithe. If this wasn't so, how could we unleash our IRS agents to police non-taxrelated activities such as gasoline sta-

The Rockville Water & Aqueduct Co. and the Vernon Water Co. have jointly filed with the Public Utilities Commission for the sale of the Vernon company to Rockville Water & Aqueduct.

The application also asks for permission to meter the Vernon Water Co. customers and for Rockville Water to apply to the customers of Vernon company the flat rates presently authorized for Rockville customers, until such time as meters can be installed. The Vernon company is owned by

Munroe Moses. At one point customers of the company were going to buy it when Moses said he wanted to sell. This fell through and then the town also considered buying it but this was also dropped after much discussion. No date has been set by the PUC for the hearing on the sale. This will be after legal

notices have been published for the purpose of notifying the public. Customers of the Vernon company have been notified that the contract for the pending sale provides, as a condition of the sale, that the rates for service to be paid

The increase, it was explained, is based on a quarterly rate for an average singleamily residential customer in Vernon using 2,500 cubic feet or 18,750 gallons per quarter. The current quarterly bill for this customer is \$16.33.



bill just passed in Congress to restructure the railways in 17 Northeastern and Midwestern states with the aid of \$2 billion in government guaranteed loans is expected to create a trunkline freight system in the main. Passenger service will be restricted to a few corridor lines with high density business travel. Even commuter service is largely being taken over from the railroads by local com-

The American railroads are no longer considered a factor in the tourist business. The Europeans have a different attitude. They are restructuring their railroads to take over an ever increasing share of tourist traffic from the airlines, restoring the railways to their dominant position of half a century ago in short haul traffic. The goal is ho shift virtually all short haul traffic in Europe from the highways and the airways to the railways by 1985. American Tourist Dollars The plan for this has been

drawn up by the International Union of Railways representing 50 government and privately owned carriers. The plan is being publicized by the union in the United States because of the importance of American tourist

The goal is to make train travel more economical and faster than travel by car in most of Europe and to make it faster than airline travel for round trips of 300 miles or less. The gain in time, as compared with the planes, comes from elimination of taxi or bus trips

January 6 is the day that Christmas ends. This is the 12th day after Christmas and sunosedly is the day that the wise nen brought their gifts to the Christ Child. In some European nouseholds, gifts are given. There is a legendary character called Befana whose

story is related mostly in Italy and Spain. Befana was a lonely old lady whose children were grown. She lived alone. One night she heard a knock on her loor and opened it to three strangers. They asked for directions to Bethlehem.

When Befana heard their story of a king, she wanted to travel along with the richly attired men. A compulsive cleaner, Befana chose to do her housework first for she was very fussy about her home. Soon, others stopped by asking the same questions. By now, her curiosity was at its peak so she set off bringing two toys that had belonged to her

Unfortunately, Befana had waited too long. The star that was to have shown her the way to this new little king had faded in the morning light. Befana wanders on year after year. It is Twelfth Night, or the Eve of Epiphany, when she goes searching. As she goes from one house to another, she lifts the covers from sleeping children looking for the little king. Always a kindly lady. Befana leaves behind a gift for

each child. As with many modern religious observances. Twelfth Night was once a pagan custom. It stemmed from the Romans who held masquerades at this time. A king would be chosen, interestingly enough from one of the slaves of the household.
