





Massive Move Linked To Gun Running


# **Children Make Movies**

Children are making movies. You might enjoy making a movie about your school and show it to your teachers and classmates. Maybe your whole class would like to plan and make a film.

Here are some guidelines for good movie making: 1. Write a script first. Plan each scene so that it tells the story you want it to. Use titles. Plan the action so that it will be interesting.

2. Remember the rules you learned for taking good pictures. The same ones work for movie making.

3. Edit your movie. "In-camera editing" means you take your movie scenes in the order they will be shown. It's a good idea to use cards with each scene written on them. "Out-of-camera editing" means you splice or cut the film and join it together at different parts. In this way, you can arrange the scenes in the order you wish.




