National Guardsmen and Town of Manchester employes picked up 358 truckloads of brush in more than half the town over the weekend, Town Public Works Director, Jay Giles reported today, as Town Highway Department forces continued cleanup of debris resulting from last month's ice

About 80 National Guardsmen from Manchester, under command of Lt. Col. Nathan Agostinelli and Capt. William Gay, worked in town eight hours Saturday and four hours Sunday, Giles said. The Guardsmen were assisted by about 50 town employes.

The combined forces used 33 trucks, two chippers, and an assortment of chain saws and other equipment, Giles said. During the weekend they covered 16 of the town's 27 snowplowing routes, he said.

Today, town employes continued pickup of brush on the schedule which was interrupted by last Thursday's 51/2-inch snowfall in Manchester.


