The sources said the broad outline of the plan was communicated to Aswan before Kissinger left Israel and that the Egyptians were satisfied with what U.S. officials termed "very concrete and specific proposals" ending the potentially explosive situation along the canal.

The chief point of debate appeared to be the number of Egyptian forces to be left on the Israeli side of the canal. Tel Aviv reports said Israeli Defense Minister Moshe Dayan told Kissinger that Israel could not compromise on its insistence on a thinning out of Egyptian forces in the Sinai.

Egypt has previously insisted that its 2nd and 3rd Armies on the east bank remain intact, fully equipped with planes, tanks and rockets. Diplomatic sources said Egypt would agree to "streamline" its east bank forces, presumably trimming

Kissinger was expected to shuttle back to Israel later today after his talks with Sadat. Whether he would return to Aswan apparently depended on developments.

We are thankful to Dr. Kissinger for his wonderful effort," Sadat told newsman as the two men met at 10:30 a.m. (4:30 a.m. EDT) for a new round of talks.

Inflation, Taxes Outpace Wage Increases In 1973

WASHINGTON (UPI) - The average American family, contrary to what the administration says, was worse off economically in 1973 than in 1972, according to a congressional study on inflation.

With inflation and higher taxes outpacing wage increases during 1973, the average family ended the year with 1 per cent less purchasing power than it had in 1972, and the outlook for 1974 is no better, the report said.

The study, entitled "Inflation and the Consumer in 1973," was prepared by the staff of the House-Senate Economic Committee.

" A "middle budget" family of four with \$12,614 to spend had to pay an extra \$1,168 to maintain its 1972 living standards in 1973, the study said.

Food cost that family \$502 more during the year and Social Security taxes rose by \$150 over 1972. Food price increases-accounted for 61 per cent of the year's rise in the Consumer Price Index.

There is no indication at this time that the rate of inflation will moderate in 1974 and consequently the real purchasing power of consumers is likely to continue to decline," the study said.

"In view of the recent slowdown in economic activity, and the energy crisis, unemployment will certainly increase during 1974. This situation of higher prices and fewer jobs will further erode consumer income and confidence, which in turn will add substantially to recessionary prospects in

Herbert Stein, chairman of the Council of Economic Advisers, testified last Aug. I that "probably the key thing to say is that the real per capita incomes of the American people, after allowing for inflation, rose substantially from the fourth quarter of 1972 to the second quarter of 1973.

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





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Is A National Speed Limit Constitutional?

We are not an expert on constitution law but a letter to The Herald's Open Forum column concerning the federal government's authority to fix a national speed limit deserves an answer in these days when it would appear the Constitution is under fire.

There is much debate among the experts in the area of constitutional law representing on one side a conservative view and the other a liberal

In general the conservative view, which was expressed in essence by the letter writer, is that whatever the U.S. Constitution does not specifically spell out as powers of the federal government is reserved for the states and ultimately the people. And this is generally true of many areas such as the coining of money, maintaining the national defense, and other specific duties of the various federal branches of the government as spelled out in the Constitution.

However, the liberal view has its basis in the more general constitutional provisions, which when applied are quite often the subject of vigorous debate.

For example, the phrase in the preamble, "to promote the common welfare" has become a catch all for many, many federal social and economic programs, especially since the Great Depression

The so-called "strictconstructionists" generally question a lot of legislation enacted to "promote the common welfare." The "looseconstructionists" are equally vocal in defending this phrase as evidence of

the foresight of our founding fathers: enabling the federal government to act in areas which specific constitutional law - national or state can not anticipate.

Most of us are somewhere in between and share to a degree Abraham Lincoln's view that the federal government ought to do only what the people cannot do, or will not do, for themselves. Thus getting back the question of the national speed limit of 55 miles per hour.

To our point of view, it is constitutional in that it is intended to conserve our gasoline supplies to "promote the common welfare" by enabling our oil industry to produce more heating fuel for homes and factories and conserve gasoline for such things as food production, essential transportation, etc.
