Scare Creates Scarcities

have begun to be seen as a result of the petroleum shortage. And of course, the scarcities go beyond the obvious ones of gasoline, heating oil,

Oil is so vital to our economy that it affects such diverse products as fiber glass boat hulls, dacron for sails, and plastics for many purposes. Hopefully some of the petrochemical uses of oil may be filled by coal, which is equally rich in chemical derivatives.

There is a type of shortage, other than the real shortages, which can be equally as discomfitting in its effect, even though it need never have

It is the man-made shortage which occurs when people give in to rumors of scare tactics and start buying a commodity in amounts far beyond their normal needs.

A most recent example of this is the so-called toilet paper shortage which came about through a rumor that the commodity was in short supply. Credit for this was given the Johnny Carson show, which had several jokes on the subject. This may or may not be correct.

However, the reality which took place was that people did start buying toilet paper in amounts far beyond

normal demand. When abnormal rushes on items take place normal supplies are quick ly exhausted. Then as regular shipments come in and its is apparent that there is not a real shortage, normal buying slows down as people start use up the needless inventory which they have accumulated.

A classic example of this was the beef shortage last summer when people were buying beef in such large quantities that stocks of deep freezers were completely bought up to store the hoarded beef.

With the lifting of price controls beef came back in a hurry and prices fell below level which prevailed during the scarcity period.

The best policy for all to follow will be of trying to restrict buying habits to normal. And indeed shying away from items whose prices has risen greatly may be one of the best ways to

assure that the price comes down. There will be enough real scarcities without our creating new ones which could be avoided easily.

Hannon felt that the residents in the first phase would probably be commuters due to the fact that it would take awhile for employes to be drawn to the site. It is hoped that the employment centers combined with the commercial areas and the institutional facilities would provide

Weiskopf, 31, disclosed he would return to his home in Columbus, Ohio, and would not play until the Glen Campbell-Los Angeles Open Feb. 14-17. "I really didn't prepare myself very well," Weiskopf said. "It's important, too, because I don't want to get off to too bad a start."

From May 13 to July 29 last year, Weiskopf had a sizzling streak in which he won five of the eight tounaments in which he entered, finishing second, third and fifth in the here today in preparation for other three. He won more than \$150,000 of his prize money in that period. Before 1973, the Ohio belter had won only a total of five

tournaments since joining the PGA tour in 1965. "I finally wanted to do what people thought I was capable of accomplishing all along," he said about '73. 


