Political Pot Begins To Boil

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With four candidates beating the hustings for the Democratic gubernatorial nomination, one would almost need a program to know who the players are.

The four-way contest is of interest, not because it threatens at this point to erupt into an intra-party fight which would be to Republican advantage, but because of the diversity of the candidates.

Congresswoman Ella Grasso is the leader in the early polls and as a woman and a proven vote-getter also is given the edge by some observers' over Gov. Thomas Meskill in November, assuming the governor does seek re-election.

Now we'aren't going to say that her being a woman will necessarily influence Connecticut voters one way or the other but it is notable, historically, that women do get elected to Congress more than they do to governorships. The secretary of state post in Connecticut has all but become a political province for the feminine politicos.

So the question, should Mrs. Grasso get the nomination, is whether she can attract the voters in her bid for governor as successfully as she has in her bids for other offices. Call it male auvinsism, if you must, be we cannot help but wonder if the governorship isn't conceived of as a male office in the minds of both male and female voters.

Attorney General Robert Killian has waged a continuing campaign of sorts for the nomination. He has challenged big oil and Gov. Tom with equal vigor. But ambition is not enough and our soundings indicate that many party members feel he would be weak against Meskill.

Former Norwalk Mayor Frank Zullo's role in the campaign is more difficult to assess. His chances seem to hinge on an unlikely rift among the

major candidates which could leave him available as a compromise choice. His status could be changed too if Meskill did not run for then his relative obscurity would not be such a handicap against a possibly relatively unknown Republican.

But the fascinating member of the foursome is Homer Babbidge, a political newcomer, who offers as his basic credentials extensive administrative experience as an educator and as former president of the University of Connecticut. And he has some support as the campaign mailings to date indicate his is no shoe-string effort to get the nomina-

Thus the Nutmeg Democrats have a full spectrum of candidates seeking to represent the party in the race for the state's top job.

That this ultimate selection be made without bruises is the obvious concern of party leaders with the old master, State Chairman John Bailey, remaining "officially" neutral and former Gov. John Dempsey appearing at almost every announcement kickoff to sow the soothing oil of party

The decision will come at the party convention. In the meantime the candidates and their supporters are working the hustings trying to get their delegate's spots at the convention. Each town party will caucus and once this has been done the winnowing will begin and the final test between party loyalty and candidate ambition " will follow the convention - unless the powers that can engineer that politically desirable goal of a unanimous nomination.

Meanwhile, the Republicans are waiting for Meskill to announce his candidacy formally since his actions of late have not been that of a man about to retire from public life voluntarily.



There has been speculation that the proposal to test-fire Minuteman missiles over the continental United States is intended to show the Kremlin that a Watergate-weakened President Nixon is as tough as ever. This is so much rub-

Rather, the tests would be an attempt to convince the Russians that a continuation of the arms race is a wasteful and futile adventure for Moscow. Hopefully, they would demonstrate to Soviet party leader Leonid Breshney and, his associates that the Minuteman is exceedingly accurate and reliable under operational conditions

Such an outcome would suggest that despite costly Russian research and development programs, the U.S.S.R. is topelessly behind and destined to fall even further behin in the arms race unless it comes to terms with the United States in the second round of the Strategic Arms Limitation Talks (SALT II) for a standstill, or at least a slowdown, in he incredibly expensive and dangerous contest.

In the U.S. view, the necessity for these tests arises now ecause of recent advances in Russian missile capabilities. There is a likelihood that the Soviet Union within a number of years, will have both heavier and more nuclear weapons han the United States if its current program goes inchecked. It is known that Russian scientists are curntly making considerable technological advances.

But the tremendous Soviet effort could go for naught if U.S. weapons continue to be far ahead of their Soviet counterparts in accuracy and reliability The question is one of credibility, which is the key attribute of a strategic missile system designed more for precenting nuclear war than for winning it. Most planners now believe there would be no winners in any Soviet-U.S.

nuclear holocaust. It was in the pursuit of credibility that a military analyst some years back seriously suggested U.S. defense would be strengthened if the President would make the Soviet Union * a gift of the Polaris missile. This gift would, this strategist easoned, convince the men in the Kremlin that Polaris was, in fact, a devastating weapon. Not U.S. claims, but

Missiles launched from standard silos under operational conditions can be far less accurate and considerably less reliable than when those same weapons are fired in what, for all practical purposes, are scientifically controlled launches.


The energy problem is world-wide
