Dr. Benjamin Spock, the noted baby authority, has finally recanted the "submissiveness" which he preached in his child-raising books and has admitted that he was wrong, with the implication that he did a lot of harm.

He was an absolute obesession with some parents. They had misgivings about taking the baby to the bathroom, unless they consulted Spock. In that era a mother without her Dr. Spock at hand was thrown into an indecisive tizzy.



Arthur Maskell, 48, of Plainfield, employed by Canadian National, was in fair condition at Backus Hospital. He suffered first, second, and third degree burns over 20 per cent of his

body, hospital officials said.

A Lehigh Co. employe, Helen Simkowski, 3, of Norwich, sufered a sprained ankle and was treated at the same hospital. Brook said his truck had just loaded up 10,000 gallons of gasoline and was crossing the tracks when he was forced to stop because a small pickup truck was obstructing his way. Then suddenly, he said, his vehicle was struck by the train, exploded and burst into flames.

The tanker truck was a total wreck, fire officials said, while the train's engine, caboose and a freight car were destroyed. Firemen used foam provided by the U.S. Navy submarine base in Groton to put out the blaze and the fire was under

Children's Dental Health

(This is the third in a series of six articles on dental health published by The Herald, in cooperation with the Manchester Dental Society, in observance of National Children's Dental Health Week, Feb. 3-9.)

"Over the years, I've gone to the dentist on a fairly regular basis. Recently, however, his dental hygienist has been talking about the importance of a home oral hygiene program. I would appreciate your elaborating on this."

Developing good home oral hygiene habits is essential to help you help your dentist keep your teeth for a lifetime. Dental scientists have discovered that dental plaque sometimes called bacterial plaque - is the enemy of your Essentially, plaque is a sticky, colorless layer of harm-

ful bacteria that is constantly forming on your teeth. The bacteria in plaque are primary causes of the two most common dental diseases - dental caries (tooth decay) and peridontal or gum disease. You must remove the plaque at least once a day so that it will not accumulate and turn into a hard deposit called

If this calculus is not removed periodically, more plaque will form on it and eventually lead to the destruction of teeth and gums. The basics of a good home program begin with the disclosing tablet which is made up of a harmless vegetable



dye that stains plaque. After chewing a tablet, rinse your mouth out with water. Then observe the stained areas where the plaque is located. If properly used, the toothbrush will remove the bulk of plaque. One of the most recommended brushes has a straight handle, a flat brushing surface and soft, endrounded bristles. Gently scrub the outer surfaces of the teeth. Then, vigorously scrub the biting surfaces.

Flossing removes plaque and debris from between the teeth. Hold the floss tightly and insert between the teeth. With a gentle sawing motion scrape the floss up and down against the sides of the teeth. Of course, you should continue to have periodic professional check-ups and cleaning. But it's never too

soon to start protecting your oral health right at home.





Most of the opposition concerned the estimated cost of the project and the knowledge that, unless an unusually deep trench is dug for he installation (increasing the estimated cost) ome of the cellars on the east side of the streets wouldn't be serviced.

In spite of the concern over the price and the nethod of construction, a show of hands indicated more than half of those present were inerested in the installation - provided more letailed information was forthcoming. Jay Giles, director of public works, estimated

the construction cost at about \$180,000, with each property owner assessed at the rate of about \$25 per front foot - an average of about \$2,600 per

In addition, he said, a lateral from the street to the property line would cost about \$20 a foot, and the charge by private contractors to bring the line into the home would cost about \$8 a foot. If and when the sewers are connected to his home, the property owner would pay a sewage fee to the town — estimated at about two-thirds the cost of his water bill from the privately owned Manchester Water Co., which services

Customers of the town's water supply pay a sewage fee equal to 100 per cent of the water bill. The privately owned Manchester Water Co. charges more for its water than does the town -



Although a bank does owe ex traordinary care for the safety of your money, it owes only ordinary care for the safety of your person. If you get hurt on the bank's premises, you cannot collect dan ages unless you can prove negli-

Thus, in a more everyday situation, a bank was held not liable to a man who slipped on its front step. The step, although somewhat worn, was no more hazardous than one might encounter almost any-

Of course, reasonable precau-tions must be taken. In another holdup case, a man with a bomb told bank officials he would blow the place up if they did not hand over \$10,000.

They managed to stall him for almost 20 minutes. Yet, they neglected to warn an unsuspecting customer to get out of harm's way. Finally the bomb did go off, inuring the customer. In due course, a court held the bank liable. The court said even though the bank was not to blame for the bombing, it was indeed to blame for not giving the customer fair warning of


