





As Vermont Royster, the old sage of the Wall Street Journal has written, "There must be a lot of dumb people on Wall St."

The reason for his remark was that the value of oil stocks has been declining for the last year. Evidently investors were not aware of the "unconscionable" profits which the companies having been reaping, and which in ordinary course could be expected to show up in dividends.

Mr. Royster, of course, was writing with pen in cheek, to coin a malapropism. The reason that investors were not rushing for oil stocks was that they do not see likelihood of substantial dividends from oil and are choosing other investments where return on their money is more

We are thinking of the institutional firms like insurance companies, and mutual funds, and foundations which have an almost daily need to reinvest income in profitable ways.

However much they might wish to follow President Nixon's example and not "wallow in Watergate," there is no way that congressmen, especially Republican congressmen, can avoid that quagmire in 1974, and especially if they are

up for re-election in November. Presidential assistant Patrick J. Buchanan has neatly described their dilemma, either one of whose horns threatens to skewer them. "There well may be adverse political consequences for Republicans who have to run in November with the

albatross of Watergate around their necks," he said the "But," he added, "I would suggest those consequences will be infinitely less dramatic and severe than the consequences of running as a Republican who collaborated in the onstitutional overthrow of a Republican President of the

In other words, they will be damned whether they do or don't vote for the impeachment of Richard Nixon. This may be unfair, for Watergate is the scandal of a Republican administration, not of the Republican party. suchanan's warning may have been a thinly veiled appeal to the baser instincts of political survival. But the situation does seem to be an accurate reflection of feeling in the hust-

Polls show that a majority of Americans no longer believe or trust their President or have confidence in his ability to govern effectively for the remainder of his term. They wish , and Watergate, would just go away. Yet at the same time there is no detectable groundswell of sentiment in favor of impeachment. To an important extent, this may be because many Ameri-

ditional boiler, and facilities to control temperature and humidity to provide better infection controls.

Continued use of the 1919 building would be restricted to administrative services until such time as the building may be demolished and replaced with newer facilities. Somoza said it is hoped within approximately two years the hospital can discuss plans with the commission for demolition of the 1919 building.

The renovation project, which is estimated to cost about \$1,300,000, is expected to begin this summer and will take about a year to complete, said Somoza. The hospital expects to use a Hill-Burton grant of \$298,-000 toward the project, he said. Most of the balance of the capital needed will come from a variety of sources including the hospital's building fund, its development program, and bank loans.

John Rivosa, fire marshal and chief of the Town Fire Department, endorsed the vacating of the 1919 building because it did not meet with present day fire safety standards, he said

The project was also endorsed and recommended for approvala by Stanley Horan, executive director of the Health Planning Council.

Paul E. Moss, assistant administrator, presented the proposal for a modern fluoroscopy unit to replace an obsolete diagnostic X-ray unit. The unit which costs \$140,000 is to be funded by the United Aircraft Corporation of East Hartford.

Dr. Robert Karns, chief of diagnostic radiology at the hospital, confirmed that the present 15-year-old machine was mechanically worn out, and that it should be replaced.

The commission is expected to have a decision for Manchester Memorial Hospital on or about March 1.





horns. The female has no horns.


Lincoln Statue
