WASHINGTON (UPI) -Federal energy chief William E. Simon says there is now enough home heating oil so that refineries can begin using more of their crude oil to make gas-

Simon's long-awaited decision to shift refinery priorities in preparation for the summer was announced Sunday as motorists in four states and the District of Columbia prepared to adopt the "Oregon plan" for gasoline rationing and as government officials said truck traffic continued to climb and incidents of violence fell. Decision Affects 440 Employes

The Iona Manufacturing Co., one of Manchester's largest employers, today announced that its parent firm - General Signal Corp. of New York City

The local company will continue manufacturing operations until Feb. 22, when a four-toeight-week phaseout will start. Iona chairman William H. Sleith said this morning.

Sleith, who announced the shutdown plans to a "stunned audience" at Iona's Regent St. facility at 9 a.m., said the decision will affect 440 employes.

A significant number of salaried people - mostly management and supervisory employes - will probably be transferred to other divisions of General Signal Corp., Sleith said and the company will assist other employes in finding

Town Manager Robert Weiss, year of losses.' shocked and dismayed after learning of the decision this morning, said he has asked Sleith to arrange a meeting with General Signal's top management to see if the town can talk them into recon-

Weiss said the town would at least seek to get another of General Signal's corporate divisions in Manchester. He said he has also contacted the state Department of Commerce

for assistance. Sleith said General Signal's decision to close the Manchester plant was necessitated by the continuance of heavy operating losses throughout 1973 and early

He said he was just as shocked as anyone else to hear the sudden decision of corporate headquarters in New York City, although he knew the firm was suffering losses in the Iona division.

Sleith, who founded the Iona Co. in 1947 and sold it to General Signal Corp. in 1969, said he was not a participant in the decision-making done in New York City. He said the rationale for closing the facility was apparently economic, and he was assured that General Signal had explored alternatives to closing the plant. Sleith said he expects to remain as board chairman "for the forseeable future - one or two years."

Although he couldn't release specific financial information about the division's losses, Sleith said the shutdown decision came under the pressures of increasing prices of materials, inflationary pressures on labor costs, and the inability of Iona to raise selling prices for its products.

"These factors made for an outlook for 1973 that didn't promise a reversal of the loss situation," Sleith said. "New York saw no hope," he said. They couldn't stand another

Normal manufacturing operations at Iona will continue until Feb. 22, Sleith said, to fill orders the company has on hand for its products - food mixers, blenders, can openers, shoe polishers, hair dryers, and

After that date, he said, activity will be limited to phasing out production and the sale of existing inventory. The phaseout is expected to take four to eight weeks, Sleith said, and the only operation remaining after that will be maintenance service for Iona

Zlona's plant at Toronto, Canada, is not affected by the decision to end operations in Manchester, Sleith said.

"In this country," Sleith said "Iona products will disappear from the market," but Canadian production will continue. Most of the production equipment at the Manchester facility will be moved to other divisions

of the General Signal Corp., Sleith said, and company officials are considering sale of Iona's nine-acre complex on Regent St. Sleith founded the company,

named for his wife, in 1947 when he patented the world's first portable food mixer. The first plant was in Hartford, and the company moved to Manchester in 1956. The plant was expanded in

1958 and again in 1961. The Canadian unit was created in 1966, and a branch was established near San Juan. Puerto Rico. The Puerto Rican facility closed in 1969.

Sleith has been nationally recognized for his practices of hiring physically and mentally handicapped persons.
