A Grandstand Play

In the frenzy of investigations, charges and prosecutions currently underway there are some which are ill-conceived, poorly planned and bordering on harassment. Another event has a strong air of political par-

In Los Angeles an attorney for John Erlichman, former presidential advisor, being brought to trial for his part in the Ellsberg psychiatrist burglaries, requested that a subpoena be issued for President Nixon to appear as a witness.

Presumably he was being asked to testify on the seriousness of the socalled security leak from Daniel Ellsberg.

The judge, perhaps seizing his moment of glory, granted the subpoena, the first in a state court in the history of the nation ordering the President to appear as a witness.

The event was farcical play-acting. Attorneys for Erlichman knew, the judge knew and all concerned knew that the President would not honor such a subpoena.

In fact immediately after the motion to subpoena was granted an attorney for Erlichman said that if the President did not appear that he would be asked to answer a group of questions or interrogatories from Erlichman's counsel.

From the beginning it was known this was the best they could hope for, so why the grandstand play?

Attorney General William Saxbe taking note of the folly of the move announced that the Department of Justice was taking steps to defend the President and the presidency from subpoenas which could be issued by every judge in the country when a federal matter was relevant.

The effort was one of futility and difficult to understand.

A suit against billionaire Howard Hughes in Las Vegas charging stock manipulation in the acquisition of Air West Airlines has been thrown out by the judge on the grounds that the 'pleadings" were the worst which he had ever seen in his judicial

The event, unrelated to the Erlichman case, is another instance of the frenzy to rush in to court and prosecute a public figure, seemingly merely for the sake of prosecution.

A reverse event, which reeks of political partisanship is the case of Howard Metzenbaum, Ohio industrialist, who was appointed to the Senate to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of William Saxbe, when he took the post of attorney

Metzenbaum, a Democrat, has been under pressure for six years by the Internal Revenue Service which claims that he owes more than \$100,-000 in back taxes and penalties.

Two days before his appointment to the Senate was planned he made a deposit to cover the charge in case the courts ruled against him in the case. After a debate of only one and onehalf hours in the Senate he was con-



Statistics just released by the Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) show that one in 10 working Americans suffers a work-related injury or illness in a year's time.

The number of inspections continues to increase. In November of 1973 there were 7,776 OSHA inspections compared to 2,643 in November of 1972.

Fuel Pinch an Old School Tale

"The installation of an anthracite toker at the Sykes School was completed last fall, and so far fuel as been available for it." 
