**Mistrial Motion** 

Denied by Judge

Defense attorneys for Mitchell, former attorney general, and Stans, former commerce secretary, had sought a mistrial on the basis of the opening statement to the jury by the prosecution.

That was near the end of the opening statement of Assistant U.S. Attorney James W. Rayhill Friday when, Stans's lawyer contended, Rayhill asked the trial jury to equate itself with the grand jury that had indicted the two on charges of lying under oath, conspiracy, and obstruction of justice.

The two former cabinet members are accused of using their political influence to try to sidetrack a major federal investigation of Robert L. Vesco, the fugitive financier, in exchange for his secret \$200,000 contribution to the Nixon 1972 campaign.

Mitchell now faces a maximum of 30 years in prison and \$40,000 in fines if convicted in Washington, in addition to the 50 years both he and Stans could get in the New York case.







### Party Responsibility

Indications are the Connecticut General Assembly will be adopting some campaign reforms, particularly in the areas of financing.

It may be premature for the state to get involved in actual tax subsidies to the political parties but it does appear there will legislation aimed at keeping closer tabs on private campaign contributions.

One suggestion, meeting with favor, is a shorter campaign which we heartily endorse.

Another suggestion is the creation of a special commission to oversee campaign contribution solicitation and disclosures.

At first appearance, this seems logical but we are not too sure the injection of a third element into the election financing process is necessary at this time.

We think it might be more beneficial to the political parties, the candidates, and the democratic process as a whole, if controls over the creation of special campaign committees were strengthened in the hands of political parties.

By giving the political party respon-

sibility for approving such committees, as well as policing them after they have been authorized, it would be much easier to give the voter financial information in a form that has meaning. We think it could cut down the number of committees now created to circumvent existing regulations on expenditure limitations which is the goal of campaign reform It would strengthen party unity and avoid the excesses that occurred in the case of the Committee to Re-Elect the President which operated independently from the Republican par-

It may be that our political parties could not effectively do their own policing but we believe they can and will if given the opportunity. Until we give the parties some authority over those who would act under their banners, or on behalf of their candidates, we cannot be too critical of them for excesses committed by comnittees acting on their own.

We fully appreciate Gov. Thomas Meksill's reluctance to introduce a similar plan but in view of the smallness of our state and the fact that many motorists have to travel throughout the region, we think the plan should be considered as a con-

From all appearances, the extra allocation of gasoline has eased the lines at the pumps considerably.

Adoption of the alternate day purchase plan might be helpful in averting lines in the future, if April, May or June gasoline allocations are not sufficient to handle the normal seasonal increases in gasoline use. If all the states in the region are

under the same plan, there will be less confusion and hopefully more order in the sale of gasoline.

We think it would further dampen panic buying, which is now subsiding but which could be sparked anew if the national allocation system hits anymore snags.
