Wilson Named PM

Labor Party Takes Over

LONDON (UPI) - Prime Minister Harold Wilson today named a new Labor government that included Denis Healey, 56, as chancellor of the exchequer to lead the nation out of its economic crisis. The government called immediate peace talks with striking coal miners.

Healey, defense secretary in the last Labor government, will have the task of handing the country the severe fiscal medicine needed to pull it out of its deepening economic crisis.

James Callaghan, 62, chairman of the Labor party and a former Labor government chancellor of the exchequer and home secretary, was named foreign secretary.

Roy Jenkins, 53, widely regarded as a successful chancellor of the exchequer during Wilson's last administration, was named home secretary, a job he also held earlier in Wilson's last govern-

Eric Varley, 42, a little known Labor party member, was named secretary of state for energy. His job will primarily be to deal with Britain's energy crisis and also with her rich offshore oil resources in the North Sea.

Mrs. Barbara Castle, 61, employment secretry in Wilson's last government, was named secretary of state for

Multiple-Use Plan Involves 256 Acres In Manchester

The Manchester Planning and Zoning Commission (PZC) Monday night approved zone changes to allow a massive, mixed-use development on tobacco land at Buckland.

With little fanfare and only an hour of discussion, PZC members changed zoning on about 256 acres of land now zoned Rural Residence.

The zone changes were being sought by MAP Associates, an investment partnership led by developer Arthur M. Fischer of New York City, for a 10-to-15year development of commercial, industrial, and residential

Rezoning approved by the PZC is for 138 acres of CUD (Comprehensive Urban Development) Zone, 80 acres of Business 3 Zone, and 38 acres of Industrial Zone.

The PZC denied a fourth part

of the MAP Associates' application - for seven acres of Business 1 Zone at the southwest corner of Burnham and Windsor Sts. The PZC's votes on the

rezoning came on motions made by John Hutchinson and seconded by Joseph Swensson. The decisions were split into two votes: One for the business and industrial zoning and the other for the CUD application.

PZC members voted 4-1 on the Business 3 and Industrial Zone applications (David Paris was the dissenter) and 3-2 for the CUD rezoning (Paris and Clarence Welti were the opponents).

PZC members voting on the applications were Hutchinson, Swensson, Paris, Welti, and chairman Alfred Sieffert.

Monday night's decision by the PZC came about four months after the first public hearing on the applications was conducted Nov. 5. That hearing and a second hearing Dec. 3 drew considerable opposition to the MAP Associates plans from an 80-member Buckland omeowner's association.

Leaders of the homeowners group indicated this morning there will probably be a court appeal seeking an overturn of the PZC decisions.

PZC members discussed the MAP Associates' applications for only an hour before making their decisions Monday night. They had, however, discussed the project at other recent meetings, including a session last week with Fischer, the

Leaders of an 80-member homeowners association opposing plans for Arthur M. Fischer's proposed development at Buckland indicated today there will probably be legal action to overturn Monday night's rezoning decisions made

William Anderson and Lawrence Noone, who head the Buckland homeowners group, said they'll be talking to the association lawyer to possibly instigate court action appealing PZC decisions granting zone changes for the massive. mixed-use development.

Anderson and Noone; both live on Burnham St., were shocked and disappointed this morning after learning of the PZC's Monday night votes granting zone changes of 256 acres of tobacco land near their

Noone criticized town officials for their actions during the controversy surrounding the rezoning applications. He said town officials shouldn't have made public comments favoring the development while the PZC was still considering

the zone changes.

While opponents were steaming about the PZC actions today, the developers were reportedly satisfied with the decisions, although PZC members denied a small sevenacre rezoning portion of the application.

Paul Marte, local attorney for Fischer, said he was "very excited" by the PZC's 'excellent decision.'





The Federal Bureau of Investigation, which has been in some degree of eclipse since the death of J. Edgar Hoover, gives promise of regaining the respect and admiration which it long held in public esteem.

Arrest of the kidnappers of Atlanta Constitution editor Reg Murphy, and recovery of the ransom money intact, within five hours of Murphy's release, was a notable deed of crime detection.

In his story of the kidnapping Murphy praised the FBI effort throughout the affair and said that anyone who said a bad word against the bureau law officers would have to answer to his wife, who was enthusiastically pleased with their handling of the case.

School Doors Opening To Learning Disabled

According to the U.S. Office of Education, more than 4.5 million school-age children suffer from some form of handicap that affects their capacity to use or understand These handicaps range from minor learning disabilities to

lyslexia, the impairment of the ability to read due to-brain "Without the ability to grasp the basic tools of language, a child's future academic success - and social development

- will almost invariably be seriously jeopardized," points out George Stern, president of Monterey Learning Systems, one of the nation's pioneers in special education programs or learning-disabled children.

Yet up to only a few years ago, such children were ex-pelled or virtually excluded from public schools. Their education was considered a privilege rather than a right, and the responsibility of their parents rather than of society. Then in 1970, efforts to integrate learning-disabled and handicapped children into the mainstream of public educas ion reached a climax when parents in Pennsylvania took legal action. They actually sued the state to provide educaonal services - within the public school system - for their children, regardless of the severity of their handicaps. In a landmark federal district court decision, a consent decree was issued which mandated Pennsylvania to provide special education programs and services for handicapped children. This mandate - and more significantly, Pennsylvania's response to it - has set a precedent that is being fol-

owed in school districts across the country. The Pennsylvania project is the largest educational program for learning-disabled children in the nation. It was developed by Monterey Learning Systems through research cted by the Behavioral Sciences Institute, a nonprofit educational research and therapy organization. More than 29 school districts covering the entire state and more than ,000 speech and hearing personnel are involved in the proj-

Parents in other states are following the example of their ounterparts in Pennsylvania. As a result, at least a dozen similar consent decrees have been issued by federal courts across the country and educators in some 30 states have chosen to integrate Monterey's program into their public







Today, the smallest player in the NBA at 5-10 is enjoying his greatest season with the big boys. Murphy is a starting guard with the Houston Rockets, a fine playmaker and a dependable double figure scorer. Recently, during a oneweek span which covered four games, Murphy had 48 assists, twice hitting the open man 15 times, equalling his career high. The Nutmegger is second in total assists this season. Only rookie Ernie DiGregorio of Buffalo has passed off for more scores. Murphy has been averaging better than seven per game.

Murphy still knows where the basket is, having topped the Rockets in scoring in 17 of their first 60 games. Averaging 21 points per game, Murphy ranks third in field goal percentage, trailing only Kareem Abdul-Jabbar and Bob McAdoo. The latter pair specialize in dunk shots being at least a foot taller than Murphy. The latter is no slouch at dunking the ball, as East Catholic High supporters can attest, and he can still get up and stuff the ball with the pros. Murphy was a one-man gang against East in the Class A CIAC Tournament in 1966 as the Eagles were

Being told he was too small to play basketball has been an old chestnut with Murphy.

Now 25, Murphy recalls, "They said I was too small to olay in high school and I made All-America. Then they said couldn't play in college. I made All-America three years running. Then they said I couldn't play in the pros, but I proved I can.

Murphy is the smallest NBA performer since Slater Martin was doing his thing in the 1950s with the Minneapolis Lakers. "I want to be a superstar," Murphy said, "and I truly

feel that I have all the qualities." Little Calvin has proven a point that there is room in the big leagues provided that you have exceptional ability.



Twins' DH Oliva Unsigned As Griffith Refutes Role

NEW YORK (UPI) - One year later, the value of the esignated hitter remains open to hot dispute. And, naturally, the man who is behind the latest dispute s Calvin Griffith, president of the Minnesota Twins, who just a few days ago was involved in another controversy

Tony Oliva, who thought he had made a healthy contribution to Minnesota last year when he batted .291 with a clubleading 92 RBI's as a designated hitter, learned Monday that his boss had a different perspective of his job. "The designated hitter is something new, we have only had it one year," Griffith said in explaining his refusal to give Oliva the same \$91,000 salary he received last year. Griffith is offering \$84,000. "No one knows what designated hitters are worth,"

Griffith continued, "but I believe they are part-time players and should be paid accordingly. Oliva countered: "I believe I had a good year last season and deserve at least as much as I made then. Other designated hitters like Orlando Cepeda and Deron Johnson received raises. All I want is the same."

Griffith, to strengthen his case, also pointed out that he was informed by team doctors that cartilage and torn ligament on Oliva's right knee will never permit him to play the outfield again. For Philadelphia Phillie Manager Danny Ozark, when it

comes to the designated hitter, he can take it or leave it. In fact, he said Monday he will allow American League managers to use designated hitters in exhibition games at their parks, but for himself, he'll leave it. NL President Chub Feney is allowing individual clubs to rule for themselves whether to allow AL rivals to use designated hitters in inter-league exhibitions.

"We won't use it ourselves," Ozark said. "It will put us at a slight disadvantage in some games, but these games aren't that important. They aren't as important as getting my pitchers some at-bats before the regular season


