### Unemployment In Perspective

With the growing concern in Connecticut and elsewhere about unemployment that is occurring and anticipated from the energy crisis, it is interesting to comment on a recent Wall Street Journal story which helps put the nation's unemployment statistics in a perspective often ig-

The article, while stating there may be little solace in the figures for the person who has been laid off or is unable to get his first job, points out the unemployment rolls are a bit decep-

First, that magic 5 per cent level of unemployment is less alarming than it appears because it does not reflect the hirings that take place.

The national labor work force has grown from 78.6 million in 1970 to 85.8 million in January of this year. significant point is the increase of 3 million jobs since January 1973. Also of interest in the January 1974 figure are at work than when the Arab oil embargo began.

The thesis of the article is that we should keep in mind, as we read about job layoffs and unemployment, that it is in relation to an extremely high level of employment.

Since many forecast a recession the article also notes that the decline in employment during five slowdowns in the past 25 years was 2 per cent in 1948-49, 3 per cent in 1953-54 and 1957-58, and less than 1 per cent in 1960-61 and 1969-70. While the impact is grea to the man who loses his job, statistics show that recessions have not had a catastrophic effect on employment. Another factor to keep in mind when

total figure, when broken down, gives a different perspective too.

According to the latest seasonally adjusted estimate of 4.7 million people unemployed; 2,006,000 had lost their last job; 731,000 had left their jobs for various reasons; 1,252,000 had re-entered the job market and 682,000 had never worked before.

Therefore we should keep in mind that the total number of people seeking jobs can be substantially above the number who have actually ost their jobs.

We agree unemployment is a continuing problem in our industrial society. In Manchester we have the mpact of the Iona closing.

But when we assess unemployment statistics, we should not panic due to overall numbers. The federal statistics cited by the writer seem to bear out that American business and industry is doing a better than average job of maintaining high employment, creating new jobs, and overall is in a fairly strong position to keep at a low level, recession-caused job cuts, as it has in the past five

economic downturns. While this doesn't mean we can ignore those who have lost their jobs, or who are seeking gainful employment, it indicates that perhaps the biggest asset we have is a free economy able to adapt and adjust to changing conditions without major disruption of

the overall economy. To us it indicates that despite some weak spots, the overall economy of the country is strong and flexible enough to weather out the energy crisis, if given a chance.

### There Are Other Issues

In the wake of Democratic victories in elections to the House in scattered ' parts of the country, the issue has become Watergate.

The issue is perhaps inescapable but if the pattern continues, and in the campaigning recently for other House vacancies it appears it will, we should be concerned.

Not that Watergate and all its implications are not a bona fide issue but because there are so many other issues facing the nation and the Congress.

We have become too hung up on Watergate and we fear that in drifting toward making it the paramount issue in House elections we may wind up short-changing the nation.

We are well aware that politicians feel it is important to win and that, with the exception of the Watergatetype of tactics, all is fair in love, war and politics.

But we are concerned with the effort of prominent Democrats of national stature hitting the hustings on behalf of candidates and making Watergate the major issue. The full impact of this effort could

distort the coming congressional campaign when we will vote on a new House and one-third of the Senate. We know Watergate will be a factor

in that election but we also strongly hope the issues of energy, inflation, our national defense, social welfare, education and others will be the meat of the campaign.


Watergate is in the process of resolution in the courts. Whatever the outcome, the basic

issues upon which we should pick and elect men and women to the Congress are not going to be solved by the out-The scandal of Watergate is a

political moral issue affecting public conduct. The fundamental challenges facing the electorate in the coming campaign are what the other issues are; what the priorities of national concern should be, and what the candidate, if he is successful, will try to do about them.

No, Watergate cannot be erased from current and coming campaigns but we believe it is incumbent upon all candidates and the political parties to keep it in a perspective that will give us a Congress made up of members who offered the voters the best possible solution to our many other problems. What the country needs as much as a repudiation of the Watergate skulldugery are positive and constructive ideas to meet

# Digger Phelps Coach-of-Year In College Basketball Circles

NEW YORK (UPI) — Richard "Digger" Phelps, an energetic, dapper young man who in only three seasons has raised Notre Dame's basketball program from the doldrums to national prominence, today was named Coach-of-the-Year by United Press International The 32-year-old Phelps, who guided the Irish to a 24-2 regular season record, including a sturning 71-70 upset of UCLA that snapped the Bruins'

record 88-game winning streak, was an easy winner in a balloting of 241 sportswriters and sportscasters across the nation. Phelps received 107 votes to easily outdistance six-time Coach of the Year John Wooden of UCLA. Wooden, whose club was beaten three times this season after going undefeated the previous two years, polled 43 votes. Buzz Ridl of Pittsburgh was third with 23 votes followed by Roy Skinner of Vanderbilt with 18 and Norm Sloan of top-ranked North Carolina State

Others receiving at least two votes were Lute Olsen of Long Beach State, Eddie Sutton of Creighton, Ted Owens of Kansas, Johnny Orr of Michigan and Bob Boyd of Southern California. Phelps is the first Notre Dame basketball coach ever to be awarded

UPI's Coach-of-the-Year honor, and he achieved it by combining highpowered recruiting with an abundance of court knowledge. When Phelps arrived at Notre Dame three seasons ago after one out standing season as the head coach of Fordham, everyone agreed that it would just be a matter of time before he turned the Irish into a national

"If anyone can rebuild your basketball program, Digger Phelps can. He is one of the best young coaches in the country," said Marquette Coach Al McGuire at the time Phelps took over. In Phelps' first year the Irish, young and inexperienced, suffered

through a 6-20 campaign, but Phelps' recruiting and patience began to pay off last season as Notre Dame finished with an 18-12 record that include a second place finish in the National Invitation Tournament. This year the Irish blossomed into one of the nation's most powerfu clubs and pulled off the biggest victory in college basketball over the last three seasons when they upended UCLA at South Bend, Ind. A week later UCLA avenged the loss by beating Notre Dame at Los Angeles, but the Irish then reeled off 12 straight victories before losing their season finale

Phelps, who took Fordham to a third place finish in the NCAA East Regionals in 1971 before walking out on the remainder of a five-year contract to take the Notre Dame job, will lead the Irish into action in the NCAA Mideast Regionals Saturday
