Near-Hurricane Force Winds Sweep State

United Press International Near hurricane force winds gusting as high as 70 miles per hour knocked out power, downed trees and buildings and shattered windows throughout Connecticut Sunday.

Hardest hit by power outages was Southington with 2,700 homes out. New Britain had 2,-000 homes without power.

Power was also reported knocked out in Durham, Killingworth, Haddam, Middlefield, Deep River, Old Lyme and Newington.

A spokesman from Hartford Electric Light Co. said many power failures were caused when wires were blown together causing short circuits.

Meskill Terms Plan Disaster

WETHERSFIELD (UPI) -Gov. Thomas J. Meskill said today the federal government's rail reorganization plan can be summed up in a single word disaster.

"The plan might well have been written by those who prefer to shut down our railroads and place Connecticut's freight on more trucks for our already clogged highways," the governor said in testimony for a federal hearing.

The governor said the state would prefer to see innovative efforts to promote additional rail freight service. The Interstate Commerce

Commission scheduled public hearings on the proposed abandonment of 175 miles of rail freight lines in the state. The track elimination is part

of the federal government's planned reorganization of railroads in the northeast.

"All the decisions seem to have been left to a computer that was neither informed of the many factors making up a railway system, nor given input on the effects of rail service on local industry," Meskill said. Meskill, former environmen-

tal chief Dan Lufkin, Transportation Commissioner Joseph B. Burns and his assistant commissioner in charge of rails, F. Colin Pease, were among state and business officials protesting the planned closure.

Under the northeast rail reorganization act of 1973 about 175 miles of rail lines in Connecticut, carrying both passengers and freight, would be shut

Lufkin said, will increase air pollution in major cities such as Hartford because trucks will have to carry freight now

moved by rail. Pease said the rail service is about four times as economic

as truck service. Rep. Stewart B. McKinney, R-Conn., said a dramatic decline in freight service occurred during the past five years because of inferior service, unmet delivery dates and

poor equipment. "Industry was, in effect, forced to resort to motor carriers for service. McKinney said. "It was inevitable that Connecticut freight carloads would be low for 1972."

in the freight zone. "Farmers in the Northwest region of Connecticut rely on freight service for badly needed feed grain," she said. And she said industries in Watertown and Thomaston would be seriously hurt by the curtailment of rail freight service to

"Not only does the DOT plan disregard the welfare of existing business and industry in the 6th District, but it also fails to take into account potential needs for rail freight service which could result with continuing sought after industrial development," Mrs.

Rep. William R. Cotter, D-Conn., said the DOT report contains no documentation on the volume of traffic to support the conclusion the lines aren't

financially viable. Cotter said the DOT based recommendations on just one of eight goals identified in the Regional Rail Reorganization







Aetna Tennis Cup Won by Australia

HARTFORD (UPI) - John Newcombe figured it was his turn to beat America single handedly in the Aetna World Cup Tennis tournament.

Two years ago Rod Laver won two singles and a doubles match to lead Australia to a 6-1 win in the best of sevenmatch play tournament between the two countries and last year Ken Rosewall duplicated the feat.

"Rosewall carried us last year, so I figured one of the younger boys had to do it this year," said the 29-year-old "Last year I lost both my singles matches and my cap-

tain Fred Stolle told me that if I didn't win both of mine this year, he wouldn't invite me back next year." The way the Sydney native played, he should be carried back on a litter next year. He took Arthur Ashe in three sets in the tournament's second match, gave Australia a 3-2 lead with Tony Roche in a three set doubles thriller over Ashe and Stan Smith, then played flawless tennis for a 6-3. 6-4 win over Smith Sunday that clinched the Aussie's fourth World Cup in the tournament's five-year history.

Newcombe broke Smith once in each set and held service through both games in a powerful performance. There is no question that Ellen, a member of Manchester's Explorer Post 112, has met all the listed requirements for the award. She organized a group of scouts and Pond; she has been an officer of Post

necessary number of merit badges. But, obviously, she has never been a Boy Scout and has not achieved the Scouts' First Class rank which may be required for Eagle status.

According to John Primus, committee chairman for Post 112, Eagle awards have been presented to Explorers who were never scouts. But Mark Clayton, spokesman for the Boy Scouts National Council in New Brunswick, New Jersey, denies this, yet admits that it might have occurred "two or three years ago." In any case, Clayton stressed that if it did occur, it "was not right, not a part of the exploring program."

While a program of advancement through the acquisition of merit badges is part of the Boy Scout tradition, the 1973 "Exploring Reference program does not have a step-by-step advancement program, except in Sea Exploring." However, it goes on to explain that an Explorer who has attained the First Class progress award in a Scout troop is encouraged to

become an Eagle scout. Ellen has been earning Boy Scout merit badges since she began as an Explorer one and one-half years ago. Until she applied for the Eagle Award ling to Mrs. Burns. Primus feels tha the bureaucratic difficulties Ellen's Eagle application has met are the result of the Long Rivers Council administrative staff's reluctance to tangle with the National Council over the matter. In fact, as of Saturday, it was not clear if Long Rivers ever sent Ellen's application to New Jersey, or if it merely sent a letter explaining
