### There Are Always Incumbents

John Bailey, the Connecticut Democratic party chairman, has taken issue with moves to shorten political campaigns.

Six Months ...

His approach is political - as it should be - and he makes the salient point of his argument that the imposition of a shorter campaign now would favor the incumbents, namely the Republicans.

He backs off from complete opposition to a shorter campaign by saying that perhaps it should go into effect in 1976 rather than 1974 when, if he and his party win favor in November they'll be the incumbents.

So it would appear incumbency is not a fatal drawback to a shorter campaign but rather who the incumbents are, for under our system, there will always be incumbents and the socalled "unknown" challengers.

At some point, we think we mus shorten the campaigns. We think it is an idea whose time

has come. Our State Senate agrees and hope the House will concur.

It may well be the incumbents will paign period is shortened.

But a shorter campaign, we believe, will restore the two-party system to its rightful role in our political life. First, the out party will have to build a party following, rather than wait for charismatic personalities to

Already, our informant tells us, you find some Republicans topping off their crises with Democratic crises and visa versa.

His concern is not with the incumbents and the front runners who have last year to use as a base. But since there is evidence that the Republicans may have as many candidates for governor as the Democrats, the new candidate may be faced with a crisis shortage.

The obvious thing to do is to allocate crises at 85 per cent of the number we had last year. Now some politicians will need more than others. Incumbents obviously have more than they need, if you believe what they tell

The "outs" on the other hand would find it difficult to become an "in" on one crisis alone. The last time this happened was in 1932 when all FDR needed was a depression.

But however it is decided to allocate the crises, the voters should be warned that it may take more than a year before a full quota of crises can be restored and politics again can be expanding at a normal pace.

Clearly, conservation will be necessary. Since it is evident, even if the campaigns are shortened that a candidate could run out of crises by mid-October, he should cut back his speeches 15 per cent during the daytime and possibly as much as 30 per cent at night. Of course this might mean crisis-caused unemploymen because evening newscasters will not be able to fill all the time slots vacated by the politicians. But on the other hand, it might boost employed


This means an Office of Crisis Preparedness is essential if the politician is to be protected against possible verbal violence while he waits for his crisis quota.

Now some will go back to the old crises which generally are still in pretty good shape since they never were really solved but merely replaced with new crises ..

It is rumored that one candidate is even considering reviving such crises as a balanced budget, reduced government spending, and states rights.

It is understood, however, that a massive effort is under way to obtain new sources of crises so that the American political system can become crisis independent by 1980.

We have every confidence that American political ingenuity will rise to this challenge and attain this goal. In the meantime, whenever you hear your favorite candidate talk in glittering generalities and pious platitudes or he or she seems to be dodging the issues, remember, the candidate may be at the point where there is only half-a-tank of crises left and is conserving that until refill





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

Research Workers When the nation's leading cancer scientists get together, as they did here recently, what

is the No. 1 problem they see confronting cancer research

The training of scientists and other cancer workers. They fear that not enough federal money will be available for training researchers; that too many strings attached to what training funds do exist will stifle creativity and that

the national cancer plan will falter for lack of adequate man-The cancer plan, released publicly last August by President Nixon, provides guidelines for harnessing scientific and economic resources to mount

an accelerated attack on the nation's second leading killer. 'Most aspects of the plan cannot be delegated to management personnel without scientific competence," said Dr. James F. Holland of the Mount

Sinai School of Medicine in New

"We urge expansion of its. personnel commitment to manage the plan, to preclude the blan's becoming undermanaged or ineffectively managed. This could only delay the eventual success in the control of cancer," Holland said at a meeting of some 100 scientists who were drafting a revision of

the ambitious plan required under the National Cancer Act of

One concern expressed repeatedly by the eight conference working groups in their reports was with the administration's cutbacks in federal training funds for

researchers. "Our group recommended strongly that the National Institutes of Health biomedical training program be reinstated promptly as the success of the cancer program depends on its ability to attack the most competent young scientists into research," said Joseph L. Melnick, professor and chair-

man of the department of virology at Baylor University. The National Cancer Institute (NCI) which has a major but not exclusive role in the plan is aware of these concerns in the scientific community.

But the administration wants action now on conquering cancer. To that end, federal cancer funds were being increased by 180 per cent since 1969 while research training

funds were being slashed. The arguments that the key solutions to cancer may lie with persons discouraged from research careers by a lack of federal funds or with persons not yet born usually fall on deaf
