





In this day of rising prices, rising taxes, and rising everything else, it is difficult to get public financial support to acquire landmarks for preservation and even tougher, we fear, to get public contributions to buy them. Branford had a historic tree but could not rally the people to preserve

#### Foresight Needed Open Forum

The exercise of hindsight is very soothing to the ego. It gives us a feeling, almost of infallibility, and we wonder why others didn't see things as clearly as we did.

For instance isn't it a good thing that the pleas of so many for gasoline rationing were denied? And those urging the creation of a billion and one-half dollar bureaucracy to administer rationing included such highly placed-figures as Sen. Henry Jackson of Washington.

Rationing would not have produced one more drop of gasoline and might not have spread it out any better than was done by the fantastic and sometimes futile juggling efforts of William Simon's Energy Office.

And do you remember just a few weeks ago when President Nixon, in a press conference, said that the oil crisis was over but the problem remained?

And, of course his critics, and they are many, immediately pointed out to this as an error, since there were still long lines at the gasoline stations.

But he was right, as events proved out. Although Arab oil shipments may be several months away, the lifting of the embargo has eased the shortage situation greatly and will make it possible to draw on reserve supplies, which could not have been touched. otherwise.

And we suspect that a good bit of the shortage was caused by scare or panic buying. A lot of people who couldn't pass a gas line a few weeks ago if their tank was registering less than half full are now driving around with less than that, safe in the knowledge that gas is available at most any sta-

It is, however, time for a little foresightedness. We must make every effort to become energy selfsufficient very soon.

#### INTRODUCTION

During this unprecedented era of inflation problems of budget determinations have become increasingly more difficult. In order to project Town expenditure renuirements for the period ending fifteen to eighteen months from the time the budget is prepared obviously requires intelligent guesstimates dealing with unknown conditions in the national economy.

Fixed costs both in the Town and Board of Education budgets show dramatic increases. Also, with the phase out of the E.E.A. program nearly completed, the Town has to determine whether to fund some of these positions in the regular budget or to reduce services. The gasoline shortage will probably put an extra load on our recreation and library facilities and activities since there is likely to be less out of town travel than in recent years.

Federal Revenue Sharing in the current year was a boon to local government permitting, in our case, both funding for capital improvements and property tax relief. Realistic handling of these funds in the new budget will require thoughtful consideration by the Board of Directors.

The fact that we have not yet negotiated any contracts with our organized employee groups further complicates our budget process this year. We may well end up going to fact finding with some, if not all, of these groups which could mean that final salary figures will not be set until we are into the new fiscal year. The department salary budgets only show increments required under present contracts.

Recent discussions with the Board of Directors confirms a desire to simplify the budget document making it more feasible for the Board to concentrate on general concepts rather than details. The present format was developed over several years and represents the objectives of previous Directors. I look forward to working with the present Board on changes that will reflect your current thinking

#### TAX RATE

A tax rate of 52.33 mills, up 5.67 mills, is recommended to support the general fund budget. An increase of .82 mills to 6.17 is recommended for the Fire District. The Parking Authority for the Special Taxing District has recommended an increase from 8 to 12 mills in order to provide funding for additional off-street parking. The alternative of expanding the district boundaries might be explored. No change is required for water and sewer rates at this time.

#### REVENUE PROJECTIONS

Despite the impact of the Olcott Street Bridge washout, the tornado and ice storm Felix, we feel that we will end the current fiscal year in the black thanks primarily to the availability of Revenue Sharing Funds. Unfortunately, we cannot count on as much from this source next year. In the current year we had available \$1,254,010 reflecting not only the normal revenue sharing allocation for the year but also a carry over from the six month allocations of the previous year and a substantial adjustment to our first allocations.

In the new year we are estimating a total of \$844,000 for new revenue sharing funds plus a carry over of \$113,000 from current year allocations or a total of \$957,000. Of this \$550,000 is recommended for General Fund operations and \$507,000 for Capital Improvements. The reduction from \$772,500 in General Fund allocations in the current year is recommended for two reasons - we anticipate the likelihood that our annual allocations will decrease over the next two years and we feel that we should fund our capital improvements with revenue sharing monies.

Revenue projections from state sources reflect amounts recommended in the Governor's budget. These may change - hopefully upward - by the time the Board of Directors completes budget

The methodology in setting the tax rate is essentially as follows:

- a) Determine the total amount of funds required to be raised to support expenditures
- Determine the amount of money estimated to be received from all sources other than taxes - including use of surplus, if any, revenue sharing and any other state or
- c) The difference between the two figures above represents the amount to be raised from taxes. In determining the tax rate this year a 99% collection rate was anticipated. Due to the fact that under a relatively new state law, property that is completed after the October 1 tax date is entered on the tax roll on a pro-rata basis. This makes it prudent to increase the anticipated collectable by a of one percent.


As can be seen on the attached table entitled Revenue Summary some of our revenue estimates show an increase from prior years - particularly funds from state sources. This is more than offset by the fact that we will not have any surplus from prior year operations to apply toward revenues. This amounted to \$374,000 in the adopted budget for the current year. Also, the amount recommended to be applied from revenue sharing funds has been reduced by \$222,500. The net reduction in funds from sources other than current taxes total \$259,426. One mill on the tax rate represents approximately 284,000 so we are starting our revenue projections, in a sense, one mill

Fortunately we experienced an unusually large grand list increase this year of 6.53% or \$812,832 based on the current tax rate. This will produce the equivalent of 2.85 mills based upon the

#### CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS - CURRENT YEAR

Where the Wild Things Are is about a boy named Max who gets into trouble and is sent to bed without his supper. He sails away to become king of the monsterlike "wild things." Children often call this book, "The Monster Book." It's a favorite. It won the 1963 Caldecott Medal for the best illustrations by an American artist.

Maurice Sendak

Maurice Sendak is one of the world's leading children's book illustrators. In 1970, he won the Hans Christian Andersen Medal, the highest worldwide honor given to an illustrator. He is also an author and has written some of the 60 books he has illustrated.

Mr. Sendak had a terrier named Jennie who lived to be 14 years old. His own favorite book, Higgity Pigglety Pop, is about her. He now has two dogs, a German shepherd named Erda and a Golden retriever named Io.

Mr. Sendak likes to collect


and to read books. He has just taken up needlepoint, which he does while relaxing and watching T V.




#### Hello, Carol Burnett

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


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

#### International Children's Book Day




