





# Election Holiday Best Solution

The U.S. Senate, in the course of its current debate on campaign reform, has adopted an amendment which would delay the release of election results in the earlier time zones until the polls close in the West.

The argument is that with computers able to project the outcome of elections on the basis of a selective sampling of early returns, this trend could influence voting in those time zones where polls are still open.

Until the advent of instant electronic communication and computers, time zone differences were no

The real reason, however, is not that a trend would influence the vote. The fact of the matter, is that once the votes are in East of the Mississippi, presidential contests are virtually wrapped up in most elections. With the exception of California's big block of electoral votes, the combined vote in the other states could rarely change voter turnout.

I receive \$125 a month in student benefits at

A. No you will not lose all your benefits. As your earnings are \$66 over the \$2,400 you are permitted to earn you will lose one-half of that amount over \$2,400 or \$300 in Social Security benefits. Be sure you notify the Social Security office of the wages you expect to earn this year and it is important that you file an annual report of your earnings before April 16, 1975 with the Social Security office.

## St. Pierre Sentenced, Files Notice of Appeal

VERNON (UPI) - For Romeo St. Pierre, 20, of East rehabilitated soon enough," he Hartford and his 19-year-old bride Janice the joys of wedded bliss lasted about one day.

St. Pierre, convicted of firstdegree murder in a liquor store holdup, was sentenced to five to ten years in jail Tuesday in Tolland County Superior Court.

"Tragedy stalked your steps from the night of the burglary," Judge Joseph Dannehy told St. Pierre during sentencing.

### Bids Due April 18
