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The Judge Has A Point

In making a plug for Gov. Thomas Meskill's nomination to the federal bench recently, Judge William H Timbers of Darien, a member of the U.S. Second Circuit Court, pointed out the court needs a judge with significant legislative and administrative experience.

Gov. Meskill's nomination by Sen. Lowell Weicker Jr. has been criticized informally by the American Bar Assn. because the governor, although a lawyer, has not had any experience as a lawyer before the federal court. All we can say is hurrah for Judge Timbers.

It is about time the qualifications for judges were broadened to consider some aspects of a man's background other than his legal credentials.

Even though the U.S. Supreme Court does not require its members to be lawyers, we concede judges should have a legal background and a law degree. However, with so many of the cases being brought before the courts, particularly federal courts, involving the citizen and his troubles with governments high and low, a judge who has served in the legislative and executive branches of government most certainly could provide a judicial perspective that is often needed. Justice is supposed to be blind

n

but this is not to say that our selection of judges must be limited only to courtroom lawyers.

For while judicial decision must be based on sound interpretation of constitutional law, sound interpretation is not a monopoly of those whose background is limited to practice of law only.

If we recall correctly many of our great jurists had very little practical experience as trial lawyers but rather came to the bench from law schools.

Judge Timbers raises a good point in the selection of judges. The courts need judges which represent a much broader spectrum of human and government experience than can be obtained from the narrow criteria so treasured by the American Bar Assn.

We think the ABA has every right to present its views on any candidate's qualifications. However, we would draw the line between presenting these views as a guide to the President in making his decision and their submission in the form that is too often interpreted as a veto. The Constitution delegates the nominating power, with the consent of the Senate, to the President. We think the President should weigh carefully all the advice he has on candidates for judgeships but should not abdicate the selection to the ABA per se.

Pruning Needed Too

Everybody wants more state "responsibility" in meeting the needs of the people in Connecticut. "Responsibility" generally means money, money for schools, money for the towns, and money for various locallyadministered services.

The major foundation for these appeals is the high property tax now required to meet local government and school needs plus the tempting cash surplus in the state treasury.

This need for more state money to reduce the property tax seems to be out of perspective to a degree. For a couple years we have been getting federal revenue-sharing funds to reduce the local tax burden but the burden seems to grow along with government.

Whatever shot-in-the arm the state might give our towns and schools will be short-lived at best. Most budgets are increasing; and, unless state assistance is much more substantial than it appears it will be, the relief to the local property taxpayer is a negative one as our local tax increase is merely less than it would have been without state aid.

In effect, state aid and revenue sharing are stop-gap measures. It appears politically more popular and

easier to shift around the source of tax dollars rather than take a hard look at where the tax dollars are going. Inflation is blamed. More demands

for more services are blamed. The list of reasons why budgets must grow by leaps and bounds is endless.

The proponents of all these vital and essential needs rarely suggest ways and means to meet them other than getting more federal funds, more state funds, or the closing of some vague tax loophole.

In reviewing the changes being made in the state budget with its increases here and increases there, we are more and more convinced the General Assembly, if it is to be a "responsible" partner with the towns and schools, should start looking hard at the whole tax-supported structure with the idea that some pruning might be in order if we are to maintain a state and local government that is sound, essential and really fruitful.

The real question behind the hue and cry about big taxes is not so much that these taxes are tough to pay. Any tax is tough to pay. The real question is that too many of us, rightly or wrongly, do not feel we are getting our tax dollars' worth. When schools, towns, and the state and federal governments can convince us that we are the tax issue will vanish.

GAO Assesses Neighborhood Youth Services

The Department of Health, Education and Welfare subsequently reported in a 1972 study that 155 such bureaus were receiving federal money and that in nine out of 10 cases it came from the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration (LEAA).

Now the General Accounting Office (GAO), which acts as a fiscal watchdog for Congress, has made a study of three youth bureaus to see if LEAA got its money's worth. It concluded that the lack of uniform standards made it impossible to say whether the concept has been successful.

But an optimist, at least, might find grounds for hope. The GOA examined the Youth Eastside Services in Bellevue, Wash.; the Youth Services Bureau in Portland, Ore., and the Project Youth Opportunity in St. Louis.

The bureaus coordinate community youth services, provide services not otherwise available and try to persuade law enforcement agencies to refer young delinquents to the ureaus rather than prosecute them in juvenile court.

The Bellevue youth bureau, which received \$286,922 in the three years ending in June, 1973, had 10 staff members and about 150 volunteers. Working out of an old house, they operated a 24-hour crisis phone, job and counseling centers, a foster care program, parent education programs and a 'flying squad" to provide on-the-scene help to youthful drug users and others. About 20 per cent of the young people using the bureau had comnitted serious crimes.

Turbulence Forecast

DENVER (UPI) - Maury Travis, a 68-year-old prognosticator who five years ago predicted the current gasoline shortage, says the nation is in for a recurrence of the turbulent 1960s with riots in the streets, establishment of a police state and an economic

He predicts that Presider Nixon will escape impeachment and that shortly afterwards civil disturbances will spread throughout the nation.

"Within 24 hours of the House or Senate impeachment failure. riots will break out sporadically," said Travis, who is also noted for his 1949 prediction that air pollution was threatening the health of Denver residents.

"The riots will not only come from professional radical agitators, but by a disillusioned public who naively thought that Vice President Gerald Ford would be a calm interim President until Jan. 20, 1976." Travis, in his "summer scenario 1974," also said that as

a result of the impending civil disobedience, the Nixon administration will embark on the establishment of a police state "disguised as law and order." 'There is no doubt about it.

we are heading for an authoritarian police state and Nixon will use it to soften the effects of landslide Democratic victories in the November elections," he said.

Travis said that his predictions of a "stock market crash late this summer or in the fall" were based on his 40 years of observing business and economic finance.

"I found out through independent study and research that major business panics seem to occur in this country every 2-3 years. That period ended in August of 1966, but we didn't feel it because the federal reserve took on a campaign of deficit financing."

Travis, who holds bachelo and master's degrees in geology from Stanford University, explained that in 1966, Army Gen. William Westmoreland "hollered" for more credit in the midst of the Vietnam War and the reserve reacted by printing worthless money, and as a result, th stock market skyrocketed. "It's six years behind, but its
