Lawsuit **Alleges Oil** Monopoly

HOUSTON (UPI) - A federal lawsuit charges 17 of the world's largest oil compnies with conspiring to monopolize the importation and distribution of foreign crude and asks \$12 million in damages for violation of the Sherman Antitrust Act.

Pan-Islamic Trade Corp. of Houston also said the oil companies conspired to restrain trade and refused to do business with Pan-Islamic. All three allegations,

proven, are violations of ederal antitrust laws. Defendants in the suit on file Tuesday include Exxon Corp., Standard Oil of New Jersey, Atlantic Richfield, Texaco, Gulf, Amerada, Hess Corp., Shell, Commonwealth, Sun, Continental, Mobil, Phillips Petroleum, Standard Oil of Indiana, American, Occidental Petroleum, Tenneco Inc., and

Pan-Islamic alleges the companies refused to buy 40-million barrels of oil annually which it had agreed to purchase from the Algerian government to sell in the United States.

According to court documents filed in U.S. district court, Pan-Islamic entered into a contract with Sonatrach, the national oil company of Algeria, in May, 1972, to buy 80million barrels of oil in 1971-72 with an option to purchase 40million barrels of oil annually for the succeediing four years. Pan-Islamic claims the defendants conspired not to buy oil imported from Algeria, which partially nationalized ownership and production of its oil. Pan-Islamic contends the alleged conspiracy forced cancelation of its contract with



We are now well into spring and the month of April when nature begins to blossom forth in all its verdure, and unhappy taxpayers make ready an accounting to a higher authority, the Internal Revenue Service. It is a time for rejoicing, it is a time for sorrow.

For some, who overpaid their taxes all year, it is a season when they look forward to a check from the government, a refund of their overpayment and return of the money that they let Uncle Sam hold for them, without interest.

Others, whose income is derived from sources not subject to withholding, with long faces and solemn indignation will be calling on their bankers with the annual request for a loan to meet their tax obligations.

We are indebted to James Davidson of the National Taxpayers Union for some blood-curdling examples of the way in which our tax money is spent in grants and appropriations by Congress in its wisdom.

Not all goes for national defense, nor the eradication of disease, or finding cures for malignant and terrible diseases. Our tax money goes for some very bizarre and unbelievable purposes.

Would you believe that \$35,000 o your money was spent for a year of chasing wild boars in Pakistan? Well it was. Or perhaps you would like to read the report - if one has been made - of a \$70,000 expenditure made to study the smell of the perspiration of aborigines in Australia.

For that olfactory project we also bought an odor measuring machine from Turkey at a cost of \$28,361. Now that the project is completed the machine could be used to measure smells emanating from various appropriation bills as they are passed by the Congress.

Do you know that we have a national board of tea tasters? Well we do. And last year and every year they cost us about \$120,000. We also have a board of Tea Appeals. Consider that when you are going through your checkbook carefully looking for items which might possibly be considered deductions.

While you are considering bankruptcy, or moving to Costa Rica, you might mull over the \$68,000 which we paid the Queen of England for not growing cotton on her plantation in Mississippi.

Have you had an invitation from Marshall Tito of Yugoslavia for a cruise on his yacht? It would be fitting if you had. The American taxpayer paid \$2,000,000 for it.

And there are more and more in unbelievable profligacy.

It has always been our belief that the American taxpayer stopped being critical about expenditures shortly after Beardsley Ruml convinced FDR that withholding was the only way to go in tax collecting.

Employe pressure soon had wages and salaries back up to the same takehome pay, and in effect the employer paid the tax. We would be a lot more critical and intolerant of expenditures if all of us had to come up with taxmoney in cash to pay in April. Instead it is done "painlessly" on the installment plan.

A Temporary Setback The world had grown so used to We think, therefore, that a bit of Secretary of State Henry Kissinger's almost miraculous diplomatic coups

jeolousy may have existed and that there was some rejoicing that he had not been able to again walk upon the diplomatic water. This temporary setback in no way

vitiates the renown which he gained in his bringing Egypt and Israel to a cease fire and troop disengagement. Nor does it lessen his accomplishments in working towards a Syrian-Israeli peace beginning.

SALT talks will be resumed because they are as necessary to Russia as they are to us. Neither side, of course, can agree to arms limitation which would greatly change atomic strength.

And oddly it is in the existence of atomic weaponry that hope for a continuation of detente and peace lies.

With both countries fully realizing that it is in the capability of either to annihilate the other, there is a great compulsion to strive for a basic peace, even though jockeying and bargaining continue to take place.

The awesome power of nuclear arms, even though there be some disproportion of relative strength, is such that it makes it imperative that both nations strive to get along.

A terrible scourge, when used, atomic weaponry may be an impelling force for the two great world powers to reach accord. Anything else could lead to a mutual suicide pact.



Nevertheless, the court decided he was guilty as charged. The court said what mattered was not the actual character of the gun but the way it looked to the victim. Most courts agree. That is, they view the holdup weapon "through the eyes of the beholder." They reason that the essence of the crime is putting the victim in fear. which can be done as effectively with a gun that only looks deadly

as with one that really is. There have even been cases of "armed robbery" in which the robber had no weapon at all. Thus another holdup man terrified his victim merely by showing a menacing bulge in his coal pocket. Yet, a court decided this wa enough basis for a charge of armed

robbery. The court said the feat that the robber had a gun, plus the fear that he might use it, was all that the law required by way of intimidation. Still, the fear must be at least

Thrill Watching Historic Homer Just sitting comfortably in my favorite chair-Monday

night, I was thrilled along with millions of other television viewers when Hank Aaron unloaded on an Al Downing pitch and made baseball history. NBC rates a salute for moving up its regularly scheduled Monday night baseball telecasts to bring the all-important opening game from Atlanta. Script writers could never

have done a better job. I disagreed with Braves' owner Bill Bartholomay, who repeated several times in his pre-game statement, "We are honoring the greatest player in baseball history." This point could be argued pro and con until one is blue in the face. Aaron is the greatest home-run hitter ever, and this became fact when he touched home plate after depositing No. 715 into the leftfield bullpen in the fourth inning against Los Angeles.

Hank Aaron is, however, the biggest name in baseball today.

Visits Recalled

I like to recall several visits I've had with Aaron over the years, 18 to be exact. The first occurred in his rookie season with the

Milwaukee Braves at the spring training camp in Bradenton, Fla. Ernie Johnson, a former basketball teammate of mine, was at the time a fine relief pitcher with the Braves. (Johnson is now a Braves' television color man). We were talking outside the Braves' old clubhous

Florida when Aaron walked by. "I'd like you to meet a friend of mine, Henry," Johnson said, and proceeded to introduce me to the new member of the squad. Later that morning, around the batting cage, I started up a conversation with Aaron. "You are not from the South, are you?," Aaron asked.

That was during the period when few white writers spoke to black players; when drinking fountains were marked for whites or blacks only, as well as rest rooms. Black spectators were also sent to segregated areas of the bleachers, far down the right or leftfield lines. Grandstand and box-seat areas were also off limits. Fortunately, these conditions have changed.

Turned on Humor

Two springs ago, I motored up from the New York Yankees' base of operations in Fort Lauderdale, Fla. and was en route to the Boston Red Sox camp in Winter Haven when I stopped off at West Palm Beach.

The scheduled visit was two-fold: To see Tom Kelley, a California Manchester pitcher with the Atlanta Braves, and to talk with Aaron.

The Braves were scheduled to play a night game and the only players in uniform at the park when I arrived were the pitchers, Kelley included.

Jeff Koelsch, of Manchester, a regular visitor on the Grapefruit League circuit for a number of years, was already at Municipal Stadium when I arrived. While Coach Lou Burdette was running the pitchers in

the outfield, two players came strolling out of the clubhouse to get some extra batting practice. One was Hank Aaron, the other Rico Carty. Both sat down next to this writer and Koelsch and we

talked baseball for at least a half hour before Aaron could get someone to serve up some pitches. While on the dugout bench, Aaron, known for his shyness and seriousness, turned on a little humor for the two

Connecticut visitors. Turning to Koelsch, he asked, "I don't think I know you. Do you have a brother in Hollywood?" Koelcsh just grinned and said no.

"I'd swear that you have a twin brother in Hollywood," Aaron continued

"No, I don't. Who are you trying to kid?," Koelsch "I don't kid anybody, but you look just like Jimmy

Durante." Aaron said. Never one to run out of words. Koelsch shot back, "You're no Flip Wilson yourself." Both enjoyed a good laugh before Aaron excused himself

Flu, Chicken Pox **Cases Increase**

HARTFORD (UPI) -Influenza and chicken pox cases virtually doubled in Connecticut last week, the state Department of Health announced Tuesday.
