## Are You Sleeping Well?

The Connecticut National Guard, if we understand the report on the policy issued by Maj. Gen. John F. Freund correctly, will be armed only with riot batons if called on to deal with civil disorders.

However, if a guardsman is wounded by rioters, special sniper squads will be called.

We are at a loss to understand why the general thinks a guardsman faces only the threat of being wounded in a civil disorder. He could be killed.

What is the rationale of publically announcing such a policy other than some misguided public relations gimmick in the light of the tragedy at Kent State?

We have no quarrel with the idea of limiting firearms within the hands of a well-trained specialist squad of guardsmen during a civil disorder. We are aware that there is a need to keep lethal weapons in the hands of men ciplined. However, if we understand

Guard policy, such specialists would not be readily available. Instead of detering mob violence, this knowledge might well promote excesses, since the culprits could be long gone by the time armed reinforcements arrive. So Gen. Freund is to be faulted on

two counts. The new policy does not protect unarmed guardsmen from wounds or even death at the hands of an angry mob, and by publicizing this policy, he has undercut the potential psychological affect of the guard in

We now await word on a new recruiting policy which attempts to convince would-be guardsmen that they should serve knowing their heads might have to be cracked before their armed buddies can protect them.

## Siberia — A Tourist Trap?

With little fanfare, the inaugural flight of a new weekly service between Washington, D.C., and Moscow took off the other day from **Dulles International Airport.** 

Aboard the IL-62 turbojet, flagship of Aeroflot, the Soviet airline, were American travel writers, legislators and other VIPs invited to sample the tourist attractions of the Soviet Union and to discover first-hand whether the Russians are serious about this business of "detente" - not just on a government-to-government level but a people-to-people one.

They apparently are, judging from statements by Aeroflot, which up to now has been restricted to operating only from New York. An official expressed hope that the new Washington-Moscow service would present the opportunity of discovering the "unknown" Soviet Union to a wider segment of the U.S. travel public.

"There is much more to the Soviet Union that Ameircan tourists should be aware of," said an Aeroflot spokesman in good old American public-relationsese. "In addition to the cultural, historic and leisure appeal of our large cities such as Moscow, Leningrad and Kiev, we think Americans will be pleasantly surprised by the subtropical climate and lush, tranquil beauty of our Black Sea Coast."

He went on to describe "fairylike winters with bright sunshine, sparkling snowflakes and dry frost, more bearable than the bone-chilling dampness of winters in the northeastern U.S." Still waiting to be discovered "are ski and winter resorts, which should have a special appeal to active sports enthusiasts."

If you're enthusiastic enough, you can book a round-trip, firstclass seat

for \$1,117. Economy fares will range from \$836 in the fall and winter to \$1,-034 during the peak spring and

To make you even more enthusiastic, Paris, the one stop on the flight, is thrown in as a "bonus." Tourism, like every other aspect of international dealings, is a two-way street, of course. After all, restrictions on travel by Russians in this country have only been in response to similar restrictions on Americans in


The Soviets seem to appreciate this fact, and it constitutes a - excuse the word - revolutionary departure from traditional Russian xenophobia. Said the same Aeroflot official:

"We hope that the sight of Americans strolling beside the Moscow River eating blini and Russian visitors eating hot dogs along the banks of the Potomac will be commonplace rather than a rarity."

Yet one wonders if they realize what they could be starting. Russians strolling along the Potomac will absorb a lot more of the American way of life than wieners and buns. And American rubber-neckers in Moscow or Leningrad or elsewhere, with their free and easy manners, will leave as much an impression on the Russians they meet as they will take away with

Ruth was enjoying good health at the time and the big tomato-faced all-time baseball idol was up to 250 pounds and admitted to being 50 years of age. Less than three years later, on Aug.16, 1948, Ruth died of throat cancer.

Late in the exhibition, Cliff Keeney of Manchester, standout second baseman with the Gems, picked up his favorite bat and started to take his place in the batter's box when Manager Jigger Farrell of the Gems decided to Even before the public address announcement could be

made of the lineup change, the fans were standing and cheering. The Babe had picked up two of his famous Louisville Sluggers and on spindly legs was walking up toward the plate. He was attired in a special baseball uniform with the game sponsor's name emblazoned across the front of the shirt.

Out of organized baseball since 1935, when he finished up with the Boston Braves in the National League, Ruth did not have that extra magic still working in his bat. With a runner on first, Ruth dribbled a fat pitch back to

the box and was an easy out at first but few really cared except the Babe. "I was sure I could hit one over the fence, I let a lot of people down," he told me in the small business office un-

der the first base stands. Keeney is still a local milkman, serving as president of the Dari-Maid Milk Co. on Keeney St.

That memorable occasion, the last time Ruth's name ever appeared in a box score, is still fresh in my mind after nearly 30 years. There was only one Babe Ruth.

I'm just glad I had a chance to see him play once, even if it was after he had long passed his peak. Babe Ruth's last official baseball appearance was on Sunday, Sept. 30, 1945 in Hartford, Conn.

# Lifting of TV Blackout Will Damage Pro Football

television balckout policy by Congress will damage pro football in the long run despite a government report that it had little effect last season.

A study released Thursday by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) said the statute requiring pro football to allow televising of home games "appears to have had minimal impact on the 26 member teams of the National Football League in its first season of operation.' "It is unlikely that season ticket sales will be adversely affected by the law because there seems to be an excess demand for tickets," the report said. "In fact, 1973 was the best season ever for the NFL, and early reports on ticket sales for the 1974 season indicate a strong demand for available tickets."

Congress, just before the 1973 season began, ordered that for a three-year trial period pro football allow the televising of home games in the local area whenever the contest was sold out 72 hours in advance.

Rozelle, responding to the report which challenged almost all of his contentions in opposing enactment of the legislation, issued a statement saying: "We testified con-cerning this experimental legislation that no serious effects would be felt in 1973 because 90 per cent of all tickets had been sold (when the bill was enacted). "Our basic fear ... concerns the long-range effects of televising home games in the home area," The NFL chief said. "Several clubs, including Super Bowl champion Miami, have noted such season ticket sale erosion for the






