### Tolland School Tax Exempt

The Hans Christian Anderson Montessori School, Inc., of Tolland has received an Internal Revenue Service ruling recognizing its tax-exempt status. District IRS Director Joseph J. Conley Jr. has reported.

The school, on Gothic Lane, was recognized for announcing a racially nondiscriminatory policy in admission of students to all school activities, Conley said.

The ruling was issued under a 1970 IRS policy which stated that it would only recognize tax-exempt status of private schools if they didn't practice racial discrimination. Conley said the IRS maintains a vigorous program of auditing tax-exempt organizations.

Approximately 25 Andover residents attended the Board of Finance meeting at the Elementary School Wednesday evening. The purpose of the meeting was to present a tentative budget for the 1974-75 fiscal year.  
The estimated budget for 1974-75 was set at \$1,095,529. This figure was arrived at by combining the estimated general fund budget, \$699,790; education budget, \$383,349; additions to previous budget, \$11,500 (including estimated deficit in 1973-74 Board of Education budget); and provisions for uncollected taxes, \$9,900.  
Means of financing this budget would come from taxation, \$757,272; estimated income, \$275,254; appropriation of surplus, \$30,800; and revenue sharing, \$32,600.  
Although Andover residents have not yet voted to hire a resident state policeman, this cost was included in the tentative budget. Cost for police protection was set at \$15,700. Final vote on the issue of a resident state trooper will take place at the Annual Budget meeting.

## State Investments Raise Eyebrows

By ROBERT LAMBERT  
HARTFORD (UPI) — George R. Neilson, 28, Connecticut's official stock trader, is investigating retirement funds in a program that is trampling on traditional concepts of government finance.  
The unorthodox investing program, which raised eyebrows on Wall Street, is being reviewed by the state auditor's office.  
To keep one of the program's features intact, the state has had to appeal to the U.S. Supreme Court to allow Nutmeg Securities Inc., the nation's first brokerage firm owned by a governmental body, to keep a seat on a stock exchange.  
Neilson, a West Hartford native and Harvard University Business School graduate, buys and sells securities for teacher and state worker pensions. He gets advice from a special group of stock advisors.  
The pension funds, comprised of bonds and common stock, are worth \$70 million.  
Boost Yield  
The program was started nearly two years ago by former state Treasurer Robert I. Berdon, now a superior court judge, who wanted to boost the yield of pension fund investments as a hedge against inflation.  
Unfortunately for the performance of the stock program, the market plummeted shortly after the program was started and losses as of the end of 1973 were pegged at \$48 million.  
But Neilson, who maintains the daily contact with a group of 15 brokers, believes that the losses will be made up when the stock market recovers as interest rates fall and investors return.  
Neilson, who has a video display terminal on his desk showing the latest prices on the major markets, is buying stock at an average rate of \$6 million a month.  
The goal of the program is to achieve a 9-10 mix of conservative bond holdings and potentially more profitable securities.  
Oil Exploration  
The state portfolio ranges from safe government bonds to more exotic gambles like oil explorations.  
The pension fund plan as well as the entire operation of the state Treasurer's office is under review by the state auditor's office, watchdogs of the state purse.  
Chief concern to auditor Leo Donohue is Nutmeg's move away from the safety and security of savings bank and "prudent man" investments to the riskier terrain of Wall Street.

## Was Sunken Sub An Oil Slick?

MEDFORD, Ore. (UPI) — A World War II B25 bomber crew decorated for the sinking of a Japanese submarine off the Oregon coast probably sank an oil slick instead, a research journalist has concluded.  
The "sinking" off the mouth of the Columbia River Christmas morning, 1941, has been the subject of a debate for three decades.  
Three Army Air Corps officers were credited with the alleged feat. Their aircraft later flew in the Tokyo raid led by Gen. James Doolittle.  
Journalist Bert Webber of Medford, Ore., concluded Wednesday, after a research project, that the supposed "sunken" submarine returned in the early 1942 to sink several more ships. It also shelled Pt. Stevens near Astoria, Ore., he reported.  
"The B25 surely did bomb something but it was not any Japanese submarine," Webber said. "The target of the B25's bombs early that Christmas morning probably was an oil slick."  
Webber explained that the former executive officer of the

**FDA Says Vitamin E Is Not 'Miraculous'**

Vitamin E is being sold in unprecedented amounts in the United States today, and it is believed the claims made by some people, vitamin E can cure just about anything.

The Food and Drug Administration (FDA) has just published a report on vitamin E which reviews the scientific evidence and concludes: "Vitamin E has not been proved scientifically to have any of the 'miraculous' effects being claimed for it. And FDA sees no reason for persons in good health and eating a well-balanced diet to use a dietary supplement."

The article is contained in FDA's official magazine "FDA Consumer" (available for \$5.30 for 10 issues from Superintendent of Documents, Government Printing Office, Washington, D. C. 20462).

FDA pointed out in the article that an extensive examination of the medical literature and evaluation of studies on humans shows the intake of vitamin E is a person gets from a well-balanced diet is adequate to maintain health.

FDA found no evidence that normal or even excessive amounts of vitamin E are harmful. Vitamin E is present in large quantities in leafy vegetables, whole grain foods, and vegetable oils.

The article cites one study that found great success with vitamin E in treating patients with angina pectoris, a form of heart disease, but added that subsequent studies at several institutions led to the conclusion that such patients were not benefited.

Under new regulations issued by the FDA, vitamin E can be sold as a dietary supplement in capsules up to 45 International Units. Capsules with higher doses must be labeled and sold as non-prescription drugs.

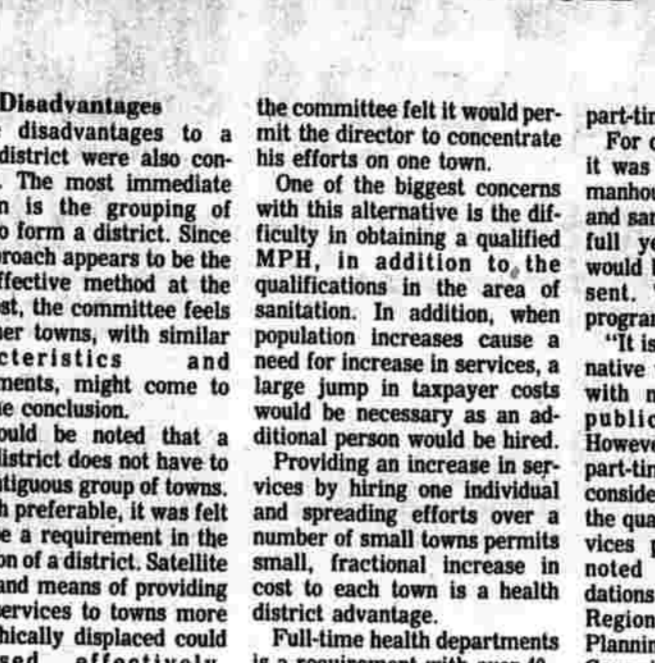
After studying the services that the Tolland Health District Study Committee felt the town should have to adequately provide for the public health of its residents, discussions centered on the methods of providing those services.
