



Rhode Island Statute Challenged

PROVIDENCE, R. I. (UPI)-Three marine pilots are challenging a 1971 Rhode Island law which requires merchant ships from foreign ports to pay fees for transversing Block Island Sound on the way to Connecticut docks.

They filed suit Tuesday in U.S. District Court against the Rhode Island State Pilotage Commission, Gov. Philip W. Noel and state Attorney General Richard Israel.

Pilots Kenneth H. Warner, Richard C. Losch and Michael D. Ball, all of Connecticut, claim that the Rhode Island Pilotage Commission is interferring with their employment by not allowing them to pilot ships through Block Island Sound to ports in Connecticut. All three hold marine pilots licenses from Connecticut and the U.S. Coast Guard.

Their legal action challenges the right of Rhode Island to require a tariff fee from the foreign port ships and to deny them a Rhode Island pilotage

The 1971 law requires vessels en route from foreign ports to Connecticut to pay Rhode Island a pilotage fee plus a tax for crossing Block Island

Warner said that as a result of a letter sent to the Gulf Oil Trading Co., by Charles Replinger, chairman of the Rhode Island Pilotage Commission, he has been denied work and an annual salary of up to \$30,000

The letter stated that Warner did not have a Rhode Island pilots license and could not pilot a ship through the sound, which the state considers Rhode Island waters.

Attorney Martin Malinou, of Providence, who filed the suit, said, "It's as if Rhode Island passed a law governing the high seas. These ships pass through waters that are more than two miles off the coast of Rhode Island.

"We are saying that Block Island Sound is so large that there is no reason for Rhode Island to impose an undue burden on foreign shipping. We consider Block Island Sound open seas and not under the dominion of Rhode Island." Late last year, the Rhode Island law was branded as

"piracy, 20th century style," by Connecticut state Sen. George L. Gunther, R-Stratford. "At a time when we are

trying to encourage our port development, it is absolutely intolerable that this practice is allowed to continue," Gunther

Connecticut shippers have protested that the fees place Connecticut in a competitive position inferior to ports on Rhode Island and may divert shipping away from Connecticut to Rhode Island. They say it would be easier and cheaper for the ships to stop in Rhode Island and unload their cargoes, then to continue on to Connecticut at a higher cost.

New York also imposes similar law. Connecticut officials have estimated that Rhode Island and New York collected nearly \$400,000 in 1972 from ships that traveled to

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A Wise Approach

A Measure of Tolerance?

We applaud Gov. Thomas J. Meskill's creation of a fact-finding task force to assess the impact of possible oil exploration and refinery construction.

We are especially pleased the study group has been directed to make a purely exploratory effort rather than attempt to make conclusions, select sites, or formulate policy.

Free from pressures inherent in such decisions, the group should be able to compile and organize input from all elements involved so that those who may have to make the decisions will have a complete and objective basis upon which such decisions should be made.

Despite the region's lack of oil production and refining capacity there is no need to rush into any action which may later be regretted.

As the cost of oil increases and until the nation as a whole reaches a goal of energy self-sufficiency, the pressures for this type of development remain and will increase.

Therefore the governor, in setting up his task force representing his administration, the state Department of Environmental Protection, the state energy office, commerce commissioner and industry, has acted correctly in approaching this problem from a broad spectrum rather than in a crisis climate aimed at meeting narrow immediate desires.

We believe once the report is completed and presented to the people in an objective matter the decisions, which will have to be made, can be made in a climate of reason and what is in the best interest of Connecticut for the short-term as well as for generations to come.

Open Forum

If you stop to think about it a little, it should not be any surprise that more crimes are committed than are reported to the police.

The recent survey conducted by the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration disclosed that in five major cities, the crime rate was more than twice the figures reported by police to the FBI under the Uniform Crime Reporting system which attempts to present a statistical progress report on whether crime is increasing or decreasing in a community.

The implication of the study is that reported crime statistics may be misleading since all crimes are not reported to the police by the public.

The reasons for these can be varied according to the community involved. Most of us, at one time or another, probably has had something stolen from our homes or cars and didn't bother to report it because "it wasn't worth the time or trouble."

In some cases we may have chosen not to report the theft or vandalism because we knew the culprit and didn't want to cause trouble over such a trivial thing. We might have bawled the kid out, or even had the courage to mention it to his parents, but we didn't go to the police.

So first there is a natural reluctance on our part to report any crimes we are victims of or witness because we don't want to get involved - unless of course it was a major crime.

Secondly, we know there is a lot of crime which goes unreported because too many of us have an attitude that it is meaningless to do so since 1, The police won't do anything; 2, if they do catch the culprit, some smart lawyer will get him off; and 3, if he is found guilty, the judge and the courts will only slap his wrists and turn him

Which leads us to our point.

We all know there are more crimes committed than are reported to police. The rationalizing we do is a

too human and is not new for we would venture this has been true ever since man began his attempts to live under some code of laws.

Our tolerance of crime is the key to the quality of law enforcement we have which in turn determines the effectiveness of each community's crime control.

FBI statistics are still valid in the sense the figures do provide a yardstick for measuring community attitudes. If the number of reported crimes increases, it may not mean more crimes are committed, but that people are getting concerned.

Conversely, if there is a drop, maybe we should be concerned too since it might not mean fewer crimes are being committed but rather that fewer are being reported and there may be a deteriorating moral climate in the community.

But whatever reliance we wish to place in statistics, the fact of the matter is that crime thrives because we, as individual citizens, too often ignore it until it comes close to home. Even when it does we may cop out rather than get involved.

The tragedy is that our individual tolerance of crime is part and parcel of community tolerance and affects the whole community.

The statistics are not a reflection of police and court efficiencies or deficiencies as much as they are a projection of our collective moral attitudes

Today, the adage that crime does not pay does not apply as it once did. Too many of us are willing to pay as much or more not to become involved. rather than pay the price of more policemen, courts and correctional facilities, which we would need if all crimes were reported and prosecuted. No, there is no comfort in the statistics. Something to think about perhaps. But since people do not change much overnight, we doubt the statistics will either.

Foreign News Analysis Restructuring **Of OAS Not** Well Defined

UPI Foreign News Analyst When Secretary of State Henry Kissinger and his Latin American friends talk about 'restructuring" the Organization of American States (OAS), it is clear they not always are talking about the same thing. The hemispheric attitude toward Cuba is a case in point. In Atlanta, Ga., where the 23nation OAS will be meeting for the rest of this month. Kissinger outlined a new "good partner" policy of the United tates toward its Caribbean and Latin American neighbors.

He did not mention Cuba Later, he told newsmen the United States has no intention presumably setting to rest speculation that the U.S. was about to change its attitude toward Fidel Castro's Communist island nation at the U.S.

Athletics Encourage **Fad Diets**

By Lawrence E. Lamb, M.D. DEAR DR. LAMB - Reading of your disapproval of fad diets, I think you should comment on some of the weightlosing programs I saw in my association with secondar school wrestling. These are motivated by the desire to compete in a lighter weight

It was quite common fo heavier boys to lose 15, yes 15 pounds or more the first night of practice. A close friend of mine lost a total of 19 pounds through the season to wrestle at lighter weight. He said the ast few pounds really came off hard. All he ate for a week was an orange; on a heavy exercise program to boot. Many of them severely restricted drinking liquids a large part of the time. The idea was to eat like a

king the weekend after the meet, and then starve, run in sweatsuits and take steam baths until the next meet. They sometimes took laxatives for the sake of losing weight. I remember one with two or three pounds to lose about eight hours before weigh-in, so he ran and steamed until it was off. When the last meet was fin-

ished the friend who lost 19 pounds put all 19 pounds back on in two days. I wish I knew whether or not these teenagers took vitamins or nineral supplements hey were fasting, but I doubt

that they did. You would do a public service by warning of the possible repercussions of such starving and drying out. My friend said that he had done things he wouldn't nor-mally do the week he fasted. I find it horrible that our horrible that our bublic schools cultivate such hings. Don't you? DEAR READER - That's

awful. As your letter demon-strates in the case of your friend who regained all 19 pounds he lost in just two days, most of the loss was water loss. This also means a here of railt and mainr disturloss of salt and major disturbance in the body chemistry. Under such circumstances n the amount o the body is decreased by eliminating water from the bloodstream.

Your description is impor-tant to other people losing weight because it points out that steam baths and a lot of these procedures, even when you lose 19 pounds, do not eliminate fat — just the water the body normally needs. Most people don't real-ize that the normal body is about holf water. Over 20 per about half water. Over 70 per cent of the weight of our mus-cles is water. When you dry a person out you seriously affect the way all the vital cells in the body work, even those in the brain. Also, such people are more prone to

Water loss from weightlessness in space flight has a similar effect. The loss is nothing like what you de-scribe. Astronaut Ed White lost about nine pounds when he was on the flight with his space walk, but he told me h regained most of it the first day back. He regained the normal amount of water for earthlings. Those interested in losing weight safely with-out dangerous fads can get more information by writing to me in gare of this newspa per, P.O. on losing weight. Send 50 cents/to cover costs. Those 15-pounds losses during the first night's practice are mostly water and salt it comes right back. The weatsuits simply contribute to draining the water and salt out of the body. This saps energy in a number of insces. This is not the way to train our youth to have a healthy body and develop healthy living patterns. And, I think it is rather poor sportsmanship to try such gimmicks so you can wrestle omeone who, is really smaller than you.


Report Earnings

PITTSBURGH (UPI) -Several of the nation's largest oil producing companies, including Standard Oil Co. (Indiana) and Gulf Oil, have reported first quarter earnings considerably higher than a year

Gulf reports its first quarter figure at \$290 million, or \$1.49 per share, up 76 per cent over the 1973 quarter when income was \$165 million, or 80 cents a

Indiana Standard's first quarter figures for 1974 were even more impressive with estimated earnings of \$219 million, 81 per cent higher than for the same period the previous year. The per share figures were \$3.13, compared with \$1.74 last year for the same three months.

The Standard report attributed the major portion of the increase to what it termed higher foreign petroleum earnings and increased profits from chemical operations. Ashland Oil Inc., Ashland, Ky., reported a 40.5 per cent increase in earnings in the six months ended March 31 to \$2.15 a share from \$1.50 a year ago. Net income was \$53.8 million against \$38.3 million a year ago. Earnings for the second quarter were 75 cents a share up from 61 cents a year ago. **Gas** Prices May Be Stabilizing WASHINGTON (UPI) - Both supplies and prices of gasoline appear to have stabilized over much of the nation, the American Automobile Association said Tuesday. The AAA said its weekly survey of gasoline stations, covering all states but Alaska, showed that only 2 per cent were out of gasoline. Highest averages were 58 cents for regular in Michigan and 61 cents for premium in New York. Texas had the lowest for both-50 cents for regular, 54 cents for premium. The tightest supplies, as in the past, were reported in the Northeast - Connecticut, Maine, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, Rhode Island and Vermont-where more than 8 per cent were still limiting purchases and more than 3 per cent were out of fuel. The best overall fuel availability, for the fourth consecutive week, was in a yixstate area including Colorado, Montana, the Dakotas, Utah and Wyoming, with only one of 327 stations surveyed limiting purchases and none out of fuel. New York, Maryland, Delaware and Hawaii still have mandatory odd-even rationing systems in effect following Virginia's dropping of its system last week. Some major turnpikes also continue to practice the odd-even plan and stations along most of these
