Inflation Hurts Everyone

your real estate man tells you that the house you bought four or five years ago is now saleable at a price of four or five thousand dollars more than you paid for it, don't congratulate yourself too much.

Unless you have made large expenditures for improvements of house or grounds it is pretty much the same house you bought; the land on which it stands is the same, and it will still render the same services to the same number of people which it did the day you moved in.

Dollars are just of less worth, hence your home is worth more of them. That's one sign of inflation which is so disguised that we often think ourselves lucky when told it would take more dollars to buy an equivalent home today.

If you have good credit, maintain a sizeable balance at your bank and are in many ways a desirable customer you may have quite a shock coming if you need to borrow money.

The prime rate of interest, that which banks charge to its best industrial or commercial customers. has hit an all time high of 11 per cent in some banks.

You may find that you will have to pay 12 per cent or more for an un-

Not so long ago you could have gone into the same bank, under the same circumstances, and have borrowed the same amount of money and paid 6 per cent interest compared with today's 11 per cent.

It takes almost twice as many inflated dollars to borrow the same amount which you could have had two years ago for about half the rate, and the money was sounder. That's a little hard to understand.

industry and business are so geared to an inflationary trend that many will take your order today for delivery some months away but will not quote you on a price. They are unable to estimate accurately what a piece of merchandise, such as a truck, will cost three or four months hence.

It used to be that you could sign a contract for delivery, the manufacturer could estimate his cost of materials and labor pretty closely and you would have a firm price to pay for your order when it was manufactured.

That's inflation. And it adds to the cost of everything the consumer uses, right down to the box of cereal or can of tomatoes which may be delivered in that truck with the uncertain price.

The single greatest cause of the inflation, which is robbing all of us, is governmental deficit financing, excessive federal spending, and particularly military spending which creates goods and machinery which do not add one penny to the gross

Wage contracts, too, may be inflationary, if they are just keyed to cost of living needs, or strike-won benefits. Unless wage increases are backed by increase productivity they injure the very people who get the short term gain, by the inflationary trend which they accelerate.

Politicians are afraid to reduce inflationary trends because they may result in a rise in unemployment and unpopularity at the polls.

Inflation is the greatest problem facing us and the rest of the world. The brakes must be applied somewhere, sometime if we are to avert great economic distress.
