

Beers, was to get the community involved and the first meeting was attended by representatives of the church, school, university, bench, bar, hospital, general medicine, psychiatry and social work. The second meeting, a month later, was attended by 108 citizens who drew up a constitution







Main Street Ownership

Hearings

Manchester directors are faced with a difficult decision Tuesday evening as to whether the town should take back control of Main Street from the state.

We suppose Town Manager Robert Weiss is justified in informing the directors that in due time the cost of town ownership could be in excess of one million.

At the same time, though, no estimate is available from the state on what it might spend in the future if it keeps ownership.

Equally disturbing is that the state has made no financial estimate of what it has spent since it took ownership.

Nearly everyone agrees the town made a mistake when it turned over the streets to the state but that doesn't soothe the crisis that faces us

The big cost to the town would be ebuilding the street yet no one has

told us when that would probably be necessary. We have heard reports of six years, eight years, and even 10 years and beyond. The crux of the situation as we see it

is as follows: If the town regains control of Main Street, there is a strong possibility that downtown can still be revitalized. We might be able to keep some of the tax-paying businesses and maintain a fairly healthy tax base. In time, we

might also be able to convince the state to consider another route for the movement of through traffic and particularly truck traffic. If the state keeps control we can

look forward to a street which will be utilized for moving traffic only and not one geared to downtown shopping. If the town doesn't wish to take back ownership then we might as well fold all the committees, task forces, that have studied downtown Manchester nearly to death. It is just that simple.



Let's keep our minds open. Let's remember the strength of this nation has been the ability of its people and its basic institutions to survive whatever challenge that may arise, depressions, wars or impeachments.

On the pitching side, Beeler finished with a 3-0 record while Bilodeau concluded with a 4-3 won-lost figure.



Rhody Budget Shaky

PROVIDENCE, R.I. (UPI)-The fiscal 1975 Rhode Island budget is built on the shaky stilts of deficit spending and esimated surpluses, which hint of substantial tax hikes nex

The \$425.9 million request rom Gov. Philip W. Noel was enacted by the state Senate Saturday during the waning moments of the 1974 session. Upon passage, there was a ipartisan feeling that this year's estimated surplus of \$34.2 million would not be nough to support the new ecord-high budget.

There was not one Democratic legislative leader n either the House or Senate who felt certain there would not be a tax increase next year. All privately said there would

be fiscal troubles next year. Two Democratic represenatives said the blame should be out upon Washington and the ailure of Nixon administration economic policies.

The enacted budget calls for pending of \$425.9 million but evenues of only \$393.9 million in the new fiscal year. It depends heavily on the \$34.2 million surplus expected in the fiscal period ending June 30, 1974. House financial advisors are projecting a \$1.5 million surplus when the new year is

Protocol Isn't The Problem

HOUSTON (UPI) Technical knowledge rather than political protocol will be the deciding factor in-solving emergency problems during the July, 1975, joint U.S.-Soviet spaceflight, a Russian official said last week.

Professor Konstatin D Bushuyev, the Soviet technical director for the first international flight, said the prospect of flight emergencies did not worry him.

"It is technology that is the eciding factor and we shall seek a rational solution." Bushuyev said in a news conerence. "In Apollo and Soyuz respectively, it is the commander of the vehicle who is in charge. That problem does notworry me."

The Soviets were in Houston for a three-week meeting on the mission which will have an American Apollo and a Soviet Soyuz link up in orbit for two days of joint work and experiments.

The technical discussions have centered on the role of the crews and compatibility of communications and life support systems. "We are continuing to give

attention to flight safety," said Bushuyev. "We did a great deal to assess the safety of the control systems." Glynn S. Lunney, director of

the American group, said tests on the communications systems had proved satisfactory. "The tests were very exten-

sive and very detailed," Lunney said. "The equipment worked well and up to our specifications." The Soviets will visit the

Cape Canaveral launch site in February, 1975, and the American group will go to the Soviet launch site in May, 1975, for familiarization with the spacecraft and to conduct tests on compatible equipment.

Bushuyev said although newsmen would not be allowed at the launch site for the blastoff, there would be a news center, television coverage and detailed reports concerning conversations between the spacemen and ground controllers and between the two spacecraft.
