We're Optimistic

Secretary of State Henry Kissinger is again well into another round of the "shuttle diplomacy" for which he has become famous. His task or effort again is the herculean one of trying to beat out a lasting peace in the Middle

The knottiest problem before him now is the settlement of the Israel-Syrian disputes and a troop disengagement where fighting still continues.

Hostilities have quieted in that conflict, except for the small but intense battles which are being waged for strategic Mt. Hermon in the Golan

There is strong reason to believe that Russia has re-supplied Syria with sophisticated ground to air missiles to help overcome the acknowledged superiority of the Israel air force.

It may well be, also, that the Soviets are using these fought over areas as proving grounds or laboratories for field testing new arms in actual com-

We think there is a ray of hope, however, in the manner in which the Golan Heights struggle is being limited and is not spreading to other sectors, as it well could.

The battles seem to be efforts to gain strategic heights which may be found claims of possession in any final settlement of Israel-Syrian boun-

The side that goes to peace talks with a firm hold on militarily important areas will undoubtedly try to claim these for their country because of prior possession.

Thus, as long as the skirmishes continue to be very localized in the Golan Heights, as they have been, we take it as an indication of intent to finally come to the bargaining table.

How's Your **Blood Pressure?**

Casper W. Weinberger secretary of Health, Education and Welfare, had his blood pressure taken in public before reporters and photographers' cameras the other day for one reason. He was inaugurating National Blood Pressure Month by reminding the 23 million Americans that suffer from the disease to have their blood pressures taken and save their lives.

At the same time, Weinberger held a press conference to state that high blood pressure and the ailments that go with it kill 60,000 Americans every year. And that when other common consequences of high blood pressure are added, such as stroke and kidney failure, they contribute to the death or disability of 1.5 million persons. "That's a staggering toll, par-

A public opinion survey shows that persons don't know what is normal blood pressure. Many who suffer from high blood pressure don't realize it is serious. Since the first evidence of high blood pressure may well be heart failure, or a stroke or some loss of vision, or even of death itself, the importance of alerting the general public to the possibility and to the seriousness of high blood pressure cannot be stressed too much. See your doctor. Taking your blood pressure is

simple. Drugs and diet reduce the

pressure for most persons.

Neither Syria, Egypt, or Israel is capable of maintaining a prolonged military effort without the help of one of the two super powers. Israel's economy is in great distress as the result of the recent full-scale war.

In spite of the depth of ancient hatreds and grievances the Middle Eastern combatants may truly be looking for peace. And at the same time they may fear that they may bargain away their independence to Russia in return for military aid.

We think Dr. Kissinger is carrying out a mission which will be successful, although perhaps not as relatively quickly as was the case with Egypt and Israel.

A little salt placed on the cover of a churn would keep witches away from the milk within. Another old belief tells us that witches had to count salt as a countercharm but, because they were such busybodies they

would give up the impossible task and leave the house. The Greeks and the Romans each had a goddess of salt, the toman one was called Salus. Supposedly she was present at the birth of a child. A little salt was placed on the tongue of the baby in her name. This depicted long life, good health and future protection. Usually the taste of the salt would make the baby cry. The salty tears combined with the salt of the goddess. If the baby did not cry, it was a poor sign indeed indicating an

In no case was American

retaliation so severe. It was the late Harry ! Truman who warned those who couldn't stand the heat to stay out of the kitchen. Palme no only never was in the Vietnam kitchen, he also never had to take its heat. His position was that even though neutral Sweden still had the right to speak out on world affairs. In the case of Vietnam, it led


