For many years, most Americans thought that bicycles were toys for children. Now, with the energy problem and the interest in ecology, the bike has become an important means of transportation for many adults.
The cycle boom began in the 1960's when bike salesmen began importing many-speed bikes from Europe. These bikes were much easier to ride than the standard American type. Adult cyclists found they did not have to huff and puff up hills. The bike became a good way to get exercise without too much strain.

Bike sales have zoomed. Last year 14 million bikes were sold, almost twice as many as in 1971.
All over the country, city traffic experts are talking about cycle lanes and cycle parks. New laws are being considered to protect the cyclist. Safety rules are more important than ever.

In 1973, the United States government did a study and found that bicycles and bicycle equipment were the products that caused the most accidents. In one year alone, over 372,000 cyclists were hurt so badly they had to go to the hospital for treatment.
