A sixth body, that of Camilla Hall, 29, was found Sunday.

James Johnson, 18, who lived at the home destroyed in the gunfight, told the Los Angeles Times that Miss Hearst fled from the house less than 24 hours before the shootout.

Charges against Johnson's mother, Christine Johnson, 35, of harboring fugitives, were dropped Sunday night and she was released, police said today. Johnson said Miss Hearst told him last Thursday that: 'They'll have to kill me before

I go back.' 'She told me she was with them - on their side," Johnson

said. He said Miss Hearst was wearing a pistol and wanted to stay with the others, but they apparently sent her away to keep her from being involved in the gunfight.

"I think some (black) brothers tipped them off that the cops were onto them and that's why they got Patty out of there - you know, their love for her," he said.







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'The Rascals' **Staying Power**

It has been widely said that this is the year incumbents will be turned out, no matter what their party. A first primary test in Texas refuted this idea. The rebellion against incumbents failed to materialize there. "The rascals" not only were not thrown out, they showed unexpectedly strong staying power.

Gov. Dolph Briscoe overwhelmed Mrs. Frances T. Fahrenthold, the state's best known woman politician, getting 70 per cent of vote. Mrs. Fahrenthold, a 47-year-old lawyer, was a 5-2 underdog among gamblers, but her big defeat was surprising.

The race that had national significance was 80-year-old Rep. Wright Patman's for the Democratic nomination for member of the House from the First Texas District. Patman will be running for his 23d term this fall. He is the dean of the House, and chairman of the Banking and Currency Committee.

Two men challenged Patman for the nomination, campaigning on an issue of age. Patman made the strongest campaign of his career and won handily. They said he was too old. They did not reckon with the huge goodwill Patman had built through the years of service to his district. He will face opposition in the general election in November but is expected to be returned to his seat.

Usually, 50 to 60 per cent of the eligible voters participate in Texas primaries. If there were any conclusions to be drawn from the turnout, it is that while not enough were interested in "throwing the rascals out," only 28.3 per cent were interested enough to keep them in.

The turnout was 1.5 million out of 5.3 million eligibles, the poorest ever in Texas. Yet in almost every race in the state, the incumbents won.

Public Funding

"The first, giant step toward removing the evil of the large, private contributions from gubernatorial paigns," was the way Goy. Bren dan Byrne of New Jersey described the law he signed, providing public funds for the campaigns of candidates for governor in general elections. In his inaugural address four

months ago, Byrne had said he wanted his administration to be remembered as the last one elected in the "marketplace of private financial campaign contributions." His Legislature gave the bill an early priority.

The new law limits individual contributions to \$600. It provides that,

after a candidate raises \$40,000 to finance his campaign, he becomes eligible to receive \$2 in state funds for every dollar he raises. Every additional dollar is then worth \$3. Earlier, campaign spending was limited, by another law, to 50 cents for every voter who cast a ballot in the last Presidential election, which means, for the state, \$1.5 million.

The governor's attention now is turned to a companion measure that would extend public financing to primary elections. That would shut off all sources of favors extracted by heavy contributions from candidates.

Health Nurses The Community Health Nurses, employed by the Columbia -Hebron -Andover Community Health Service, Inc., (CHACHSI) are presently involved in related activities in the member communities

Those towns served are Columbia, Hebron, Andover, Marlborough and Lebanon. The Community Nurses are an integral part of the elemen-

tary school's kindergarten registration program. A nurse conducts a vision and hearing test on each child to help determine whether any problem exists.

The nurse also reviews each child's immunization record with the parents, with specia attention to the measles immunization which is now mandated by the State of Connecticut and the polio immunization which the towns themselves make mandatory. The nurse will also strongly recommend to parents that their child receive the necessary diptheria-tetanuspertussis protection and rubella vaccine.

Each child's medical history is recorded by the nurse for school health records, which are kept strictly confidential. She looks for any history of allergy, particularly insect stings, and notes any unusual medications prescribed by the child's doctor.

The purpose of this program is to evaluate the health status of each child, to identify problems and refer for further medical evaluation prior to entrance into school. Andover held its kindergarten
