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Inflation Pressures

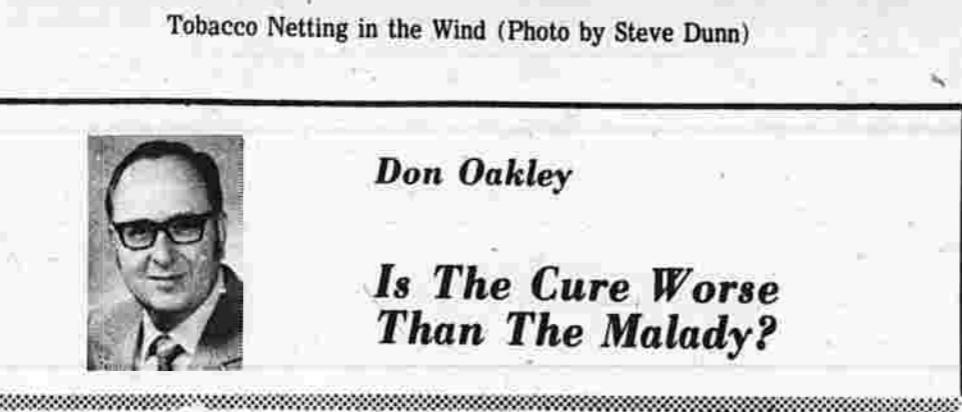
The world pressures of inflation are being shown in the casualties suffered by governments in the West in the past several weeks.
In England, as the result of the disastrous coal strike which the country suffered, Harold Wilson has been returned to the post of prime minister.
Canada has seen the fall of the Trudeau government as the result of a no confidence vote. And in Iceland Premier Olafur Johannesson has resigned his post as the result of strikes and inflation.
While the resignation of Willy Brandt in Germany had been ascribed to a spy scandal in his regime, that country, too, has been having economic rumblings.
France had a run-off election to name a successor to the Premier Pompidou. And contributing further

to world unrest, a junta has overthrown the government of Portugal.
Inflation was named as the principal problem of the country by William E. Simon who was sworn in to succeed George Schultz as secretary of the treasury.
Simon, whose move to the post was somewhat overshadowed, domestically, by impeachment proceedings, pledged the best efforts of the office to fighting this economic malady.
One observer has reported that the people are less interested in Watergate and impeachment than they are in rising prices.
Internationally it has been pointed out that the rise of both Hitler and Mussolini was traceable to inflation and economic distress. A trend towards more totalitarian government is feared.

Bicyclists Make A Point

One of the pleasures of our task is chronicling the occasions when the common man rises up and in a Mitterese gesture strikes a blow against his frustrations.
One such instance took place at Lake Geneva, Wis., terminus of a commuter train run by the Chicago and Northwestern Transportation Company.
The distance of the commuter run is 71 miles. It takes the train two hours and 43 minutes to make it. Naturally this is a matter of some vexation to those who use the train.
Irate over the train's slow-pace pace a commuter organized a race in which eight bicyclists challenged the train over a 21-mile stretch of track. On this particular stretch the railroad runs its trains only at 15 miles per

hour because of the poor condition of the roadbed.
The railroad refuses to fix the track saying that not enough commuters use the train to make it worth while.
The train took off from Lake Henry, Ill., after the engineer had predicted that he would beat the eight bicyclists.
Well seven of them beat the train over the stretch, making it in an hour and 25 minutes, 10 minutes better than the train could do.
One of the riders claims to have a timetable showing that in 1883 wood burning locomotives the railroad used to make the run in half an hour.
If you are wondering about the one bicyclist who did not beat the train, it was reported that he got lost in the rain.

Postcard Bill Was A Joke

WASHINGTON — In recent years, and under pressure from certain civil liberties groups — real and phony — congress has shown an appetite for the faddish, the trendy. Thus it may be a good omen that the House has killed legislation to permit voters in Federal elections to register by postcard.
There were many reasons to knock this one off, including support for the bill by the nutty Americans for Democratic Action. But Minority Leader John Rhodes, R-Riz., said it best when he described the legislation as a "license to steal, a clear invitation to vote fraud."
Heaven knows the Republic is already oversupplied with electoral corruption, but the postcard bill would be an obscene joke. It would have invited political bosses to register lunatics, noncitizens, felons and individuals under 18 and then carry them to the polls to win elections. All that would be required of the registrant would be a simple statement that he was eligible to vote.
Another joke would be the Voter Registration Administration, "with authority to act against fraudulent registration." Yuk. It's already illegal to falsify a registration statement, but adding a machine is needed to count the number of illicit voters concealed virtually impossible.
Besides, the bill would burden us with another Federal bureaucracy in a primarily state function. The estimated cost? Upwards of \$1-billion a year of the taxpayers' dough. I cannot understand the con-

Independent Justice A Change For The Worse?

In our concern over Watergate, we are in danger of emasculating the presidency, setting up independent political power bases with little responsibility either to the president or to Congress and thus creating political chaos or interminable whipsawing.
This reporter has spent some months now looking into proposals by senators and congressmen, by the staff of the Senate Watergate Committee and by prominent academicians.
Some proposals would lessen the president's control over his cabinet officers and agency heads, some over the bureaucracy, leaving the career civil service in greater control over actions taken by the executive branch. Others propose the monitoring of presidential appointees before they're allowed to take office.
Now most of these proposals will undoubtedly die in some congressional committee or other. But there is one proposal by Sen. Sam Ervin Jr., head of the Senate Select Committee on Watergate, that seems destined for serious consideration by the Senate.
Ervin's bill, S-2803, would make the Department of Justice an independent establishment of the United States.
The department, in essence, would become a fourth branch of the government, somewhat similar in independent status to the Supreme Court. It would consist of a chief justice and four associate justices.
Under present provisions of the bill, the attorney general would be appointed by a president, with Senate consent for the term of six years. This, practice, would mean that an incoming president would have for the first two to four years of his term, a chief law officer and the two top deputies appointed by the opposite political party.
This new czar of the Justice Department would have the power to appoint nine to 10 assistant attorneys general, appointed by the general, or directly without regard to the views or wishes of the president.
He would appoint the director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation and would determine the order of succession if he and his two major assistants were incapacitated, or the offices vacant.

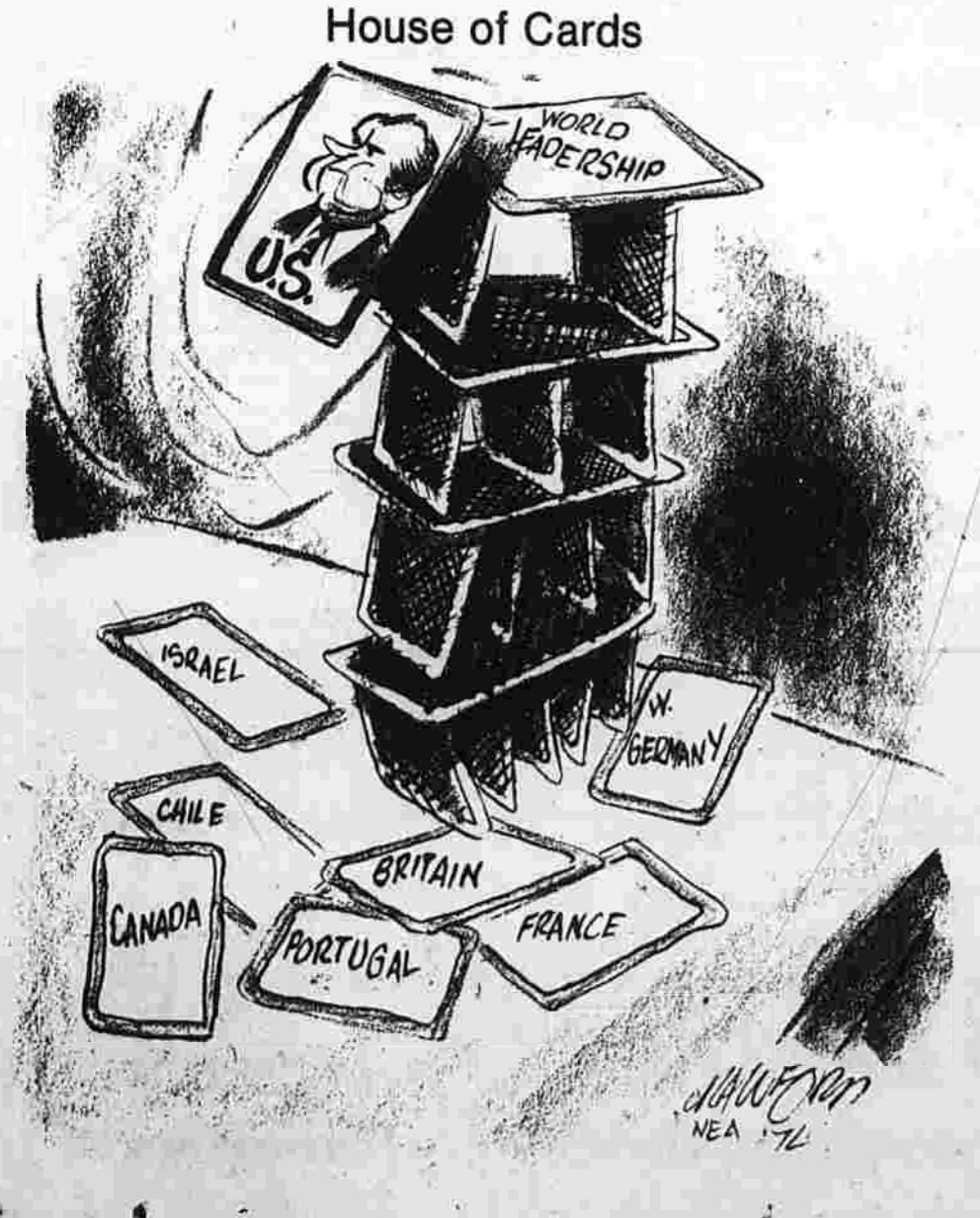
