

# Referendum for \$1.4 Million Regional Center Approved

The Board of Directors Tuesday night authorized a Nov. 5 townwide referendum on a proposed \$1.4 million Regional Occupational Center for Manchester.

If approved, it would be financed by general obligation bonds, with the sum 100 per cent reimbursable by the state on completion. The interest on the bonds, estimated at \$50,000 to \$60,000, would be paid

The board's action was unanimous and with no discussion. It followed an hourlong public hearing - with nobody speaking in opposition. Actually, except for a non-committal comment by Frank Utakis, president of the Manchester Property Owners Association, all remarks favored the construction.

Utakis said the MPOA has not studied the proposal and not yet taken a position. He applauded the board's action in placing

the proposal for referendum. The "Trade School for the Handicapped" would be placed on the northeast corner of Hillstown Rd. and Wetherell St., on the Manchester Community College campus. The parcel it would stand on has been deeded to the town by the State of Connecticut.

State Sen. David Odegard, who guided a bill through the state legislature which authorized the transfer of "up to four acres," was present at the public hearing Tuesday night but didn't speak.

Richard Lawrence of Lawrence Associates, architect for the facility, disclosed Tuesday night for the first time the Regional Center is planned for 2.2 acres considered sufficient by MCC officials.

The center would be under the supervision of the Manchester Board of Education - with tuition paid for its students by the 15 area towns planning to participate. The annual operating cost is estimated at \$125,000 - with \$25,000 contributed by Manchester and \$100,000 by the area towns. The town would own the facility after it is in operation five years.

Norman Fendell, coordinator of special education for the Manchester school system, explained the proposal Tuesday night and remarked, "It's plans and purpose and fulfillment could be a model for the entire nation."

The proposed center is Fendell's brainchild and its construction would culminate many years of planning, talking, explaining, pleading and cajoling. Fendell spoke to the Democratic Town Committee last month and received its endorsement for the construction.

Speaking for the proposal Tuesday night was Mrs. John McElraevy, president of the Manchester Association for Retarded Citizens. At the end of her prepared statement, she said, "It is the birthright of every child to be helped to reach his or her potential - however limited that might be. This Occupational Training Center would help them reach that potential."

Barry Shaw, president of the PTA for Exceptional Children, said the association endorses the proposal. He brought the endorsement, also, of the Manchester

Also supporting the proposed center was Joseph Blett, chairman of the Manchester Organization of the Handicapped.

Harold May, executive secretary of the Governor's Committee on the Handicapped, congratulated the town on its purpose. He offered the cooperation of various state agencies, including the

CAIRO (UPI) - President Nixon, riding side-by-side with Egyptian President Anwar Sadat, today began his five nation "journey for peace" Mideast trip to the cheers of 2 million Arabs. In a scene of friendship between the two leaders that would have seemed a dream six months ago, Sadat shook Nixon's hand

as he got off the Spirit of '76 jet. The two men then climbed into an open car and rode into Cairo, waving to the vast throng. Nixon's first official action in Arab territory was a courtesy call on Sadat and his wife, followed by the first business conference between the two leaders.

In a speech from the balcony of Koubbeh Palace-the 400-room mansion that will be Nixon's home during his visit- Sadat told

"I am fully aware that you share with me the belief that this is a unique moment, a major turning point which should not be lost-but rather grasped with vigilance, persistence and dedication-to build an endurable and honorable peace."

Nixon shook Sadat's hand and after exchanging humorous remarks away from the microphone, he replied:

"You have spoken of the fact that we stand here at a moment of time and history which could well be remembered centuries from now as one of those great turning points which affect mankind for the better. It has been too long between our countries a period of misunderstandng.

"Well, this is a great day," Nixon told Sadat as he glimpsed the huge welcoming

Sadat replied. A roaring cheer from a quarter of a

million at the airport echoed down the tree-lined parade route into Cairo where Interior Ministry police headquarters estimated at least 2 million persons mustered with such banners as "May Allah Bless Nixon" and chants of "Nix-

There was not a word about Watergate and Secretary of State Hery A. Kissinger's resignation threat Tuesday was put in the background of one of the largest public gatherings ever for a U.S. President. The Star Spangled Banner blared forth

as Nixon arrived and American flags were everywhere in a country that only a few months ago had no diplomatic relations with the United States and for decades had been closely aligned with the Soviet Union. Sadat, an admirer of Nixon and Kissinger for their efforts to bring peace to the Mideast, led his guest down a red carpet, past dozens of smiling Egyptian officials and military officials who led the country's fight in the October war and into a special VIP lounge built especially for

Sadat organized a 125-car motorcade to show Nixon off to the throng that jammed downtown Cairo and then planned a state dinner for the President, his wife and their

party tonight. Nixon will spend sightly more than two days in Egypt, seeing the sights and taking an American style "whistlenstop" train trip to Alexandria, before continuing his journey to Saudi Arabia, Syria, Israel and

In a gesture of good will, Sadat announced minutes before Nixon's arrival from Salzburg, Austria, that Egypt was giving up the American University in Cairo that was seized in 1967 during the Arab-Israeli war.

Clasping Nixon's hand in the 98-degree heat as the two leaders reviewed a guard of honor, Sadat said at the airport, "We are glad you have come."

"I have been looking forward to this day from the first time I took office," Nixon

The smile broadened across Sadat's face. "It is a great day for us," he

Egypt has held many wild receptions for visitors, including one for the 1964 visit to Cairo by Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev. This one easily topped the Khrushchev welcome.

Meskill said the state will spend \$6 million to subsidize bus service, twice what the state now spends on bus service in the Hartford, New Haven and Stamford

Meskill, a Republican who is not seeking re-election, said his plan eliminates the need for a special legislative session this year, although he admitted the 1975 session of the legislature may want to make changes in the plan.

# Newspapers Claim FBI Memos Tie Kissinger to Tapping

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger's account of his role in wiretapping of government officials and newsmen is contradicted by a series of FBI memoranda stretching over four years, according to published reports

The Washington Post, The New York Times and the Boston Globe said FBI documents had been examined by the House Judiciary Committee as part of its impeachment inquiry against President

Kissinger says he never directly requested wiretaps on telephones of 13 government officials and four newsmen as a result of leaks of sensitive information in

The newspapers said FBI documents showed some of the taps were requested by Kissinger or by his top aide at the time on the National Security Council, Gen. Alexander M. Haig, now President Nixon's chief of staff.

The Times and Post both quoted an FBI memorandum prepared for acting FBI Director William D. Ruckelshaus on May 12, 1973, which said the bureau, "at the request of the White House, provided highly sensitive wiretap coverage in the interests of national security" from the spring of 1969 to early summer, 1971. The 15-page summary said the White

House was extremely concerned over leaks about the Strategic Arms Limitation Talks (SALT), apparently emanating from the Security Council.

"The original request" for all the taps. the summary said, came from Kissinger or Haig. It added, "It appears that the project of placing electronic surveillance at the request of the White House had its beginning in a telephone call to Mr. J. Edgar Hoover on May 9, 1969, from Dr. Henry A. Kissinger.

The Post said it obtained a copy of a memorandum written by FBI chief Hoover to then Attorney General John N. Mitchell, dated May 9, 1969, saying Kissinger had called him that day to complain of "an extraordinarily damaging"

The memo said Kissinger had asked Hoover to put "whatever resources I need to find out who did this.'

Kissinger testified before the Senate Foreign Relations Committee last year that the taps were originated by the President, Hoover and Mitchell and that he simply supplied names of his subordinates who had access to documents figuring in the news leaks.

The Globe and Post cited two Hoover memos dated May 13, 1970, to Mitchell saying Haig conveyed requests from Kissinger that "as soon as possible a telephone surveillance be instituted" on the home of two members of the National Security staff, designated only as "L" and

Hoover wrote, according to a photostat of the memo, "a survey has been conducted and it has been determined that the installation of this telephone surveillance will be placed by this bureau."

Ruckelshaus said the taps "are full of examples of careless and loose talk about matters being handled in the White House' but that "nothing was found which would indicate that a violation of federal law" had taken place.



### Is Watergate The Reason?

This question is being raised more frequently as the various inquiries continue to unveil more and more of the seamier side of American politics. However, we think the question requires some amplification.

The real question in assessing government's ability to govern is by comparing present activity with prior

For example, the government, and we include the legislative branch as well as the executive, in recent years hasn't been known for taking very many bold actions except in times of national crisis, like depression or

Instead of taking bold measures to combat inflation, which began long before Watergate or the present administration, it has been very timid in both executive recommendations and congressional pronouncements.

The real stalemate in government is that we have had, in effect, a Mexican standoff for several years in which the various branches have polarized on the checks rather than the balances in

This may be inherent in the fact that and a Democrat-controlled Congress but whatever the cause, domestic issues have been debated at length but in effect nothing positive accomplished.

We did not have a combined effort to balance the budget before Watergate. We do not have it now. We did not have a combined effort to combat inflation before Watergate.

We do not have it now. We did not have a combined effort to work out national health care programs before Watergate. And we

do not have it now. About the only truly legislativeexecutive innovation which has come to pass has been revenue-sharing which is still having some birth pains because executive and legislative

Yes, our government appears to be years ago. Watergate can hardly be blamed for the lack of legislative and executive initiative and accomplishment in the many domestic areas of national concern when we haven't had any initiative or accomplishment from either for several years.

Watergate is not the reason but convenient excuse to ignore these issues. In politics, and we don't want to sound cynical, it appears the practical thing to do these days is to find excuses for ignoring issues until public clamor is too great to be ignored. Then it is almost amazing how the executive and legislative branches arrive at an accommodation. Revenue Sharing is an example.

Watergate isn't going to fade away. The concern we have is that we, the people, may be conned into believing its solution is the key to effective action on the domestic issues before us.

The fact is that the Congress can, if it will, evaluate executive recommendations on the basis of merit and not source if it chooses to do so.

The question of Watergate paralyzing the government will become only a reality if those in government choose to use this scandal

What Congress accomplishes between now and July 1 will give us the clue as to whether it will face up to its non-Watergate responsibilities. And it will be on that record that we should determine the make-up of the next Congress.

The government was not really moving before Watergate. It is not moving very much now. The question is whether it will move at all even after Watergate has been resolved. On the basis of the past few years we are not too optimistic for it seems whipping boys are more plentiful than problem solvers.

### Simon's Stand Correct

Treasury Secretary William Simon, speaking at Williamsburg, Va., has taken what will probably be an unpopular line in stating that we may have to accept less than desirable employment rates if inflation is to be controlled.

Advocating government brakes on demand, which is created by spending capacity, Simon also took a stand against a tax cut, which would also increase money supply and hence purchasing power.

The new treasury head postulated an economic situation in which demand, while remaining firm, would fall slightly below potential supply. Since this would create a slight surplus of goods and services it would

have the effect of holding the line or

reducing prices in the market. Secretary Simon also wisely advocated that government spending should be restrained to tighten the supply of money.

/ It was refreshing to have the secretary urge less government pending which we have always thought to be the principal factor in inflation.

Hopefully, his views may make some impression on the Congress which is the principal foundation of government expenditures.


With the entire House up for election this year, as well as a third of the Senate, the tendency on the part of the legislators is to be free with the taxpayers money hoping that it will have a favorable influence on their return to office.

Accelerating inflation is already showing in the country in the high rate of bankruptcies and delinquencies in fixed debt payments.

We agree with Mr. Simon that the American public is ready for stringent measures to halt inflationary trends. This is particularly true in the case of the retired and those living on Social Security benefits. Spiralling

prices are making it very difficult for many of these to make ends meet. Many of the elderly, hopefully retired to an easier life, are finding their income, which they had thought sufficient, coming close to the poverty

Mr. Simon's thinking is sound.

### Heller Proposes Tax Cut

WASHINGTON (UPI) -Former White House economist Walter Heller called Tuesday for a tax cut for low income groups, phasing out of "tax loopholes," and creation of a watchdog agency with power to order a rollback of excessive

wage and price increases. Heller, chairman of Council of Economic Advisers in the Kennedy and Johnson administrations, outlined his proposals to the House Democratic Steering Committee, and later repeated them at a news conference. House Speaker Carl Albert said Heller was the first of several economists who would be asked to advise the Democrat leadership on how to

avoid "the prolonged recession this administration is leading us into... Rep. Wilbur Mills, D-Ark. said Monday a tax cut would touch off a new round of inflation, but supported a return to wage-price controls.
