Manchester's 1974-1975 share of state tation is unlikely, Public Works Director Jay Giles said Monday. Of a state total of \$16.4 million, Manchester has been allotted \$182,791 for

roads and public transportation services this fiscal year. The 1974-1975 allotment is about the same as funds granted Manchester last year, Giles said The money continues to be distributed by the state on a formula based on town road mileage and population, and Mnchester's share of the available funds has increased little in recent years. On the other hand, costs of town road mprovements have skyrocketed in the last few years, Giles said, and Manchester is falling behind in its road-paving

Because the paving program is lagging, Manchester probably won't be able to spend any of the 1974-1975 state road money on public transportation, Giles said. Use of road improvement funds for public transportation facilities was okayed by the 1973 General Assembly. "We can't afford to spend any of the money on transit," Giles said, noting that town budgeting should include a commitment to contribute toward road maintenance now funded by the state. Manchester's 1974-1975 allotment of \$182,791 is based on a town population of 48,600 and town road mileage totaling

about 167 miles. Distribution of state funds in other Mancheser area towns, announced last week, include \$41,960 for Andover, \$44,146 for Bolton, \$73,036 for Coventry, \$59,243 for Hebron, \$81,158 for South Windsor,

The Midas Touch

By the end of the year, Congress may once again permit private citizens to own gold in form other than jewelry and to hoard or sell it on the open as they wish. Some observers anticipate a boon in world gold prices.

Gold is one of the enduring things of history, both physically and psychologically. Empires have been conquered for it. Three-quarters of all the gold ever mined is still in existence.

Yet of the present world inventory of between 2.5 and 3.5 billion troy ounces, only about one per cent serves a utilitarian use, mostly in jewelry. Gold has even ceased to be a backing for currency. It remains a symbol only, and symbol-minded people have made a fetish of it, claims one metalminded businessman.

"If we dumped every ounce of gold in the ocean, the lifestyle of the world would be virtually unaffected," says Herb Barchoff, president of Eastern Rolling Mills, Inc., of the Bronx, N.Y. Next to gold in psychological value, and exceeding it in practical value, is

Thus the move by the four biggest copper-producing countries to band together to raise prices in emulation of the oil producers could have far greater consequences in our daily lives than the lifting of the ban on gold

Unless there is a massive expansion of copper production to maintain adequate supplies at a fair relative price, warns Barchoff, copper selling for two to three dollars a pound is not unthinkable in this decade.

Shocked by what he saw, he promised the people he met that day he was going to make a change in their way of life. Unlike political promises, this one is being kept, - a rather special memorial to the man who made it

In explaining the "rebirth of a city" New York Upbeat, a group of volunteer professionals in fields ranging from public relations and communications to urban restoration and travel promotion, said, "Senator Kennedy, with the help of Senator Jacob Javits, pushed through legislation that helped create the Bedford-Stuyvesant Restoration Corporation. Its goal was to improve every aspect of the lives of the residents of this second largest Black community in America (surpassed only by the South Side of

Toward this end, programs were launched simultaneous rehabilitation of housing, health, education, economic, social and cultural life. The organization is only 7 years old, has a long way to go, but dramatic things are happening. Many blocks of brownstone houses have been improved by exterior renovation, employing young men from the area; a Superblock diverts traffic and creates a central open area for seating and recreation on a previously under-utilized street.

A "city" larger than Fort Worth, Toledo or Louisville, Bedford Stuyvesant had no center. It has one now. A black architect was hired to redesign an abandoned milk-bottling plant and his plans were carried out by a black contracting team recruited and trained in the community. The results are outstanding. On the ground floor there is a 218-seat theatre for the performance of music and drama, and an ice skating rink is being built in the rear.

It's all part of the restoration, and a part of New York, that New York Upbeat is trying to bring to the rest of the
