Changes Approved **Despite Opposition**

The Manchester Planning and Zoning Commission (PZC) Monday night approved two zone changes over protests of one PZC member and comments by Town Planner J. Eric Potter that both changes may be "spot zoning."

The zone changes will allow expansion of a grocery store on Highland St. and construction of an industrial facility on Slater

The grocery store matter involved a change from Residence A to Business 1 Zone for a three-quarter-acre parcel adjacent to John Devanney's Highland Park Market. Devanney's application, which will permit him to double the size of the store, had been denied twice previously.

For Plant Expansion The industrial zone change involves 7.6 acres of land, previously zoned Business 2 and Rural Residence, on which Multi-

Circuits Inc. of Manchester plans to build a 10,000-square foot plant. Both zone changes were aired at July 1 public hearings before the PZC. Several

Tolland Tpke. residents opposed the Multi-Circuits application, citing traffic aggravation, drainage problems, and alleged spot zoning.

The Devanney request met slight op-position: Two Highland St. residents objected on the basis of traffic impact, which was one of three reasons the PZC had previously denied the rezoning. Other denial reasons, cited by the PZC twice last year, were that the zone change would be "an intrusion into a viable residential zone" and that it would destroy the concept of a neighborhood business by doubling the size of the 8,000-square foot grocery store.

Traffic Congestion PZC member David Paris, unsuccessfully opposing the Devanney zone change, said he saw no significant change in traffic problems at the Highland-Wyllys Sts. intersection, despite the applicant's contention that installation of a full-phase traffic light there had improved the situa-

Paris said the three denial reasons, listed by the PZC in April and September 1973 were still valid, but the other four PZC members voting Monday night-Chairman Alfred Sieffert, John Hutchinson, alternates Leo Kwash and Ronald Gates-didn't think so. The vote was 4 to 1 on a motion by

Hutchinson, who acknowledged that traffic control had been a problem near the grocery store but was improved by the traffic light installation. A similar vote approved the Multi-

Circuits zone change after Paris unsuccessfully moved to deny that rezoning.

Potter Comments Potter, commenting on the industrial application, said the PZC could be accused

of spot zoning if it approved the Multi-Circuits application. While we should encourage industrial development," Potter said, "we haven't

planned for industrial use in that area. "A change would benefit only one individual (Multi-Circuits)," Potter said, stressing that "zoning has to consider the

"On the other hand," Potter said, "Rural Residence zoning is not appropriate in that area."

When PZC members commented that Potter's thinking about spot zoning for Multi-Circuits would also apply to Devanney, he and Paris agreed.

Hutchinson's successful motion for approval of the Multi-Circuits application was based, he said, on reasons that the change would be a logical expansion of industrial uses and that industry would be the best use of the land.

PZC Approves Zone Rule Amendments

Proposed amendments to residential zone regulations to update the rules and more completely define permitted uses and accessory uses in those zones were approved by the Manchester Planning and Zoning Commission (PZC) Monday night.

The amendments include restrictions on parking of cars, storage of boats and trailers, and customary home occupations, but were modified before adoption to meet objections raised by townspeople at a public hearing earlier

First Speech Given Bipartisan Praise

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Senators and representatives from both parties praised President Ford's first address to a joint session of Congress Monday, but some Democrats questioned the new administration's plans for fighting inflation. Senate Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield said, "I was impressed," and

Senate Republican Leader Hugh Scott called it "a bellringer." Mansfield said he was glad Ford had accepted his proposal to call a domestic

summit meeting on the economy. But Sen. Walter F. Mondale, D-Minn., an all-but-declared candidate for president in 1976, said he had the impression Ford's ideas on the economy were only "half formed," and that they would tend to hurt those who most need help in housing, unemployment and other areas. Some Doubts

Several other Democrats and at least

one Republican, Sen. Jacob K. Javits of New York, also questioned Ford's contention that cutting back government expenditures while maintaining defense spending would help slow inflation.
Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey, D-Minn., called Ford's speech "a solid, homespun

message" that gave the country "a sense of confidence." But Humphrey said Ford's formula for fighting inflation was "simplistic."

Sen. Edmund S. Muskie, D-Maine, said,

"Cutting government expenditures alone won't cure inflation and can trigger a recession and bring higher unemployment.

Sen. Russell B. Long, D-La., chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, which would handle most of Ford's initiatives dealing with the economy, praised the speech, but conceded he was "dismayed" that Ford indicated inflation could be controlled by cutting the budget. He added, "That's a small beginning, a drop in the bucket.

Right for the Moment House Republican Leader John J. Rhodes of Arizona said, "I don't

remember hearing a speech as right for this moment as was this one." House Speaker Carl Albert called Ford a 'great American" and said Congress would do all it could to help him succeed. House Democratic Leader Thomas P. O'Neill of Massachusetts said: "He asked

for our help and our continued criticism and you can bet we will give him that." Sen. Barry M. Goldwater, R-Ariz., said he has suggested that Ford propose a 10 per cent cut in federal salaries and federal programs and added, "He kind of liked the

Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., said the speech indicated that "in a political sense, it's an entirely new ball game."

'President Ford Has Lifted A Roadblock,' .. Ribicoff

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Connecticut's top congressional Democrats praised President Gerald Ford after his address to the nation's lawmakers Monday night, and promised cooperation with his plans.

'President Ford has lifted a roadblock that has stood between the two ends of Pennsylvania Avenue - Congress and the White House - for too many years," said Sen. Abraham A. Ribicoff, D-Conn. 'President Gerald Ford, in his quiet,

direct way, has forged still another strong link with the Congress and the people in his continuing efforts to structure an open administration," said Rep. Ella T. Grasso, D-Conn., who is running for governor of Connecticut.

Rep. Robert H. Steele, R-Conn., her opponent in the November election, said he was particularly pleased with Ford's pledges to run an open administration and to work closely with Congress.

"Both intentions are critical to unite the country to solve our national problems in terms of specific issues. I believe the President was right on the mark in listing his priorities as combatting inflation here at home and continuing to pursue vigorous peace abroad." he said.

Ribicoff praised planned action against inflation and said the speech brought 'welcome words to those of us who have fought for months to pass the national health insurance bill and a trade bill that will benefit all Americans."

"I look forward to working with him on these great challenges," Ribicoff said. Mrs. Grasso also praised the top priority given to the fight against inflation and said I am sure the President will find a favorable response to his call for cooperation and for the establishment of programs for health care, international Th€ Dragor





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
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The Bottle Battle

Everybody is in favor of a clean environment and the wise use of natural resources. But when it comes down to the crunch - and in at least one aspect of the situation, roadside litter, the word has a quite literal application - everything depends upon whose

economic ox is being gored. The drive by a number of states and communities around the nation to ban the use of throwaway, nonreturnable beverage containers is a subject that is guaranteed to get you into trouble no matter which side you favor.

If it were a case of the good guys versus the bad guys, the problem would be relatively simple. But like almost everything else having to do with the environment and pollution, it's a matter of one group of good guys - the public - with a certain set of priorities coming into conflict with another group of good guys - in this instance, the manufacturers of cans and bottles and those who fill them with a different set of priorities.

The controversy began two years ago when the state of Oregon passed pioneer legislation requiring deposits of up to five cents on all beer and soft drink bottles and cans, against strong opposition from the container and beverage industries.

The latter warned that their business would de severely injured Glass workers would lose their jobs ecause fewer bottles would need to be manufactured. Cans would be driven out of the beverage market because there was no way to make them reusuable. The consumer would suffer because prices would go up. The distribution system would be dis-

And anyway, they argued, beverage containers were only a small fraction of the solid waste disposal problem. The best solution lay in setting up

collection centers for recycling. According to Oregon Gov. Tom McCall, however, since enactment of the bottle return law, roadside litter from bottles and cans has been reduced 90 per cent. A survey by Oregon State University claims that the law has resulted in a net increase of \$4 million to the beverage industry.

Quarles is one of a growing number of environmentalists urging passage of a nationwide bottle bill. At least one such measure, sponsored by Oregon Republican Mark Hatfield, has been introduced in the Senate.

Cat Wouldn't Stay At Home

If you have overlooked the case of the Beverly Hills, Calif. couple who have been sentenced to five days in jail because their cat wouldn't stay home, it is no wonder. Engrossed as we all are in inflation and the price of gas and groceries, attention to other matters is bound to suffer.

In 1973 the Horwich family of Beverly Hills - he's a lawyer - obtained an injunction against their next door neighbors, the Kasmers - she's a fashion designer - ordering that the Kasmer's cat, "Calico", be restrained to its own property.

However, the Kasmer's were recently found to be in contempt of the injunction. A Superior Court judge found that the cat had invaded the Horwich yard at least four times in the last year and "had repeatedly defecated in and upon the property" It was never determined, of course, if Calico was aware of the court injunc-

A strange sidelight of the case was the fact that the Horwich's admitted that they had set up salmon and chicken in their backyard to trap cats which were turned over to the SPACA. Attorney Horwich admitted this, and in a marvelous non sequitur gave the reason that "We have some children who are allergic to animals". He did not explain how luring cats to his backyard would be helpful to the children's allergies.

Our intensive study of the Constitution has not uncovered any specific reference to the rights of cats, or other animals, or indeed, if the laws of nature supersede the laws of man. Philosophically, however, we were touched by Mrs. Kasmer's observation, "Birds fly, the wind blows, it is nature, you know."That is something we all should remember.



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

I've always thought that long f glamour. They have a wonderful languorous look, as if they've never scrubbed a kitchen floor or pulled a weed

In an effort to do this - I've swallowed an envelope of gelatin every morning with my orange juice, worn rubber gloves to do my housework, and dialed the telephone with a pencil instead of my fingers. In addition, I've rubbed a mixture of iodine and caster oil on my nails twice a

After about a month of these

attentions my nails reached the desired length. First, I filed them to menacing points. Then I applied three coats of Dragon Lady Red polish.
