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SELASSIE PLEA FOR PEACE IS SENT TO WORLD

Ethiopian Emperor Declares His Country Will Defend Itself to the Last Man - His Appeal.

Addis Ababa, July 20 - (AP) - Emperor Haile Selassie in a stirring appeal to the world today said peace is on the verge of being 'drowned in the blood and tears of a war' launched by Italy.

Asked whether Ethiopia would choose between collaboration or war with Italy, the emperor said he would be mobilized by Premier Mussolini on the Ethiopian border, the emperor declared his Empire would 'defend its territory to the last man'.

The emperor's appeal was broadcasted in Italian, English, French, Spanish, Portuguese, and Chinese. It was also broadcasted in Amharic, the Ethiopian language.

In the French language version of the Emperor's speech, Selassie declared that Italy was preparing war against his country and called on his subjects to die in battle rather than sacrifice their liberty.

Meanwhile Italy went ahead with preparations against the possibility of war.
The steamship Monte Bianco sailed from Naples for East Africa with 100 officers and men and supplies for the Italian expeditionary force.

Wartime promotions for almost 1,000 regular army officers constituted the main part of the campaign.
A decree published in an official gazette created posts for the relief of 100 lieutenant colonels, 250 captains and 1,000 lieutenants.

The decree was published shortly after a government spokesman denied that Italy had been summoned to the League of Nations Council by the Italian government.

A front page editorial pictured the high undeveloped areas of Ethiopia. It would be Italy's duty to bring these areas to the level of the rest of the world.

The semi-official "Asino" column commented on the Italian army of 2,000,000 men. It mentioned that 70 Italian died of heat there, the paper pointed out that 150 had succumbed to malaria during the same period.

The paper stated that air-conditioned hospital ships are almost ready to enter service and will be used for the relief of the African soldiers and workmen.
It also mentioned that the Italian government is preparing to send a mission to the Ethiopian Emperor.
