"It shows, too, why your National Labor Relations Board is deeply concerned with this request for a Senate investigation to clear out of the way such things as organized expionage.

"I warn you that there is basic trouble enough looming in steel, changes to cause most widespread grievances.

"I refer to the fact that the steel industry, through the rapid modernization of plant and startling mechanization of process, is in the next few years headed toward throwing out of the industry about half of its employes. 


