

Report That Edward Is to

New York, Feb. 23—(AP) — The tentative suggestion that the British Parliament grant a pension of 25,000 pounds (\$125,000) a year to the Duke of Windsor (The King Edward who deserted his throne for America's Mrs. Wallis Simpson), has aroused telling opposition.

Extremista have been given a chance to repeat their caustic and frequently voiced query of "what price royalty?"

The answer to this inquiry is that the present direct expenditure to maintain the royal family is approximately \$3,000,000 annually. Indirectly, many more millions are involved.

volved.

The maintenance of the King and Queen and their children, and the expenses of the royal households comes to \$2,850,000 yearly. This iscludes a provision of \$550,000 for Their Majestices' privy purse (which is nobody's business); \$965,000 for household expenditures; \$625,000 for salaries and retired allowances of the household; and so

on.

But the cost doesn't stop there. All the children of a ruler have to be supported throughout life, and off-spring of Queen Victoria are still drawing pensions. The present list calls for more than three-quarters of a million dollars.

Some Examples

For example, that much beloved old gentleman, the Duke of Connaught, who is a son of Victoria re-

naught, who is a son of Victoria, re-ceives \$125,000 a year. His sisters, the Princesses Louise and Beatrice, both get \$30,000. The two married both get \$30,000. The two married brothers of the present King have \$125,000 each, and Dowager Queen Mary draws \$350,000.

All this is quite apart from private incomes possessed by members of the royal family. The late King George reputedly left a very considerable fortune, some of which was in New York City property, but details have never been made public, since a Monarch's will does not go through ordinary probate.

Originally it included the whole charge for civil expenditure, in the days when Kings were Kings and controlled all revenues. Such a scheme naturally could not be satisfactory, excepting to the Monarch and his hangers-on, and the civil list generally was bankrupt.

Eights Surrender

However, it was not until the reign of George III — the Monarch who threw away the American coionies and finally died insane —that the Crown began a gradual surrender of rights to revenues and properties to the state.

This was complisted under William IV who came to the throne in 1830. He gave up all revenues and was relieved of all public charges. Parliament then granted him maintenance. The castles and great estates which once were in the hands of royalty are now vested in the state.

The reports that the Duke of Windsor needs money has caused considerable speculation, since he was supposed to be a multi-millionaire. For many years as Prince of Wales he had an annual income estimated at between \$600,000 and \$1,000,000 from the Duchy of Cornwall. This is Crown property and the revenues—not figured in the civil list mentioned above—always are set aside for the maintenance of the Prince of Wales, as helr to the throne. throne.

Besides that, the Duke is underslood to have received a large bequest from his father, George V.

In view or all this, England has been surprised to hear that the Duke was hard up, and people are wondering what he did with his money.

In any event, if he is short of funds, the royal family will have to do something about it among them, for that "dignity" must be maintained, if not for the sake of Edward himself for the prestige of the British turone.

BUILDING GRANTS

Building permits granted by cities and towns in Connecticut during the month of January declined in total valuation as compared with the December figures, but gained over those of January, 1936, it is shown in the monthly building survey taken by the Department of Sales and Traffic Development of the New Haven Railroad among 25 communities along the railroad's lines and made public today by A. A. Drummend, sales traffic manager.

The drop in the valuation of permits issued in January, which is held to be of a seasonal nature despite the mildness of the weather held to be of a seasonal nature despite the mildness of the weather during that month, amounted to \$3584.198 as compared with December, the actual figure for the first month of the present year for the 25 cities and towns being \$1,846,354. The January total, however, was like of the building permits granting by the same municipalities in himary, 1936.

Greenwich headed the January list with permits valued at \$363,296, while West Hartford and New Haven were second and third, respectively. Greenwich and West Hartford exchanged places as compared with their December standings, and New Haven displaced Hartford which was third in the December survey.

Only eight of the 25 communities recorded building permits gains in January over their December totals. These were Danbury, East Hariford, Greenwich, Meriden, New Haven, Stamford, Torrington and Willimantic. Eighteen cities and towns enjoyed increases over their totals for December, 1936, however. These were Bristol, Danbury, Greenwich, Hamden, Hartford, Manchester, Meriden, Middletown, Naugatuck, New Haven, New London, South Nurwalk, Stamford, Torrington, Waterbury, West Hartford, Wethersfield and Willimantic.

Supreme Court Side Glances

WILLIS VAN DEVANTER is one of the hardest-working of the Supreme Court justices, though he was appointed in 1916 and is now 78.


Indiana-born, Van Devanter made his career in Wyoming in the early territorial days. He had a varied practice in law, and later represented important land and railway companies. He was appointed to the Federal Circuit Court of Appeals after service as assistant attorney-general under Theodore Roosevelt. He had been active in Wyoming Republican politics, President Taft appointed Van Devanter to the Supreme Court.

Van Devanter's legal mind is among the keenest on the court and in certain fields he is recognized as an authority, just as his long service makes him most fully informed on the precedents which are so important to the court's activities. Though he is a hard worker and masters the details of every case with unusual thoroughness, Van Devanter personally writes comparatively few opinions.

New Deal legislation has fared roughly at the hands of this consistent conservative. Twelve such cases met Van Devanter's negative, including the gold, railway pension, and AAA' cases, while only four gained his approval, one of which was the partial victory of TVA.

Formerly athletic and a sportsman, Van Devanter is somewhat frail today and even his golf is now a tepid weekly diversion. Twenty-seven years of continuous service on the Supreme Court bench make him its dean, a title which fell to him on the resignation of the venerable Olives Wendell Holmes.

MEASLES RARELY SPREAD BY INDIRECT CONTACT, AS EXPOSURE HARMS VIRUS

Man apparently is the only animal
who ordinarily has measles, but experimental measles can be produced
in monkeys. The cause of the disease probably is some substance or
organism so small that it cannot be
seen with even the highest powered
microscope.

We know from studies made by investigators that the virus which carries measles is injured by exposure to air and sunlight. For this reason, measles seldom is carried from a sick person to another by a third person or an animal. In other words, should a visitor get some of the virus on his hands or his clothing, the virus may die during the the virus on his hands or his clothing, the virus may die during the time spent in going from one person to another. For this reason, doctors and nurses who care for messles victims may visit other patients without danger of transmitting the disease, provided reasonable precautions are taken.

Thus, it is wise to wash the hands thoroughly after visiting a patient. People who enter the sick room should put on a clean gown before entering the room and remove the gown after leaving. Dishes, bedding, and other materials used in caring for a child sick with measles should be boiled before they are again used.

Measles is particularly virulent when it is introduced into a population in which there has been no measles for a long time. For example, one of the worst measles epidemics on record occurred in the Farce Islands in 1846. Of the 7800 islanders, 6000 had the measles in six months.

In 1775, measles broke out on the Sandwich Islands. There were 150,000 people, and 40,000 of them died in four months. Severity of this epidemic was due partly to the intensity with which measles attacks a population in which there is no immunity.
