The muscles of the body work by burning a mixture of glucose and oxygen supplied through the blood stream and normally supplied by the pancreas, is analogous to the spark which explodes the gasoline vapor in an automobile engine's cylindera. The diabetic has a weak spark. Without auxiliary insulin supplied artificially, the diabetic does not burn the rincose efficiently, with the reault that part of the glucose is passed off through the urine like smoke from the exhaust of a motor. Glucose is a very simple form of sugar. This accounts for the classical symptom of the diabetic, sugar in the urine.

The foregoing is admittedly an over-simplification of the description of a complicated disease. But it explains fairly accurately the tremendous importance of the discovery of insulin, which by supplementing the function of a subnormal organ, keeps many a human motor running which otherwise would stall.
