Utilize Every Labor Source

Employers Told to Hire Help Without Regard to Racial Prejudice

Hartford, March 18.—The industrial ability to produce should be the sole test for employment in war production, Cyrus Flinders, acting manager of the local office of the U. S. Employment Service, said today in asking local employers to utilize fully every local labor resource, without regard to racial prejudice.

Employers should not leave machines idle on any shift because of an unwillingness to hire colored men merely because they are aliens, Mr. Flinders said. "The only reason we must beat them at the game of production, and to this we must make use of every labor resource at our command."

It is not prohibited, contrary to the belief of many employers, "the only restriction," he said "in the case of Government contracts and of contracts for aircraft parts or accessories. Even in these instances, aliens may be employed if consent is obtained from the Federal department concerned. The War and Navy Departments have established special procedures for handling such applications and have approved them."

Company working with confidential plans and specifications can provide the protection which national demands without involving an absolute ban against hiring aliens in departments not having access to confidential information.

Replace Men With Women

State Employers Are Hiring More Every Day; Trained Easily

Hartford, March 18.—(AP)—The transition from peace to war industry with comparatively little widespread dislocation, Leonard J. Maloney, Director of the U. S. Employment Service in Connecticut, reported today on the basis of reports received by him from the 18 field offices of the Employment Service. This, and the increase in the number of employed women in February, indicating that Connecticut employers were now becoming aware of the need to replace men with women, were the outstanding features of a month characterized by reports of steady progress from all parts of the state.

Factory employment actually increased in February by the net 10,000 in spite of layoffs affecting more than 1,500 workers. All areas shared in the increase which is expected to continue for several months as new plant construction is completed and further conversion to war production is accomplished.

Women Being Trained
Women are being trained in defense industrial training courses in nearly all areas possessing the necessary machinery. Employers are now definitely convinced of the need for employing women but too many plants are still waiting for more definitely drafted women. Most areas in the state report factory employment from other states although a considerable number of metropolitan New York workers still appear each day in Bridgeport, New Haven, Hartford and Waterbury.

Estimates of additional workers needed by specific occupations are being made by the state today with respect to needed skilled workers. The previous report showed 12,000 skilled workers needed by July 1 and a total of 32,000 of all types. In one area, two firms have reported further anticipated increase activity in 10,000 workers. In another, any number of skilled machinists, tool and die makers and machine specialists that is apt to be available in Connecticut could be readily absorbed in the employment in increase or to replace less skilled workers who have been hired in view of shortages. It appears the state is rapidly approaching the point where it will be able to practically all available manpower will be absorbed by war production or the armed forces.

State Forces Fight Cancer

Organized Program Developed; To Analyze Over 21,000 Records

Hartford, March 18.—In connection with a preliminary announcement of National Cancer Month which is to be observed throughout April, The Weekly Bulletin of the State Department of Health points out that an organized program has been developed in Connecticut for an active fight against the cancer problem. Studies being made on cancer in this state are based on mortality statistics compiled by the department's Division of Cancer Research from more than 30,000 cancer deaths covering a period of twenty years. Also under way is an intensive study of hospital data in existing cases of cancer which will extend back to 1935 and include analysis of over 21,000 case records.

Department Created
A tumor committee to survey conditions and to develop a program of cancer control best suited to the needs of this state, was approved by the Connecticut State Medical Society in 1933. Subsequently, the Division of Cancer Research was created in the State Department of Health under authority of the 1935 General Assembly to investigate cancer prevention, treatment and mortality.

Tumor clinics to assure facilities for the diagnosis and treatment of cancer have been established by the scientific committee of the State Medical Society in general hospitals at strategic points in the state. Certain minimum requirements have been set up in regard to diagnostic methods, therapeutic procedures and the recording of case histories. This committee also investigates new methods of diagnosing and treating cancer, makes recommendations concerning them. According to the bulletin, this arrangement facilitates the exchange of important information about cancer among the tumor clinics and the Division of Cancer Research which acts as a clearing house for cancer statistics.

A food that we have all used innumerable times but one that lends itself particularly well when flavor change is desired is cheese. Perhaps you have more thought on cottage cheese than you do on the menu for it provides valuable food elements and has plenty of flavor to encourage any sluggish appetite.

Milk, from which all cheese is made, is an excellent food. While it is a perfect food, milk contains a great deal of protein, and is nearest to fulfilling all the needs of the body.
