Monday Closings. As with the other emergency regulations which have come into American life, there can be no doubt that only serious necessity is in back of Governor Baldwin's request for a two month Monday closing of Connecticut business life.

And, as with some of the other measures that have been found necessary, there is some confusion and disorientation certain to result. Connecticut business life is organized on a complex basis, with different committees and different institutions having different habits and different procedures.

Most institutions already operating on a five-day week are now closing on Saturdays. It would be the logical thing for them to continue to be closed on Saturdays, with Saturday and Sunday the two day stretch the Government wants.

Institutions, like the theaters, which have been operating on a seven day week, have been asked to cut out a five day week naturally object to having Sunday be one of their closed days, since it is one of their best business days.

In Manchester, where most stores now to be affected by the Monday closing have been closing on Wednesday afternoons, it seems common sense to abandon the Wednesday closing for the duration of the Monday closing.

Torrington, Jan. 20.—(P)—Fire early today caused considerable damage to the Meara block in the heart of Torrington's business center. Chief damage was to stock in the store of the Grover's Outlet, one of the largest self-service grocery and meat markets in the city.

Information of vital interest to those who must file a tax return not later than March 15, 1943, furnished by the Bureau of Internal Revenue.

No. 13 Earned Income Credit. In arriving at the amount of tax on the taxable income of individuals, a credit, known as "earned income credit" is allowed against income in computing the "normal tax."

The amount of the earned income credit is shown on Schedule E of the return form. The maximum credit is \$3,000, then the credit is reduced to 10 per cent of the net income; that is, the entire net income is considered in computing the credit.

Ordinarily, the earned net income is the amount reported on the return on the 1 of Form 1040. If, however, the taxpayer is in business for himself and is reporting his net income on Schedule C—Profit (or Loss) on Business or Profession—a maximum of 20 per cent of his share of the net income of such trade or business may be considered, as earned income in arriving at the amount of earned net income.

Third, the maximum earned income credit which any taxpayer may take is \$1,400. This maximum would occur when both the net income and the earned net income were \$14,000 or more.

Return. It is not necessary to compute the earned income credit, as this has been consolidated into the computation of tax shown in the table on the back of the return form. It is necessary only to refer to this table to arrive at the correct amount of tax due. Any individual whose total income for the year is not in excess of \$2,000 and was wholly from salary, wages, or other compensation for personal services, dividends, interest, or annuities, may use a Simplified Return Form 1040A.

Milena Barilli Assents Paintings Should Stimulate; Seen New and Forceful Personality.

By Amy Porter New York, Jan. 20.—Among other convictions, artist Milena Barilli cherishes this: That never should be pleasing. The artist's attitude toward art is one of uncompromising conviction without any personal discomfort so long as she is a lady with an income, an honored member of the royal family of Yugoslavia, practicing her art in style in a comfortable Paris studio.

But when she suddenly cut off her friends and friends, during what she had intended as a brief visit to the country in 1932, she was shocked to find that Miss Barilli's conviction was put to a head-and-butler test of strength, not sweet, stimulating rather than pleasing.
