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Still Feeling Labor Pinch

Conditions Alleviated in Some Sections by Recruitment Drives

Hartford, Feb. 17.—The State Labor department's monthly report on employment said that most areas of Connecticut still were feeling the labor shortage "but conditions have been alleviated in some sections by local recruitment drives which have, in some instances, been notably successful in registering women."

"New Britain," the report continued, "has had outstanding success in this respect and demonstrated through its house-to-house canvases by trained interviewers that this form of recruitment is superior to the usual labor drive."

The report added that recruiting drives were also in progress or were being prepared in most occupations except those in the market because "positions on the non-durable 'hot' are being held by older men in this State."

The report said, too, that some workers were being recruited for more attractive jobs, and "superior" workers were being recruited for a labor surplus but in reality it is merely the transfer of workers from one industry to another.

Predicting the appearance of new employment opportunities, the report concluded: "The appearance of new employment opportunities in more varied capacities continues throughout the State as manufacturers realize that this is practically the only way to replace the men lost through selective service. Immigration to the State has virtually stopped; although there has a slight increase in the Newport area at the beginning of the month, this dwindled rapidly."

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Ninety-Six Accepted For Selective Service
