Soldier Held For Murder

Calmly Tells Police He Traveled 2,000 Miles To Kill His Father

Painaville, O., Jan. 15.—(AP)—A 19-year-old AWOL soldier was held on a murder charge today after calmly telling police he traveled 2,000 miles to commit the "grudge" slaying of his father.

County Prosecutor Thomas H. Blakely said the youth, Pvt. William Hill, would be arraigned today. Hill, AWOL from Fort Ord, Calif., gave himself up in Cleveland yesterday evening hours after he fatally shot his father, James E. Hill, 45, and clubbed his step-mother, Mrs. Alta Hill, 40. The crime occurred at the Hill home in Madison township, near here.

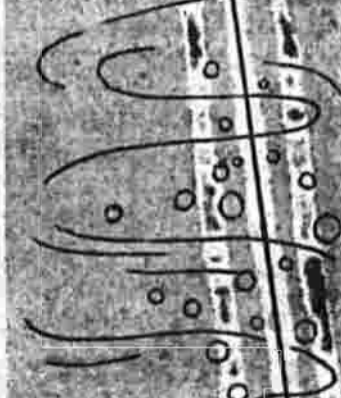
