Farmers Seen As Hit Hard

Economic Conditions Asserted as 'Worst Since Depression Days'

Chicago, March 1.—(AP)—The nation's farm economic conditions, says the American Dairy association's president, are the "worst since the depression days of the 30's."

"The situation facing dairymen today not only endangers the milk supply of the nation, but threatens the whole economic structure of America," ADA President Bryce S. Lusk of Wisconsin Delta, Wis., said last night.

"Farmers have been hit hard by the collapse of dairy and other commodity prices," Lusk told a meeting of delegates representing farm and industry dairymen from 10 states. "The cost of milk production has remained high while the farmer's income is dropping."

"When the farmers stop up on their buying the production of other goods strikes a snag and unemployment lines begin to form in industry just like they did in 1929-32."

"Forced out of business" Owen M. Richards, Chicago, ADA general manager, told the group that "hundreds of farmers have been forced out of the dairy business because the prices of butter, cheese, dry milk and other dairy foods have fallen below cost of production."

Richards added: "It is estimated that the income of dairy farmers has been cut in quarter billion dollars in the last three months due to the crashing in dairy food prices. The dairy industry is the only one in the national income picture and hurts the entire economy of the nation."

"In these days of high taxes and a record national budget of 42 billion dollars it becomes necessary for all segments of the national economy to maintain a high national level to keep the national economy sound and prosperous."

Marines Halting March Recruiting

Washington, March 1.—(AP)—The Marine Corps has suspended Marine enlistments except for 18-year-olds and a limited number of women.

Recruiting was halted because of increased reenlistments and a cut in strength of the corps. Reenlistments increased from 429 in December to about 600 in January.

The March quota for 18-year-olds has been set at 500. About 1,200 of these one-year men are already in the Marines.

Enrollment of volunteers in the Marine Reserve will continue. There is no quota on this group.

New York, March 1.—(AP)—Unemployment Corp. manufacturers of typewriters and adding machines reported today that net earnings in 1948 totaled \$6,012,502, equal to 18 1/2 a share of common stock.

The company's 1947 net was \$6,102,608, or \$5.31 a share.

Net sales last year, \$57,101,201, were up 19.7 percent from \$47,700,000 in 1947. The company reported that domestic sales were at a new high last year, but that dollar exchange shortages substantially curtailed export sales.
